HREE of the nation's highest ranking college seniors who happen to be blind were honored on May 8th by Vice President Gerald R. The Vice President presented each, in the presence of their families and RFB representatives, with a \$500 Scholastic Achievement Award from Recording for the Blind. The winning trio was also hailed by 250 prominent Washingtonians at a gala dinner toastmastered by the nationally syndicated political satirist Art Buchwald and featuring guest speaker Harold Krents.

The Washington Post, covering the event on its prestigious editorial page, wrote: "The achievement of the three students was made possible—aside from their own heroic persistence—by Recording for the Blind's record of service. In the 1972-73 academic year, for example, its tapes were used by 96 per cent of the estimated 3,500 blind students enrolled in American colleges, and by more than 60 per cent of the 8,000 blind high school students."

The 1974 awardees, studying side by side with their sighted classmates, used hundreds of textbooks expertly taped by RFB throughout their undergraduate years. They were:

ELIZABETH K. GANN, 24, from Texas, blind since infancy, graduated Phi Beta Kappa from the University of Texas at Austin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Spanish. "Kathy" aspires to work in a local hospital as a Translator Aide and directed her studies toward that end. Her keen perception and erudition in interpreting advanced works in Spanish literature won her the admiration of her professors and peers.

JOANNE T. CALLAHAN, 22, from Brooklyn, New York, blind since birth, graduated from Radcliffe College of Harvard University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Latin American History and Literature.

A Dean's List honor student, Miss Callahan set challenging academic goals for herself, and realized them, at one of the nation's most demanding institutions. Mastering both the Spanish and Portuguese languages, she developed keen perceptivity in her study of Hispanic American literature, and produced an outstanding senior thesis which entailed a vast amount of reading, research, originality, and organization.

On campus, Miss Callahan is well known for her involvement in Radcliffe affairs and service projects in the surrounding community. She has tutored Spanish-speaking prison inmates in English and has worked in a bi-lingual day-care center. A group leader with Projecto Amistad the summer of 1974, she taught in a school for the blind and handicapped. Her leadership qualities won for her the University's prized Ames Award for 1975.

Joanne will work toward a master's degree in Latin American Studies and is determined to work some day with a governmental agency devoted to advancing Latin American economic and cultural life.

STEVEN R. BLOW, 22, from Waverly, New York, blind since birth, graduated from Hamilton College, Clinton, New York, with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics.

Emerging 22nd in his class of 225, Steven's high standing mirrors an unusually probing mind capable of the diligence and insights that were essential to the understanding of a full range of difficult courses in an especially competive academic environment.

Not only excelling in his major subject of economics, he demonstrated an outstanding ability in learning the Russian language and preparing his assignments on a Cyrillic typewriter.

An active contributing member of the Hamilton College community, Steven is a member of the Root-Jessup Public Affairs Council, and the Christian Fellowship. He plays a mean saxophone. His next goal, well within his grasp, is to become a lawyer.

PAMELA F. ROTMAN, 20, from Chicago, Illinois, blind since the age of three, graduated from the University of Illinois, Urbana, with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English and Psychology.

Successful because of her own determination and the high scholastic standards she established for herself, Miss Rotman entered the University when she was sixteen and graduated 265th in a class of 2,200 students at one of the top ten state universities in the United States. Carrying a double major, she also chose to study for a semester at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, adjusting independently to the rigorous demands of a new environment.

Apart from her studies, Miss Rotman tutored a blind retarded child and has been active in the Disabled Students Organization; Students for Environmental Concerns; and the Pre-Law Club. She is a member of two honorary societies: Alpha Lamda Delta and Phi Kappa Phi. Her dream is to become a lawyer, and based on the positive results of her Law School Admissions Test and her proven tenacity, Pamela is confident of succeeding.

Joanne mastered both the Spanish and Portuguese languages and has traveled to Peru to teach in a school for the blind and handicapped. Her goal is to join an international agency devoted to advancing Latin American economics and cultural life.

STEVEN R. BLOW, 22, from Waverly, N.Y., blind since birth, is receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics from Hamilton College, Clinton, N.Y. Not only excelling in his major subject of economics, Steven learned to speak and write the Russian language, and has been active in every phase of a highly competitive college life. His next goal, well within his grasp, is to become a lawyer.

PAMELA F. ROTMAN, 20, from Chicago, Illinois, blind since the age of three, graduating from the University of Illinois, Urbana, with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English and Psychology. Pamela entered the University when she was
