## State Campaign Organizations

Alaska We are continuing efforts to provide transportation to the State Convention for Ford Delegates, and preparing delegates' names for a Presidential letter. Reagan's strength continues to be centered in Anchorage, site of the May 20-22 State Convention.

Arizona Mr. Reagan received 27 out of the 29 delegates chosen at the State Convention on Saturday. The two Ford delegates are Congressman Rhodes and Freddy Hershberger, who runs Senator Goldwater's state office. As noted by Senator Goldwater in his speech on Saturday, the organizational discipline of the Reagan forces resulted largely from internal efforts to control the state party.

California There are 21 phone banks established, with 15 given excellent chance to cover their areas entirely. The individual orientation meetings will take place on April 28th in Southern California and April 29th in Northern California.

We have 38 counties with identified chairmen, 6 with steering committees, 9 with field volunteers, three with leadership about to be named, and only two without activity to date. Recruitment mailings and headquarters' openings are taking place in several areas.

Governor Dan Evans was the PFC representative at this week's State College Republican Convention.

A total of 17 Presidential advocates are presently scheduled to be in the state between May 3 and June 3.

Colorado An analysis of our organizational penetration in 14 counties including 6 of the 10 major counties, shows that we are effectively reaching voters at the precinct level. This is encouraging evidence of our potential caucus strength.

Connecticut A majority of our town chairmen and campaign workers are also candidates to the State Convention here, and we are continuing our efforts to maintain contact with all delegates to the State Convention.

Delaware Senator Boggs has agreed to be the Chairman of the PFC here this past week, and activities in the state will begin next week.

Hawaii Senatorial District caucuses to nominate National Convention Delegates are being held from April 26-30. Congressional District caucuses to nominate the rest of the delegates will be held May 15 during the State Convention. Our estimate continues to be that we will get 18 of the 19 delegates.

The Reagan organization has just recently made some contacts and begun activity here, which we are watching closely.

Idaho Tom Kleppe visited Boise on April 22nd to attend the official opening of our headquarters here. A meeting was held with the Idaho Advisory Committee, County Chairmen, and our PFC state staff after the opening to discuss statewide strategy.

The Reagan organization announced Mr. Reagan's scheduled visit here the week of May 2, at which time he will go to Idaho Falls, Pocatella, Twin Falls and Boise.

Indiana The 15 phone centers are operating fully, and with approximately 25,000 calls made, the results show: Ford - 49.7%; Reagan - 11.7%; Undecided - 38.6%. The state goal is 125,000 calls.

A total of 10,000 newsletters were sent April 22, with another similarly-sized mailing scheduled April 28th. Press releases critical of Reagan's welfare reform and \$90 billion plan will be sent this week. A full advocate schedule for the closing week is slated to give us maximum press exposure in the final week. The Reagan organization begins their television schedule on April 26 with a half-hour program, which will be shown again May 1.

Kentucky We should have received 15 of the 37 delegates selected at present, although they all are bound proportionately by the May 25th primary results. The Texas primary results will have a strong influence on this state. Our efforts are concentrated here on the 5th District and Jefferson County.

The Reagan organization continues to have little organizational activity, and is relying here, as in other states, on a media and personal appearance campaign.

Michigan Phone banks with a total of 60 phones have been set up with additional capability established by home phones. The statewide phone list has 262,000 households which are to be contacted.

A state campaign newsletter was issued on April 26th to a select list of 2,000 names. It outlined campaign strategy as well as activities to date.

Missouri A total delegate count from precinct, ward, and county meetings to April 26th reveals: 530 - Ford; 318 - Reagan; 595 - Uncommitted.

Montana Although there has been some delay in recruiting County Chairmen, we do have organization in place in the major counties. At present, a direct mailing to a select list of 60,000 Republicans is planned instead of a phone effort as preparation for the primary and convention activities in May and June.

Nevada Telephone banks are actively underway in both Reno and Las Vegas. The breakdowns to date are as follows:

Although the State GOP Convention is controlled by Reagan 2-1, we have strong chances of faring much better in the primary.

New Mexico A mailing signed by Congressman Lujan and Senator Domenici was sent to 10,000 households urging attendance at precinct caucuses on behalf of the President. We continue to expect a 2/3 majority at these meetings and we are hoping to get at least 19 out of 21 delegate votes there.

Ohio The Reagan organization successfully contested the removal of Reagan's name from the ballot in the 8th Congressional District. A similar challenge is pending in the 2nd District, with threatened challenges coming in three more districts. He has currently qualified in 15 of the 23 districts.

Oregon Statewide phone bank results to date indicate: Ford - 64.2%; Reagan - 16%; Undecided - 29.8%.

Pennsylvania A final delegate estimate here indicates only 7 potential seats that could go to Mr. Reagan. State Chairman Drew Lewis has indicated we may get as many as 100 of the 103 delegates chosen. There are 75 chosen by district, 28 at-large, and all are running uncommitted.

South Carolina The State Convention on Saturday selected the state's at-large delegates, which we split with Mr. Reagan, with each candidate receiving 9 delegates. This gives them a 26-10 advantage when these results are added to the district level delegate totals.

Tennessee Most of the Republican leadership at the district and county levels are waiting for signals from the Republican leadership. Senator Baker, Congressmen Quillen and Beard, ex-Governor Dunn and ex-Congressman Kuykendal are firmly committed to our side, and we are working to establish ties in voters minds with statewide media exposure. The state will be strongly affected by the Texas results, and all indications are that we are currently behind. We are relying on phone efforts to maximize our voter turnout in key areas.

Utah State Chairman Warren Pugh held a meeting last week to prepare strategy for the precinct caucuses which begin May 17. It is imperative that our organization amass more voters to turn out for precinct delegate and continue this momentum through the County and State conventions.

Washington The total delegate count at the State Convention is 1164, and at present we need 51 more delegates to gain control. We have targeted Pierce and Spokane counties to gain this added strength. The Congressional District Caucuses, responsible for 21 delegates, will be held at the same time as the Juen 18-19 State Convention, where 17 at-large delegates are named.

Wisconsin The primary vote has been certified in all Congressional Districts but the 8th, where a recount may be requested by the Reagan organization. The final delegate selection process is still being formulated.

Wyoming Our Steering Committee here, which includes Jim Griffith, State Auditor; Ed Witzemberger, State Treasurer; John Ostlund, State Senator; John Wold, State PFC Finance Chairman; and Stan Hathaway, former Governor, held a strategy meeting to prepare for the May 8th State Convention. The PFC favors sending an uncommitted delegation to the Convention, and the Reagan organization is being questioned on this possibility. The seven National Convention Delegates from the judicial districts have been selected and it is felt all are Ford supporters. At present, a complete list of county nominating committees is being compiled to determine our strength.

The Reagan organization has not achieved a great deal of penetration at this point, as there is reluctance in this state to work against an incumbent.

### Campaign '76

A 5-minute documentary film was completed entitled "Faces" (Texas version). The National Defense brochure was completed and 25,000 copies sent to Texas. Two radio commercials were produced using Senator Tower.

### Finance Committee

Receipts through April 19th show that 64.3% of the national quota has been attained. A state-by-state quota achievement is attached at TAB A, along with a list of newly-named Finance Chairmen.

### Press

Deputy Press Secretary Grace Marie Prather has been in Texas putting together news conferences and news releases with Pete Roussel.

Twenty-two radio actualities were prepared for Texas, Indiana, and California; 475 actual feeds were made. Individuals used include the President, Mrs. Ford, Senator Tower, Washington State Governor Dan Evans, PFC Finance Chairman Bob Mosbacher, Texas State Senators Ike Harris and James Nowlin, William Seidman, and Manuel Lopez, President of Mexican-American Political Association.

### Treasurer's Report

A total of \$202,535.33 was received in contributions this past week, bringing to \$8,438,033.70 the amount of money received to date. There is currently a balance of \$235,245.88 on hand. A full Treasurer's Report is attached at TAB B.


