b. Constance Cook. 55. A Republican New York Assembly Woman. Chairman of the Education Committee and a first-rate lawyer. She is by reputation a woman of the highest caliber, according to Alan Pifer of the Carnegie Corp., Nancy Hanks and others. (Bio., Tab B).

c. Patricia Jane Carry. 46. President, Knight, Carry, Bliss and Company, investment bankers. Also, she is a member of the Board of Trustees of Cornell University, and a director of TWA. Executive recruiters in New York report that she is a first-rate administrator. (Bio., Tab C).

d. Jane P. Cahill. 42. Vice President for Communications IBM. She is responsible for all corporate communications and advertising. A former White House Fellow from 1966-67, she served as administrative assistant to the Secretary of HUD. She has been a Trustee of the Rockefeller Foundation and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. A registered Independent. She is highly recommended by Jim Connor. (No Bio available).

e. Martha Peterson. 58. President of Barnard College and a Dean of Columbia University. She is respected by other academicians as a very sound, even-tempered individual. Director of Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., and of Dry Dock Savings Bank, New York. (Bio., Tab D).

f. Mary Roebling. Chairman of the Board, National State Bank, Trenton, New Jersey. Although 68, she is extremely active and very interested in the affairs of the Department of Defense. She is planning to leave the bank soon and might be very interested in an appointment. She is an ardent Republican. (Bio., Tab E).

g. Ersa Hines Poston. 53. Currently President of the New York State Civil Service Commission. Former assistant to Governor Rockefeller. A Republican. Ms. Poston is black. (Bio., Tab F).

h. Rhoda Stewart. 58. Vice President Borg Warner, Manager Chemicals and Plastics Division, domestic and international. A very capable manager. (Bio., Tab G).

i. Madeline H. McWhinney. 52. Formerly highest ranking woman at Federal Reserve Bank, New York. Now President-designate of First Woman's Bank. Excellent organizer, administrator. (Bio., Tab H).

j. Patricia R. Hitt. 56. Former Assistant Secretary for Communities and Field Services, Department of Health, Education and Welfare. National co-Chairman and Director of Women's Activities, Presidential Campaign 1968. (Bio., Tab I).

k. Rita Hauser. 40. Lawyer and former U.S. Representative to U.N. Commission on Human Rights. An active Republican. (Bio., Tab J).

l. Olive Ann Beech. 71. Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of the Beech Aircraft Corporation. Although 71, she is regarded as a very bright manager, according to financial sources. She is a substantial Republican supporter. (Bio., Tab K).

m. Shirley Ray Shafer Chilton. 51. Managing Partner, Daniel Reeves & Co., California. Also a former vice president of Hayden Stone, Inc. Republican. (Bio., Tab L).

n. Helen K. Copley. Publisher, San Diego Union and Tribune. Director, Wells Fargo Bank. Gerry Warren reports that she has succeeded her husband this year as Publisher, and although she had little previous management experience, she is doing a good job. (No bio available).

o. Ruth Handler. 58. Chairman of Mattel, Inc., toy manufacturer with sales over \$300M. Director of L.A. Branch, Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco. However, Mattel is currently having serious problems. (Bio., Tab M).

p. Margaret Heckler. 43. Republican Congresswoman from Massachusetts. A lawyer who serves on the Banking & Currency Committee. (Bio., Tab N).

q. Mary Wells Lawrence. 46. Chairman of the Board, Wells, Rich, Greene, Inc., advertising agency in New York. A Republican. She has been very successful. (Bio., Tab O).

r. Rita F. Mackey. President, Marine Midland Trust Co., (Northern) Watertown, New York. Was named Woman Banker of the Year in 1974. (No bio available).

s. Barbara Newell. 45. President of Wellesley (Mass.) College since 1972. A respected feminist. Expertise in labor relations. A Fellow of the Brookings Institution. (Bio., Tab P).

t. Marian Sandler. 43. Senior Vice President and Secretary Golden West Savings & Loan Association, Oakland, Calif. She and her husband built the firm into one of the most lucrative S & L's in the nation. (No bio available).

## BIOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION

### Martha Redfield Wallace

Martha Redfield Wallace is the Executive Director and a Vice President of the Henry Luce Foundation, Inc., a private philanthropic foundation organized in 1936 by the late Henry R. Luce, founder and editor-in-chief of Time Incorporated. Mrs. Wallace also serves on the Foundation's Board of Directors.

Mrs. Wallace is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Bowery Savings Bank, the largest savings bank in the United States, and the Board of Directors of the New York Telephone Company and of Bristol-Myers Company. In each case she was the first woman to be elected. She is also a Director of Scudder Duo-Vest Inc., a dual purpose investment company traded on the New York Stock Exchange, and of the Scudder Duo-Vest Exchange Fund Inc. In January 1974 she was named to the New York City Mayor's Council of Economic and Business Advisers.

Other Board affiliations include the Council on Foundations, Inc., and the Foundation Center. She was among the first group of women admitted to the Council on Foreign Relations, Inc., and in June 1972 was elected to the Board of Directors. She is also a member of The Conference Board, the Management Committee of the United States-South Africa Leadership Exchange Program, Inc., and the distribution committee for the Sumitomo Fund. In 1971 she was appointed by Governor Rockefeller to be a member of the Council for Empire State College (State University of New York). Mrs. Wallace is a Trustee of Williams College and a member of the East Asian Visiting Committee at the University of Michigan.

Additional philanthropic activities include service on the boards of A Better Chance, Inc., the Greater New York Fund, the auxiliary of New York Orthopaedic Hospital, and the Greater New York Councils, Boy Scouts of America. A former vice president of the New York Junior League, she was recipient of the League's 1968 outstanding volunteer award.

Mrs. Wallace's professional background in economics and public affairs began as assistant to the dean of the Fletcher School and economics instructor at Tufts University. Later she served as an international economist for the Department of State (1951-53), with RCA International (1954-55), and as a research associate on FORTUNE (1955-57). Mrs. Wallace was in public affairs for the IBM Corporation before returning to Time Inc. in 1963 as chief researcher and later assistant director of Corporate Development. She left to join the Henry Luce Foundation in June 1967.

Martha Wallace was born in Omaha, Nebraska, the daughter of Mrs. Ralph J. Redfield of Omaha and the late Mr. Redfield. She attended Omaha public schools and is a graduate of Wellesley College (B.A. in economics, 1949), where she was a Durant Scholar (Wellesley's top academic honor) and a member of Phi Beta Kappa. She received an M.A. in international affairs in 1950 from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy.

She is married to Donald L. Wallace, partner in the New York law firm of Whitman and Ransom, and lives at 950 Park Avenue in New York and in Millbrook, New York.
