ELECTIONS ROUNDUP

Washington AP - A Nation unsettled by Republican scandal and burgeoning prices handed Democrats a much tighter grip on Congress and a near-record total of Governorships in the mid-term election of 1974.

The majority party picked up at least four Senate seats, for a total of 62, and appeared headed for two-thirds control of the House. The Democrats had 291 Representatives, one vote more than the so-called veto-proof mark, and were leading in several other races that were still too close to call in today's late counting.

Tabulations were also incomplete in some Governors' races, but the likely outcome would give the Democrats four more State mansions for a total of 36 -- the greatest number since their 1958 landslide.

But the GOP scored a major upset in populous Ohio, with 65-year-old James A. Rhodes barely squeaking by incumbent Gov. John J. Gilligan -- who was regarded as many as a rising national star for the Democrats.

Rhodes, a former Governor, had conceded defeat during the night, and the final margin was so tight that a recount was almost certain.

At the White House, Press Secretary Ron Nessen declared today that "No one thinks this was a referendum on the President"... It will not affect the President's decision that he probably will run for election in 1976.

The Democrats got several new faces to watch as potential candidates in the Presidential Campaign two years away: Govs.-elect Hugh L. Carey of New York and Edmund G. Brown, Jr. of California, and Sens.-elect John H. Glenn, Jr. of Ohio and Dale Bumpers of Arkansas.

President's Views on Election

Washington UPI - President Ford does not view Republican losses in Tuesday's elections as "A referendum on himself" and the outcome will not affect his decision to "probably" run for President in 1976, his chief spokesman said today.

Although Ford blamed inflation as the No. 1 campaign issue, Press Secretary Ron Nessen said that "We wouldn't disagree that it was a referendum on Watergate."

Nessen told reporters that "No one considers the election a referendum (on Ford) and he doesn't believe that."

Nessen said that Ford, members of his family and his senior adviser monitored the returns until about 1:30 a.m. today. He said there was a party atmosphere and "everyone had a good time."

"It was not a wake," Nessen insisted and said that Ford was philosophical about the ups and downs of elections as a result of his 26 years in the political arena.

Ford made some calls Tuesday night and early today, talking to GOP leaders among others.

He arranged to meet at later today with Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield to discuss the upcoming lame-duck session of Congress.

Nessen said that before Ford travels to Japan on Nov. 17 he also will meet with Republican Congressional leaders to discuss his legislative strategy in view of the newly elected overwhelming Democratic majorities in the House and Senate.

As for the elections, Nessen said, "He certainly doesn't intend to let it affect his decision to run."

ONE-HALF THE CANDIDATES FORD HELPED LOST

Washington (AP) -- More than half of the Republican Candidates for whom President Ford personally campaigned were defeated in Tuesday's elections.

During his campaign speeches in 20 states, Ford specifically endorsed 97 Gubernatorial, Senate and Congressional candidates. Of these, 56 lost and 33 won with 8 races undecided.

From the White House, where he watched the returns on three color television sets, Ford acknowledged his party had been trounced. But he declared, "Those who lose often come back to win another day."

"I am not dismayed," Ford was quoted as telling GOP National Chairman Mary Louise Smith in a telephone conversation. "Parties have come back before, and we will, too."

Press Secretary Ron Nessen said Ford's spirits "Don't reflect any gloom or pessimism." In fact, Nessen reported, Ford was "laughing a lot" while watching televised returns.

Of the 17 Senate candidates receiving personal campaign aid from Ford, a dozen went down to defeat. Four won and a fifth was clinging to a narrow lead.

Ford endorsed 13 GOP Gubernatorial contenders, seven lost, four won and two races were too close to call early today.

During his travels, he also singled out for endorsement 67 Republican Congressional candidates. 37 of these lost, 25 won and 5 races were undecided.

An analysis of the returns showed mixed results from the Presidential politicking.

For example, on his last campaign swing, Ford made a special stop in Sioux City, Iowa, to help Republican Rep. Wiley Mayne in his bid for a new term. Mayne lost.

A few days later, he stopped over in Salt Lake City to aid Jake Garn in his Senate bid, then rated too close to call. Garn won.

That same day, he also campaigned for Senator Peter Dominick in Colorado and Senator Robert Dole in Kansas. Dominick lost, but Dole won.

Michigan Gov. William G. Milliken received large doses of support from Ford, and barely won re-election. But Paul Goebel, bidding to oust a Democrat from Ford's old House seat in Grand Rapids, was unable to ride Ford's personal help to victory.

NBC TODAY SHOW

Senator Robert C. Byrd (D., W. Va.), the Assistant Majority Leader, said Wednesday "the pressure is going to be on the Democrats now to produce and legislate effectively."

In an interview conducted by Bill Monroe, Byrd said it is important to keep in mind that 53 per cent of all Americans consider themselves conservative. With a liberal candidate for President, the Democrats lost the blue-collar vote, the ethnic vote, and the lower and middle-income vote in 1972.

"I think we now see these coming back and it is up to the Democratic party to keep them back," Byrd said. "This means that we have got to stay in the middle of the road. We have got to have a moderate approach, or else we will suffer the same loss in 1976 that we did two years ago."

Byrd said the Democrats now have every hope that there will be a Democrat elected President in 1976 "by virtue of the fact that we have additional governorships, which gives us additional organizational strength."

DEMOCRATS SAY THEY HAVE A MANDATE

Washington (AP) -- Democrats say their sweeping election gains comprise a mandate to forge their own program for fighting inflation and reviving the nation's economy.

"This is not just a victory, this is a mandate." declared House Speaker Carl Albert, claiming the outcome amounted to a "repudiation" of the Ford Administration's economic program.

Republicans viewed their drubbing at the polls Tuesday as the closing chapter of Watergate and a challenge to regroup their forces for the 1976 Presidential contest.

"I had hoped the effect of Watergate would not be as serious as it turned out to be." Said GOP National Chairman Mary Louise Smith. "But there was a backlash."

In a statement early today, Mrs. Smith said the election "is probably a final chapter of those difficult times and it will mark a new beginning for the Republican Party."

President Ford, joined by key assistants as he watched election returns at the White House, told Mrs. Smith:

"I am not dismayed. Parties have come back before and we will too."

Democratic National Chairman Robert Strauss said the Democrats' strengthened majority in Congress would give them fresh opportunity to tackle "bread-and-butter issues" aggravated by the nation's combined inflation and recession.

"The polls show that the people think by 2 1/2 to 1 that the Democrats are best able to deal with these economic issues," he said.

Strauss also said the election results indicated a re-building of "the old Democratic coalition."

"We're really turning out the farmer, the small business-man, the blue collar worker," he said. "The average worker man and woman is back voting Democratic."

Strauss spoke with reporters as party aides and workers, in a festive mood, clustered around television sets at Democratic National Headquarters and chalked up one win after another.

However, Strauss cautioned: "The victory isn't tonight. The opportunity begins tonight.

"The victory will be when we start to get the kind of legislation out which this country needs -- even if we don't get any executive leadership to help us get it," he said.

Albert and Assistant Democratic Senate Leader Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia said they expect the next Congress will be able to deal more decisively with major legislation including national health insurance and tax reform.

Despite GOP setbacks, Mrs. Smith was all smiles and there was surprisingly little gloom at the Republicans's Capitol Hill Club gathering.

SUBJECT: Results of 1974 Congressional Elections and List
of New Members

The 1974 Congressional elections resulted in a 43-seat Democratic gain. The 94th Congress will be composed of 291 Democrats and 144 Republicans. In terms of liberal vs. conservative strength in the House, the elections resulted in a gain of about 40 votes for progressive forces.

Democratic Gains (49) -- 36 Republican incumbents were defeated (Baker, Blackburn, Bray, Brotzman, Brophyhill, Camp, Cronin, Dellenback, Dennis, Froelich, Grover, Hanrahan, Huber, Hudnut, Hunt, King, Kuykendall, Landgrebe, Maraziti, Mathias, Mayne, Mizell, Parris, Price, Roncallo, Ruth, Sandman, Scherle, Shoup, Thomson, Towell, Veysey, Widnall, Young, E., Young, S., and Zion). In addition, Democrats won 13 seats where Republican incumbents did not run due to resignation, retirement, or primary defeat (Arends, Chamberlain, Hogan, Hosmer, Gubser, Minshall, Robison, Smith, H., Steele, Williams, Wyatt, Wyman, Zion).

Democratic Losses (6) -- Four Democratic incumbents were defeated (Clark, Denholm, Kyros, and Luken). In addition, Republicans won two seats where the Democratic incumbent did not run due to primary defeat (Rarick) and resignation (Gunter).

Party Retention of Seats -- Democrats retained 26 of 28 seats vacated by Democratic incumbents. Republicans retained 11 of 24 seats vacated by Republican incumbents.

New Members -- There will be 92 new members in the 94th Congress -- 75 Democrats and 17 Republicans (see attached lists). This means that nearly half of the new House (190 members) will have been elected since 1970 and over two-thirds (291) since 1964.

SUBJECT: 94th Congress

Since the veto will be a far less potent threat in this Congress, I recommend we adopt a better "early warning signal" with emphasis on influencing legislative actions at the subcommittee level whenever possible. Means of implementing such a strategy might include the following:

- (1) Call a White House meeting with all the departmental and agency heads. Impress upon them the importance of cleaning up legislation at the subcommittee and committee levels, rather than leaving it up to us to put out fires by floor amendment. Too many of them seem to feel their job is finished when they report or testify on a bill. Too many simply monitor legislation from their offices. Let them know we expect to see them on Capitol Hill regularly.
- (2) Encourage them to use their principals (Cabinet Secretaries, agency heads et al) on a one-on-one basis weighted toward the Democrats. Too many ranking Republicans have a "clubby" relationship with their chairmen and hesitate to carry the ball for the Administration. Secretary Lynn did an outstanding job of this with the housing bill last year.
- (3) Bring in each agency liaison team as a group on a regular basis for the purpose of identifying troublespots and developing battle plans. During the past year the agency types often felt cut off from the White House. Watergate preoccupation led to a sort of malaise among the liaison teams. Let them know you're watching them this year. Place particular emphasis on HEW, which carried about 30% of the legislative load in the last Congress, far more than any other department.
- (4) Too many minor, but troublesome, bills slide through and end up being vetoed or "eaten." Warn the liaison types about concentrating too much on major Administration initiatives to the exclusion of less visible legislation. When hearings are scheduled on a bill, agencies should make known the Administration's objections even when their views are not requested. Interstate and Foreign Commerce, Public Works and Education and Labor tend to disregard Executive Branch views in all too many cases. In other words, give

clear and non-conflicting signals at the earliest levels of consideration. This has been a favorite "cop-out" for our ranking Republicans.

(5) Lay out a blueprint for the weekly legislative reports. Some are almost indecipherable. Most regard it as a routine chore - that no one in the White House reads anyway. Let them know these are confidential documents that all of us read and rely upon. Emphasize the need for constant updating of the "Outlook" section to reflect changing conditions. Better agency liaison work will help us anticipate and counteract real problem areas.

(6) Let the liaison types know our guys - up to ^{and} including the President - are willing to help where we can, but we are too few and lack the in-depth knowledge that they should possess. We should concentrate our efforts on major Administration initiatives, public relations with the Democrats in particular, backstopping the agencies when appropriate, and the inevitable load of case-work and personnel problems of individual Members.

(7) The uneven flow of legislation makes it impossible for us to break up legislation into tidy areas of responsibility; however, in general, I hope to assign functional areas as follows:

Vern - Human Resources & Agriculture,
bulk of case work
Charlie Leppert - Natural Resources, Energy &
Environment, Transportation
Doug Bennett - Economic issues, both foreign &
domestic, personnel ratings

This should enable us to gain more in-depth knowledge of subject matter and better target our efforts on selected committees and individual Members.

(8) Use our Kennedy Center and other privileges to the utmost in cultivating Members, again with emphasis on key Democrats.

(9) Pay early courtesy calls on all chairmen and ranking Members to introduce our new staff. Offer cooperation and conciliation rather than confrontation.

The President has set the philosophical tone ... communication, conciliation, consultation and compromise. This guidance is particularly appropriate as we approach a new, heavily Democratic Congress. Current economic troubles of both a recessionary and inflationary nature considered in conjunction with 1976 will highly politicize the next two years. Our objective is to obtain passage of good law and moderation of potentially bad law all of which should be consistent with the President's various programs. The question then is how best to accommodate the achievement of these ends. The following are some of my specific thoughts in this regard:

(1) As a Republican Administration we should obviously be pro-Republican. The Democrats will expect us to at least be neutral toward them, but I believe we should be pro-Democrat when possible. The stakes with respect to the country's future are too high to engage in unnecessary partisan politics and from a practical standpoint, the numbers indicate we have little choice.

(2) With respect to the above, it seems to me we should make every effort to consult early with the key Republicans and with those "trustworthy" Democrats on the various programs the Administration is advancing. We should seek to establish a cooperative spirit with even the more difficult groups including the DSG.

(3) When employment positions need to be filled, we should make available some of the positions to candidates of key Democrats even though they may have been troublesome in the past ... of course, we should be selective and careful in our choices. In other words, signal our goodwill.

(4) Our approach should be guided by a consensus attitude characterized by early and timely communication with the Hill on Administration positions. The legislative committees should be dealt with at the subcommittee level. The Departments will have the primary responsibility here but we should be well apprised by the Departments of all activity so that we may be more effective without overly interfering with Department responsibilities.

(5) Member service always brings in good chips. We should work doubly hard to be of service and be absolutely non-partisan. This could include, time permitting, making ourselves available for Key constituent meetings the Members might hold in their offices. Again on a selective basis.

(6) It seems to me that this President more than any since Truman has the opportunity to reach the Congress both directly and through the American public. The President is characterized and perceived as a man of the highest integrity and whose style is straight forward and that of an "All American Guy". We should make every effort to reflect this image and represent him in that manner.

(7) With respect to Vice President Rockefeller, it strikes me that in some careful manner, we should consider some sort of coordination with him. While I understand he is exercising great caution and good sense in his new role vis-a-vis the President, it seems to me that as time passes he will emerge with the President's endorsement as an active participant in Hill activities. I have not figured out yet how to coordinate with him, but believe we should give special consideration to working out an arrangement.

(8) I fully concur that our approach should be to the Members themselves, but there are certain staff members who should be dealt with on a very frequent basis. In this connection, consideration should be given to a periodic meeting at the White House with Key leadership staff and committee counsels - both majority and minority. Such "let down your hair" sessions should prove highly productive and further advance the consensus approach I believe we should adopt.

(9) In conclusion, I believe our approach should be as positive as possible and we should avoid confrontation and negativism. We can avoid these problems by adopting an early warning system directed toward consensus.


