SUBJECT: PENULTIMATE MARK-UP OF SYNFUELS BILL BY COMMERCE COMMITTEE

The House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee today held its next-to-last mark-up session on the bill, HR 12112. A final vote on the bill will occur at 11:15 a.m., Tuesday, June 22, 1976.

At today's session, the Committee took the following actions:

- 1. Pending when the Committee convened was the Moss Amendment which deletes the provision which exempts from public disclosure those trade secrets and proprietary information which, after proper showing to the Administrator, have been determined to be properly classified as proprietary. In essence, the amendment requires public disclosure of proprietary information gathered under the guaranteed loan programs. The amendment passed on a vote of 20-18, with Mr. Ottinger reluctantly voting two proxies in favor of the amendment which he opposed. (See attached vote).
- 2. Passed on a vote of 24-9, the Brown of Ohio Amendment providing for a one-House veto within 90 after submission of any contract in excess of \$100 million. Such a veto requires positive action by either House.
- 3. Passed without objection two Rooney Amendments: (1) requiring conformance of community assistance associated with any energy conservation project with applicable regional or interstate waste management plan; and (2) permitting the Administrator to transfer portions of this program to EPA.
- 4. Adopted report language suggested by Mr. Scheuer to encourage demonstration plants which may or may not be synthetically-fueled (such as fluidized bed direct burning of coal) in apartment complexs. Adopted without objection.
- 5. Pending as the <u>second order</u> of business for next session is the Brown Amendment to strike Title II (de-regulation or non-regulation of synfuels).
- 6. Adopted by voice vote the Eckhardt Amendment to clarify that the deregulation does not apply to currently regulated natural resource products.
- 7. Adopted by voice vote two clarifying amendments offered by Mr. Ottinger which: (1) make such non-regulation provisions applicable only to those products which are sold directly to end-users, not for resale; and



- (2) tightens circumstances under which the FPC may certificate construction, etc., for the manufacture of syngases.
- 8. Pending as the <u>first</u> order of business before the Committee is the Ottinger Amendment providing that FPC certification will <u>not</u> permit the displacement of natural gas from a pipeline to make room for the transportation of synthetic gases.

Again the Committee's mark-up session was foreshortened for lack of a quorum.

The House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee (Chairman Staggers) continued its mark-up of the bill, HR 12112, today and took the following actions:

- 1. Defeated the Carter Amendment which would have restored to the Dingell Substitute the authority to issue loan guarantees for two pipeline coal gasification plants.
- 2. Defeated the Dingell Amendment which would have restored loan guarantees for a half-scale coal gasification plant with an option for a full-scale plant with a 60% loan guarantee.
- 3. Defeated, 18-15 with 1 voting present, the Brown Amendment which would have restored one full-scale loan-guaranteed high-Btu coal gasification plant. Record vote attached.

The Committee meets again tomorrow at 10:00 to continue its mark-up. Pending is the Brown Amendment to restore the HS&T patent policy. The Committee will consider Titles II & III of the Dingell Substitute which deal with deregulation of gas from coal and with price guarantees for deregulated and unregulated gas from coal.

The Committee has been granted an extension, until June 25th, to report out their bill. Since the Minority has requested their rightful 3-days in which to file their views, the Committee must finish its mark-up by next Wednesday.

Assuming the above timetable is met, and assuming a generally favorable indication from Majority and Minority Whip Checks to be taken on Monday and Tuesday, June 28/29, Chairman Teague hopes to go to Rules Committee on the 29th and to the Floor the 30th — before the July Recess.

#### Dear Congressman Rhodes:

In my February 26, 1976, Energy Message I urged the Congress to pass legislation needed to authorize loan guarantees that are necessary to help assure that the private sector proceeds with the construction of a limited number of facilities to demonstrate the commercial feasibility of producing synthetic fuels from coal, oil shale, and other domestic resources. I am pleased that the House of Representatives will soon be taking up H.R. 12112 which would authorize the necessary program.

The United States dependence on foreign sources of oil and gas continues to grow. Domestic production of oil and natural gas has been declining since the early 1970's. I have proposed a number of actions that would reduce our growing dependence on foreign oil and gas, including the removal of price controls. Some of these have been adopted and others are still under consideration. However, even with these actions, our dependence on imported petroleum will continue to grow in the 1990's if additional long-term efforts, such as the development of synthetic fuels, are not undertaken. For this important reason, I continue to urge, in the strongest terms, enactment of legislation to create a synthetic fuels commercial demonstration program.

Such a program will enable us to attain several important objectives. We can:

- obtain early information and essential experience with the financial, environmental, economic, institutional, and technical aspects of synthetic fuel production;

- demonstrate our capacity to tap our vast domestic resources; and
- establish our technical leadership in synthetic fuels among consuming nations.

I hope that you will urge your colleagues in the Congress to recognize the urgency of our energy problems and the necessity for the synthetic fuels commercial demonstration program.

The House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce (Chairman Staggers) today completed mark-up on the bill, HR 12112, and voted to report favorably a substitute bill. The report, together with minority views, must be filed on June 25th.

The Committee took the following actions:

- 1. By a voice vote, adopted the Ottinger substitute for his own earlier amendment, the result of which is language which directs the FPC to take into consideration the ability of the pipeline to carry the synthetic gas without displacement of natural gas and the ability of the plants to provide synthetic gas in an uninterrupted manner prior to the FPC granting certification to the pipeline to sell the gas (non-regulated) to the end-user.
- 2. By a voice vote, adopted the Eckhardt amendment which clarifies the intent that the pipeline-eminent domain issue be resolved in accordance with the proceedures established in the Natural Gas Act.
- 3. Defeated by a roll-call vote of 9-22, the Brown amendment to strike Title II.
- A) Adopted by voice vote the Eckhardt amendment to limit price guarantees to demo plants only and to limit the aggragate contingent liability of the Government to not more than \$250M in any Fiscal Year.
- B) Adopted by voice vote the Ottinger amendment which excludes synthetic fuels derived from petroleum from the definition of synthetic fuels covered by this Title.
- 4. Defeated, 5-20, the Brown amendment to strike Title III.
- 5. Defeated by a show of hands (7-17) the Broyhill amendment to report unfavorably on the bill, HR 12112, without recommending a substitute,
- 5. Adopted, by a record vote of 22-10, the Dingell motion to report favorably on the substitute amendment.

The Committee substitute, eliminating loan guarantees for coal and providing poorly drafted language on non-regulation of coal, and lacking proper authorization for the funding of price supports, is probably totally unsatisfactory to the Administration and may well be defeated in the House.

#### MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: FINAL MARK-UP OF SYNFUELS BILL BY HOUSE COMMERCE COMMITTEE

The House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce (Chairman Staggers) today completed mark-up on the bill, HR 12112, and voted to report favorably a substitute bill. The report, together with minority views, must be filed on June 25th.

SUBJECT: SYNFUELS LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS MEETING

It now looks as though the synfuels bill, H.R. 12112, may be brought to the House Floor sometime next week. The bill is extremely complicated — it was sequentially referred to four committees — and is extremely controversial.

In order for the Administration spokesmen to be effective in expressing the Administration's view on this legislation — and to give the White House effort the visibility the Chairman and Ranking Member of HS&T desire — it is requested that your office set up a briefing and "target assignment session" for the Congressional Relations officers of the appropriate agencies and Departments.

We are prepared to provide a not-to-exceed 15 minute substantive brief on the purposes of the bill, a preliminary head-count on the House Members' positions, and a concise set of Fact Sheets, argument papers, etc. for use by the participants and their principals. We can go with anything up to an hour's advance notice, but I suggest that some time be scheduled as soon as possible to ensure full attendance by the senior IA officers concerned.

#### Dear Republican Colleague:

Last year in his State of the Union Message and again this February, the President urged the Congress to pass legislation needed to authorize loan guarantees that are necessary to help assure that the private sector proceeds with the construction of a limited number of facilities to demonstrate the commercial feasibility of producing synthetic fuels from coal, oil shale, and other abundant domestic resources. The legislation authorizing this program (H.R. 12112) is currently before the Committee on Rules and likely to be considered by the House within the next few weeks.

The United States dependence on foreign sources of oil and gas continues to grow. In 1972 before the Arab oil embargo, we imported 29 percent of our oil; today, only four years later we import over 40 percent. Domestic production of oil and natural gas has been steadily declining since the early 1970's. The President has proposed a number of actions that would reduce our growing dependence on foreign oil and gas, including the removal of price controls. Some of these have been adopted and others are still under consideration. However, even with prompt deregulation and decontrol and extensive development of our Alaskan and Outer Continental Shelf resources, our dependence on imported petroleum will continue to grow rapidly in the early 1990's if additional long-term efforts, such as the development of synthetic fuels, are not undertaken now.

Opponents of H.R. 12112 continue to understate the future need for synthetic fuels and overstate the degree to which conservation and renewable energy resources can satisfy this future energy gap. They similarly distort the primary purpose of this program as an effort to permanently subsidize the ongoing production of synthetic fuels rather than initiating a carefully limited demonstration of a critical number of these "first-of-a-kind" plants to help overcome the range of regulatory, environmental, financial and socioeconomic obstacles that now block these vital energy technologies.

The President's proposed program would establish a sound base from which a major new industry to satisfy these requirements could expand in a timely and responsible manner.

The President, the U.S. Senate and three of the four major House Committees to which H.R. 12112 has been referred have endorsed this program as the most prudent way to move now to ensure the availability of these technologies in the future to satisfy our national energy requirements. To do nothing and adopt/policy of "business-as-usual" while further increasing our already dangerous reliance on foreign sources of oil and gas would invite the most serious kind of future energy crisis. Washington's response to such a crisis would undoubtedly be outright government ownership and operation of this major new industry in a crash program that would ravage the West and ignore existing uncertainties that, by acting responsibly now, can be resolved with minimum government interference.

I strongly urge your support of H.R. 12112 when it is before the House in the near future.

ERDA has reviewed the draft GAO report entitled "Are There Better Choices?" which is concerned with Federal proposals to finance the commercialization of advanced energy technologies.

We are deeply concerned about this report because it presents strong conclusions and recommendations to the Congress without a sound underlying basis of analysis supporting them. The draft report represents in our view, a presentation of a point of view rather than any new, independent analyses of alternatives.

This lack of underlying objective examination is particularly important since the opinions expressed in the report have implications not only with respect to important legislative proposals now pending before the Congress for synthetic fuels and other technologies, but also with respect to the broader matter of the overall balance among ERDA's energy R,D&D programs.

In particular, I wish to call your attention to the following major concerns which we regard as serious deficiencies in the draft report:

In arguing that it is not necessary to provide now a Federal guaranty program for synthetic fuels, GAO has used for its analysis a very optimistic estimate of the future effects of conservation (i.e., Ford Foundation technical fix case) and coupled this with an equally optimistic high estimate of domestic conventional oil and gas production in the year 2000 (20 million b/d greater than today's domestic production). We believe such unrealistic demand/supply cases cannot prudently be used as a basis for national



energy policy. Nevertheless, even using such optimistic projections, the GAO report still admits to a substantial synthetic fuel production requirement beginning in the 1990's if we are to avoid a further increasing dependence on foreign oil. With this requirement, lack of certainty as to the future price and availability of imported fuels, and with the long lead times associated with the growth of such a large new capital intensive industry, uncertainty facing investment must be resolved by the middle 1980's if we are to maintain a capability to have plants in operation in the early 1990's. This means that we cannot delay taking action now to obtain needed information regarding the environmental, regulatory and overall economic characteristics which can affect the commercial viability of this option.

- The GAO draft report has numerous assertions about the favorable comparative economics of new and emerging conservation and renewable energy resource technologies vis-a-vis synthetic fuels. Such discussion is hardly germane to an evaluation of synthetic fuels technologies. Indeed, ERDA shares GAO's enthusiasm concerning the attractive features of conservation and renewable resource technologies. However, even if these technologies are very rapidly introduced, they, by themselves, cannot obviate the indicated need in the 1990's for substantial quantities of synthetic fuels, or alternatively, continued imports.
- 3. The GAO report fails to either present or analyze the underlying rationale for the financial incentive program for synthetic fuels and other technologies embodied in H.R. 12112. Repeatedly, the draft GAO report characterizes this program as one which is aimed at augmenting domestic fuel supplies through subsidized synthetic fuel production. While one effect of the program would be to supplement domestic fuel supplies by some modest amount, the primary purpose of the program is to maintain the option to develop a synthetic

fuel industry that can meet a projected demand in the 1990's of several million barrels per day of synthetic liquids and gaseous fuels. The guaranty program, therfore, is designed to acquire critical information and, to the extent possible, resolve at an early date regulatory, environmental, financial, political and other barriers which may preclude later private sector investment because of the lack of information concerning the commercial viability of these plants. The Nation's experience with commercializing nuclear power has demonstrated that early attention to these matters is essential to preclude later delays. The report continually refers to a production program which "chooses" or "commits" to synthetic fuels. Such choices, as we see it, are to be made by the Nation, not today, but at a later date. The Synthetic Fuels Commercialization Program is designed to provide a needed meaningful basis for that decision, not to preempt it.

The draft GAO report compares the costs of synthetic fuels with today's price of imported crude oil and today's regulated price of natural gas. We believe the price of synthetic fuel products should be compared with the price of future alternatives against which they will compete beginning in the late 1980's. They sould also be compared with products that will realistically compete in the end use markets which they are likely to serve. For example, synthetically produced gas from coal should be compared with alternatives to natural gas such as Alaskan gas, LNG (now priced at about \$3 per million Btu) and gas made from petroleum products, as well as higher priced depleting domestic conventional resources. When these comparisons are made, one finds that these other alternatives to natural gas are projected to be equally expensive and even more expensive in the case of gasification of petroleum products which i: already occurring in the U.S. While over the next

20 years some substitution for natural gas will occur among electric utilities and large industrial-users, we see no way in which these conversions can be assured to be large enough to offset a steady or rising demand for liquids and gaseous fuels and a steadily declining domestic supply.

In Chapter 5, we found the comparisons of alternative Federal financial incentives to lack objectivity and to be without a systematic basis for comparison. For example, the incentive analysis did not contain criteria against which the incentives were compared. Furthermore, although advantages and disadvantages were cited for some incentives, in the case of loan quarantees the disadvantages were cited without noting some of the major advantages. Also in the case of tax incentives which were later recommended in the report for accelerating the introduction of conservation technologies, the report did not cite any major disadvantages, not the least of which is the permanent status tax subsidies generally assume and the general failure of tax incentives to be focused on individual projects. We continue to believe that in many situations where capital availability and project scale relative to the sponsor's net worth are the major financing problems, that loan guarantees are the most effective, efficient, and least costly financial tool available to the Government.

Finally, we believe that the draft GAO report is so substantially lacking in analysis and information supportive to its conclusions, that publication of the report would only serve to confuse and further obfuscate the issues discussed. Furthermore, the publication of the report in anything near its present form will be damaging to the early implementation of our needed energy supply programs.

My staff has transmitted more detailed concerns regarding the report in the nature of factual, editorial and judgmental material.
