BACKGROUND CONGRESSMEN RINALDO AND FENWICK

Congressmen Rinaldo and Fenwick will be travelling from Andrews AFB to Morristown, New Jersey.

CONGRESSMAN MATT RINALDO: He represents New Jersey's 12 District, and was first elected to Congress in 1972. The 44-year-old bachelor from Union reportedly is interested in a statewide race. There are three GOP House members and 12 Democrats in the New Jersey Delegation.

Rinaldo, a Catholic, served in the New Jersey State Senate, where he authored a State revenue sharing law.

Rinaldo's district encompasses Union County, which includes the cities of Elizabeth and Plainfield. It is a predominatly suburban area. Rinaldo won his seat when GOP Rep. Florence Dwyer retired. He generally is considered a liberal.

CONGRESSWOMAN MILLICENT FENWICK: She won her first term in 1974 to replace retiring GOP veteran Peter Frelinghuysen in New Jersey's 5th District. The district is a bedroom community for New York City. It ranks 11th in income among the country's 435 Congressional district.

Mrs. Fenwick is divorced, has two children and eight grandchildren. She began her political career in 1969 when she was elected to the New Jersey Assembly.

She is 66 years old. She attended the Foxcroft School in Middleburg, Virginia, Columbia University and the New School for Social Research. For a number of years, she was an associate editor of the Conde Nast Publications, which publishes Vogue among other magazines. She smokes a pipe.

This designers' showhouse, "Giralda - A Mansion in May", will be formally opened at a Patrons' Party Saturday evening, May 1 with 800 guests in attendance. On Sunday, May 2 the mansion will be open to the general public with a spectacular exhibit of some fifty antique Rolls Royces and Bentleys on display. There will also be musical entertainment by the popular singing group, "The Monday Nighters".

Proceeds from "Giralda - A Mansion in May", sponsored by The Woman's Association of Morristown Memorial Hospital, will benefit the Hospital. In 1974 The Woman's Association presented "Upton Pyne - A Mansion in May". It received national recognition as one of the finest showhouses ever presented. Over 30,000 people visited Upton Pyne which netted \$135,000 for the Hospital. St. Hubert's Giralda:

animal shelter founded in 1939
now handles and offers for "adoption" 2400 small animals annually.
serves as a pound for 9 municipalities
patrols some 90 miles in Morris County, has 3 animal ambulances.
model facility with dispensary, immaculate indoor & outdoor runs
large lecture room where ongoing educational programs are held.
16-yr. old "Bert", liver-and-white English pointer, lives there
and represents the last of Mrs. Dodge's breeding stock.

Upon opening this shelter for strays, Mrs. Dodge said: To this unhappy segment of dogdom, I now give top priority of my time & strength.

Mrs. Dodge not only dedicated a great part of her life to welfare of animals but also turned her property over to animal life:

A carefully propogated herd of deer (numbering up to 350) was free to wander estate. Birds took refuge in a sanctuary Wild ducks and geese frequent visitors to protected, fenced-in pond.

Giralda Farms, the fabled estate that belonged to the late Geraldine Rockefeller Dodge, has been selected by The Woman's Association of Morristown Memorial Hospital for their 1976 fund raiser, Mansion in May, a designers' showhouse. Morristown Memorial, located in Morristown, New Jersey, is a 541-bed, non-profit, teaching hospital with a staff of 300 physicians, 1200 employees and 1600 in-hospital volunteers.

Fund raising is not a new venture for The Woman's Association. Over the past five years the Association (noted for its innovative and popular fund raisers) has donated approximately \$800,000 to the Hospital from various fund raising events. The Hospital was, in fact, started by women in 1893 and women were solely responsible for its financial support until 1921, when the Community Chest was formed. Presently, the Association is also responsible for the staffing and managing of three shops, providing aid for in-hospital services and sponsoring scholarships for students pursuing medical careers.

In 1974, The Woman's Association presented Upton Pyne Mansion in May, an event that attracted some 30,000 visitors to the mansion situated on the 200-acre Pyne estate in Bernardsville, New Jersey. Some four thousand area residents volunteered their services to help make the showhouse the tremendous success it was. Upton Pyne netted \$135,000 for the Hospital.

Upton Pyne had thirty-five decorated areas and featured such prominent designers as David Barrett, Angelo Donghia, Sister Parish, Mario Buatta, Kevin McNamara, Richard Neas and Charles Dear. It received nationwide recognition as one of the finest showhouses ever presented.

"Giralda - A Mansion in May" is expected to attract even greater attention. An estate of 304 magnificently groomed acres, situated in an easily accessible location in Madison, New Jersey, this showhouse promises to be a spectacular event. Formal gardens, flower beds, a seven-acre vegetable garden and magnificent specimens of unusual trees are found on the property. The 35-room Elizabethan style manor house was built in 1893 and purchased by the Dodges in 1911. Mrs. Dodge lived there until her death in 1973.

"Giralda - A Mansion in May" will not only enable the visitor to see the designers' exciting ideas of the Seventies, but will also allow him to see one of the few remaining estates from a by-gone era.
