My dear Mrs. Ford:

On behalf of the Cape Cod Hospital I wish to extend an invitation to you to honor by your presence the occasion of the corner-stone laying of the new addition to the Hospital.

The Cape Cod Hospital is recognized nationally for its efforts to plan for the health care needs of the community it serves with emphasis on controlling costs without sacrificing quality or availability of care. Our decision to build came only after an exhaustive, four year study which revealed that there was no alternative. We have been active in the development and expansion of emergency medical services, ambulatory care centers, a total cancer treatment program involving six area hospitals, prevention and health maintenance programs and a coordinated system of care through affiliation. We believe in the ability of the private sector and are proud of what we have been able to accomplish without the use of tax dollars.

A visit from you to Cape Cod seems appropriate for several reasons. The problems of this Hospital are unique because of the tremendous population fluctuation, geography and age mix of the area it serves. There are 127,000 permanent residents, 17% of whom are over sixty-five. In the summer months the population increases to 500,000-1,000,000 people. There is a high incidence of accidents related to vacation activity with corresponding demands for service and we believe the design of our new addition is most progressive in responding to these needs. A visit from you to the Cape Cod Hospital at this time would convey an expression of interest in the services being rendered by community hospitals throughout the country.

A special, informal, recognition dinner for those who are working so hard to raise the funds for this building addition is scheduled for August 20th. However, with the demands of your schedule, we realize this may not be an occasion which could be combined with the corner-stone laying. The beauty on Cape Cod in September is widely recognized and reflected by the large number of visitors which continues through the fall, so a later date would also be appropriate to consider.

AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY ANNOUNCES NEW ANNUAL MEDIA AWARDS PROGRAM

The American Cancer Society today announced the establishment of an annual Media Awards program for the best newspaper and magazine articles and radio and television programs dealing with the subject of cancer. The first awards will cover the period April 1, 1975 through August 31, 1976 and will be presented at a luncheon at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City on Wednesday, December 1, 1976.

The awards program is made possible by a special grant from Mrs. Enid A. Haupt, a member of the Society's Board. The awards consist of vermeil trophies specially designed by Tiffany & Co.

Dr. Benjamin F. Byrd, President of the Society, announced the new awards program. He said: "The Society recognizes the increasingly important role played by media in educating the public about cancer — its causes, prevention, treatment and control. The Society wishes both to honor those who have produced outstanding efforts in the field and to stimulate and encourage media to create effective and informative articles and programs about this disease.

"Since 1913, the American Cancer Society has sought to inform and educate the American public about cancer and the importance of early detection, diagnosis and treatment. Through such efforts, tens of thousands of lives have been saved each year. As research and treatment methods progress and improve, additional lives will be saved.

"The media have played a major role in increasing public awareness of cancer. Through extensive reporting on research and clinical advances, feature and dramatic presentations of the rehabilitation of cancer patients, and documentaries and articles on ways to protect oneself against this disease, public participation and understanding are at an all time high. The conquest of cancer is one of our nation's priorities. The involvement of the public and its intensive and spirited concern is due, in large part, to the members of the press, magazine, radio and television industry."



There will be sixteen awards in categories which include print media (magazines, daily and weekly newspapers, syndicates and wire services); Network Radio (spot announcements, general programs); Local Radio (spot announcements, general programs, continuing overall effort); Network Television (series, special, personality, news/documentaties) and Local Television (personality, specials, news/documentaries).

Entries will be judged on the basis of three criteria: accuracy, originality and effectiveness. (Entries must be submitted to the Society by October 1, 1976). Awards recipients will be invited to attend the December 1 luncheon as guests of the American Cancer Society.







Patricia Varie's 10-part series titled *The Biology of Cancer* is a splendid in-depth report, written in popular style, of case histories and interviews with specialists which summarize the current knowledge and understanding of cancer as it was presented for health professionals in a 15-week lecture series at California State University.

NEWSPAPER SERIES

The New York Daily News

Edward Edelson's three-part series titled *Triggers of Cancer: The Grim List Is Growing* presents evidence that most cancer is caused indirectly or directly by substances in the environment. He discusses the complexities of studying environmental cancer, the current state of research and its social and economic repercussions.

MAGAZINES

Harper's

The Anti-Social Cell is a cover story and special section of 15 articles documenting what we know and don't know about the origins and cure of cancer. Two editors devoted three months to researching and compiling this outstanding collection of facts, opinions, statistics, definitions, and reports from authoritative sources.

Newsweek

What Causes Cancer? is a comprehensive report by medical editor Matt Clark and staff reporters on possible causes of the increasing cancer-death rate, current statistics on cancer deaths, allocation of cancer research funds, and the increasing concern that cancer may be a man-made disease stemming from certain foods, drugs and the environment.

RADIO

WSB Radio Atlanta

WSB is committed to a continuing educational and informational effort on cancer. 1976 programming included a 55-minute documentary on seven warning signals of cancer, a special feature on laryngectomy, and anti-smoking alerts.

WJMA Radio Orange, Virginia

Anti-smoking week at WJMA involved cooperation with the local middle school. Students researched, wrote and broadcast 30-second spots. Listener attention and program effectiveness were very high because of the children's participation.

WCBS Radio New York

Newsman Art Athens of WCBS conducted a four-week on-air stop smoking clinic, preceded by a 10-part series on why people stay with the cigarette habit. The stop smoking kit offered to listeners drew 10,000 requests.

LOCAL TELEVISION

KDFW-TV Dallas

"Breast Cancer: An Ounce of Prevention" was a five-part series broadcast on five consecutive late evening newscasts. Later in the year an early evening 30-minute special incorporated the same information, including instruction on self-examination. A pamphlet offer generated 3,000 requests.

WBBM-TV Chicago

WBBM-TV's two-week "Cancer Awareness Campaign" was an allout effort involving participation of all of the station's locally produced programs. Included were a series on living with cancer, a profile of a cancer counseling service, interviews, editorials and spot announcements.

WSFA-TV Montgomery, Alabama

"Colostomy — A Necessary Nuisance" was a special program initiated and hosted by Loretta Bacon who recognized the fear surrounding this subject. Surgical and post-surgical procedures were described and colostomy patients interviewed in this program aimed at fostering candor and acceptance.

WNET-TV New York

The Robert MacNeil Report nightly newscast explored in depth the subject of cancer research progress, focusing both on mounting cancer statistics and the increasing ability to manage the disease, especially with early diagnosis. A second program discussed the pros and cons of mammography.

NETWORK TELEVISION

Children's Television Workshop

"Feeling Good," a health series on PBS, emphasized individual responsibility for maintaining good health. In a program on breast cancer, host Dick Cavett interviewed Julia Child about her mastectomy and the fear which often deters early detection. In a second program, he emphasized the increase in smoking among women and teenage girls and discussed ways to quit.

PBS Documentary

"Why Me?", a documentary on breast cancer, followed a woman who has found a lump in her breast, her feelings before surgery and when she learns its outcome. Ten other women candidly described their physical and emotional adjustments to mastectomy. The program's goal was to present clinical facts about breast cancer with warmth and understanding.

CBS News

CBS Reports: "The American Way of Cancer" was an hour-long documentary investigating whether our rapidly increasing cancer rate may be the result of American technology which has produced cancercausing agents like asbestos, arsenic, pesticides and certain food additives. The program suggested that the technology which inadvertently produced the American way of cancer is also capable of reducing this epidemic.
