Mrs. Ford Receives Doctors of Laws Degree

First Lady Betty Ford was honored Sunday by the University of Michigan. The university cited her for what it termed her courage and compassion and outspoken commitment to the highest standards of personal and community life.

President Ford watched as his wife received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from his alma mater in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

The President and his wife, along with two of their four children, stopped in Ann Arbor en route to a two-week skiing vacation in Vail, Colorado.

In brief remarks accepting her degree, Mrs. Ford said she and President Ford, who will be leaving the White House on January 20th, feel like graduates.

Mrs. Ford said: "With this wonderful new degree I certainly hope I will be successful with the Equal Rights Amendment I've always championed." (NBC)

She added, "We believe the best is yet to be for us and for this country. And we will be working to achieve that hope for all America." (NBC)

The degree was bestowed by University President Robben Fleming. He said that Mrs. Ford "exemplifies today's independent woman, expressing her views honestly and forcefully." He said she had combined "an assertive position on women's rights with the dedication to family values and ties."

The University citation said: "Your style and substance have earned the admiration of a nation."

Simon Predicts Oil Cartel Collapse

Treasury Secretary William Simon said Sunday the Middle East oil cartel is sure to collapse eventually, and the only question is when the breakup will occur.

Simon said on NBC's Meet the Press he was "extremely pleased" that Saudi Arabia and the United Arab emirates have decided to raise oil prices only half as much as other members of the Organization of Oil Producing and Exporting Countries.

Asked if the split OPEC decision on price increases signaled the breakup of the oil cartel, Simon replied: "I wouldn't be that near-term optimistic, but I've often said it's not a matter of whether the OPEC cartel would break up, but when."

He said the cartel "will break up faster" if the United States encourages oil independence by decontrolling domestic prices to encourage exploration and development by U.S. firms.

He also said the country is "in the midst of a balanced, healthy economic expansion that has been underway since April, 1975." The .1 percent increase in unemployment last month represented "a pause" in expansion rather than being a sign of growing recession, he said.

Simon defended his costly trips abroad using government planes and taking along about 40 staff members in the final months of the Ford Administration. He said the trips were strictly for government business and the support crew was needed, partly to consult with their counterparts abroad.

Simon again indicated he does not wish to be named Republican National Committee chairman, especially if it is a fulltime job. But he declined to specifically rule himself out of consideration. AP, UPI, NBC's Meet the Press -- (12/19/76)

Carter to Name Bell. Attorney General

President-elect Jimmy Carter is expected on Monday to name a fellow Georgian, former U.S. Circuit Judge Griffin Bell, as Attorney General and Duke University economist Juanita Kreps as his first woman Cabinet member.

The Carter staff announced Sunday night that the President-elect would name three Cabinet members at an 11 a.m. EST news conference Monday.

It was believed that Dr. Kreps, a Labor economist and vice president for general administration at Duke, would be named Commerce Secretary, or less likely, Labor Secretary.

"Any statements have to come from the Plains headquarters," Dr. Kreps said by telephone from her home in Durham, N.C.

Dr. Kreps' nomination would ease the pressure on Carter, who has been criticized for not naming any women to high positions. After attending church in Plains, Carter refused to comment on the expected choice of Bell.

Bell was playing golf Sunday but it was learned he had arranged to come to Plains Monday morning. He told Atlanta reporters any announcement would have to come from Carter, but he acknowledged discussing the Attorney General's job with the President-elect.

"We've discussed lots of things, including jobs and problems," Bell said. "That's about as far as I can go... There's been so much speculation already. Somebody asked if I'd go on the Supreme Court the other day. I said 'yes, but there aren't any vacancies.'"

One of Bell's law partners is Charles Kirbo, Carter's confidant and senior advisor.

Bell was appointed to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals by John F. Kennedy in 1961. He resigned last March 1, complaining at the time that federal judges are overworked and more julgships at higher pay are needed.

But Bell gained considerable experience with civil rights enforcement as a judge on the circuit covering the deep South in the 1960s. His appointment as Attorney General might be a sign Carter will beef up civil rights enforcement.

Judy Woodruff reported the Bell appointment could cause some problems for Carter since Bell was involved in some de-

cisions which made civil rights activists unhappy. "What bothers them most is his role in upholding an Atlanta school desegregation plan that did not call for busing," Woodruff said. (NBC)

A spokesman for the NAACP told Woodruff that the selection of Bell is a slap in the face for the black community that Bell was even considered. The National Bar Association, a group of black lawyers has reportedly already told Carter that Bell is unacceptable to them. Other civil rights activists say they are disappointed. They say although they expect Congress to approve the nomination, they say it will be looked at very carefully, Woodruff reported.

Carter reportedly would rather have named a black to head the Justice Department but he was known to have decided against at least three he was seriously considering: Rep. Barbara Jordan, attorney Patricia Harris and federal Judge Leon Higgenbotham, Woodruff said. AP, UPI, NBC -- (12/19/76)

. Blumenthal Discusses Unemployment, Kissinger

Treasury Secretary-designate W. Michael Blumenthal says he considers an unemployment rate of more than 5 percent "unacceptable," according to an interview in the current issue of Newsweek magazine.

In a concurrent interview, with Time magazine, Blumenthal said outgoing Secretary of State Kissinger "still doesn't know much about foreign economic policy" -one reason Europe and Japan feel it is difficult to do business with the United States.

Asked by Newsweek what he considered a "reasonable" rate of unemployment, Blumenthal replied, "Nothing is reasonable and anything over 5 percent is unreasonable." He added, "I simply do not accept the notion that there has to be a trade-off (between unemployment and inflation) or that relatively full employment can only be achieved at the cost of a high inflation rate.

"With a cautious, well-framed economic program and a collaboratife effort in which we get labor and management to understand what we're trying to do, and enlist their help, we can make progress."

He also said for some time, "there has been a feeling in Europe and Japan that it's difficult to do business with the U.S. That's why, among other things, the trade negotiations in Geneva, which were started three years ago, are stalled."

He blamed Kissinger for part of the problem. "I think he feels the way General (Charles) de Gaulle did: This is something to be left to the quartermasters," Blumenthal said.

"Foreign economic policy has been a kind of stepchild in Washington to be kicked around," he added. "There has been no leadership."

On the subject of relations with the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, Blumenthal said, "The OPEC countries need us as much as we need them and we do not need to speak in terms of leverage or confrontation. I don't think, we should ever be afraid to defend our interests clearly and forcefully," he said, "but in an interrelated world no one gains from chaos, dissension and waving a big stick. If we mean what we say and say what we mean -- and above all if we develop our own energy policy on a long-term basis and have the American people behind it -- we can find constructive ways of getting along with OPEC," he said. Mayors Happy with Carter Selections

The mayors of Newark and Detroit expressed confidence Sunday in Jimmy Carter's process for selecting top Administration officials and said they don't expect him to have any problem appointing blacks.

The two black mayors, Kenneth Gibson of Newark and Coleman Young of Detroit, spoke favorably of Carter's transition activities in an interview on CBS-TV's Face the Nation program.

"It's refreshing for me to hear a candidate saying the same thing after the election as he did before," said Young. "He has been very consistent."

Gibson said Carter struck him "as far above what I had expected" at a recent meeting of the U.S. Conference of Mayors where proposals to aid the nation's cities were discussed.

Young, who has asked not to be considered for appointment to head HEW, said he thinks Carter needs to break away from the concept of "black positions," or "women's positions. Already, President-elect Carter has broken a mold, a tendency to look at certain Cabinet posts as most appropriate to blacks," he said, pointing to his nomination of Rep. Andrew Young as U.N. Ambassador. Asked if a Dunlop Labor appointment would be acceptable to him, Young replied: "He certainly wouldn't rank high on my list as a Nixon retread." AP, UPI -- (12/19/76)

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Reporters Assess Cabinet Appointees

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Journalists on "Agronsky and Company and "Washington Week in Review" commented on President-elect Carter's Cabinet choices.

All agreed one of Carter's toughest decisions will be who to name as Secretary of Defense -- James Schlesinger, whom the Jackson wing of the party favors and who has greatly impressed Carter; Harold Brown, who Carter is said to favor; or Paul Warnke, not mentioned as often as the other two.

Joseph Kraft said the three men being considered are not that different and that the attempt to categorize them is not healthy.in that.Carter could name someone other than the three, one who is not nearly as qualified. (Ag.&Co.)

Carl Rowan said he did not think Carter would pick Schlesinger as it would make the President-elect look too "anti-Soviet," therefore, Brown will probably be the next Secretary of Defense. Kraft disagreed, saying Schlesinger could be useful if Carter could control him. (Ag.&Co.)

Comments were varied on the selection of Andrew Young to the post of U.N. ambassador.

Young has taken on quite a gamble, Rowan said. Young said recently, Rowan quoted, "Here's how these white folks operate in the United States. They send Pat Moynihan to the U.N. to wreck everything and then they ask a black guy to go pick up the pieces." Will Young have to read the same material, written by "some faceless bureaucrat" that Moynihan and Pearl Bailey read? If so, Rowan said, he will be run out of New York. (Ag.&Co.)

Next to being vice president, ambassador to the U.N. is the most worthless job in town, James J. Kilpatrick added. Sending Young to the U.N. may not do much for the U.N. or for Young. It is sort of a dead end for political careers, Kilpatrick said.

Kilpatrick said he hopes Zbigniew Brzezinski will get "a good ghost writer." Kilpatrick said he's tried to read magazine articles Brzezinski has written but couldn't tell where he stands. (Ag. &Co.)

It has been a frustrating search to find women and blacks in the Cabinet, Kraft and Rowan agreed. Many have refused a Cabinet position because of present position, financial difficulties or personal problems. However, Carter will find himself a black and several women for Cabinet positions, Rowan predicted. (Ag. &Co.)

No black American has ever held any job of consequence in the Defense Department. Many blacks are saying, "Don't offer me a job in HUD or HEW. Let me go over there and say something about spending all that money for bombs and bullets," Rowan commented.

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Charles Corddry predicted that Carter could try to appease AFL-CIO by putting John Dunlop in as Labor Secretary, Brown as Defense Secretary to appease Carter himself, put a few women and blacks in the Cabinet and then find a job for Schlesinger. It is ironic, he added, that Carter may have to appease labor when he said he didn't owe anyone anything during the campaign. (Wash. Week)

Both Michael Blumethal and Charles Schultz are very capable, Eileen Shananan noted. Blumenthal is interesting as he has prompted corporate ethics programs among corporations. He also has said corporations shouldn't have to be secretive any more than the government should, Shananan said. (Wsh.Wk)

Women are quite upset that Carter had not yet named a women to his Cabinet. They will not be appeased by Carter making women undersecretaries of various departments, Shananan noted. (Wash. Wk.)

Brezhnev Celebrates Birthday

Leonid Brezhnev, celebrating his 70th birthday at a Kremlin ceremony attended by leaders of eight other Communist countries, said Sunday Soviet world influence is at an historic high because of the "profound peacefulness of our foreign policy."

The General Secretary of the Soviet Communist Party spoke during a ceremony in the Ornate Yekaterinsky Hall of the 19th century grand Kremlin Palace, where he was awarded his third Order of Lenin, second Gold Star Medal of a hero of the Soviet Union and the Arms of Honor, a sword bearing the state emblem in gold.

"Never before during all its history has our country enjoyed such prestige and influence in the world," Brezhnev declared. "This prestige, this influence are first of all a result of the profound peacefulness of our foreign policy."

Brezhnev cited the Soviet Union's struggle to eliminate the danger of war -- "first of all nuclear war" -- to achieve disarmament and the relaxation of international tension and to defend "the freedom and independence of peoples" and "the sovereign rights of states." AP, UPI, NBC -- (12/19/76)

Plane Hits Baltimore Stadium

A light plane buzzing Memorial Stadium crashed into the upper deck shortly after the Baltimore-Pittsburgh professional football playoff game Sunday, but the stands were empty and there were no reports of injuries to fans.

Baltimore police said the single engine Cherokee smashed into the stadium about 10 minutes after the fans had left. Police said the condition of the pilot or whether the plane carried any passengers was not immediately known.

Carter Chooses Andrus

President-elect Carter named Gov. Cecil Andrus of Idaho Saturday to become his secretary of interior. He called his fourth Cabinet choice "a tough, competent manager" with impeccable credentials as an environmentalist.

Carter said it was the only post for which he had never considered anybody but the man he chose. Andrus has won praise for his environmental policies while governor.

Andrus said, "It's exciting and I'm very pleased to be a part of the new Administration in America, particularly when our next President of the United States as personally being invovled in the protection of the heritage of America." (CBS)

At his fourth nationally broadcast news conference in five days, Carter said he was at work on plans to consolidate U.S. energy programs under one department, he said he had not decided on details, and was not ready to name a man to head the department.

There has been speculation that the job might go to former Defense Secretary Schlesinger. Carter praised Schlesinger's background, talent and intelligence, but would not say what position he might get. Schlesinger, a former chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, was in Plains to confer with the President-elect.

With eight children, Schlesinger is said to frown on a CIA head job because of the lower salary, Ed Bradley reported. (CBS)

Theodore Sorenson, special counsel for President Kennedy who is under consideration for CIA head also met with Carter saturday. On the subject of intelligence, Carter told the news conference, "I think that the head of the intelligence community ought to be a strong and capable person, one who is able to draw together the different elements of data collection and presentation but I want to keep at least an adequate amount of diversity in sources of information. I would like to be the one to judge between two major, perhaps conflicting sources of information and not let some subordinate person, not even a very powerful head of the intelligence community make that choice for me." President Says Action Harms All

President Ford had denounced as "irresponsible" and shortsighted the decision by a majority of oil exporting nations to raise oil prices by 15 percent.

In a strongly worded statement Friday, Ford charged the majority of the OPEC with ignoring "the destructive consequences of their action," and said it should remind Americans "of the need to take urgent action" to conserve and develop energy resources. He praised Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates, which chose to raise their oil prices by only 5 percent.

"Unfortunately, however, the majority of OPEC members, citing artificial economic justifications and ignoring the destructive consequences of their actions, chose to take a course which can only be termed irresponsible," Ford said in a statement released by the White House.

President-elect Carter praised Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates for holding their oil price increase to 5 percent, but withheld comment on the 15 percent increase by the 11 other producers. Press Secretary Jody Powell said Carter "appreciates the statesmanlike actions of the Saudis and Emirates." AP, UPI, Networks -- (12/17/76)

Superports Approved by Coleman

Secretary Coleman announced Friday that he will approve licenses for two controversial superports in the Gulf of Mexico.

Coleman imposed a number of economic and environmental restrictions on two oil groups that have proposed constructing the offshore ports, requiring that access to the facilities be open to all shippers and that the companies agree in writing to assume all liability for any oil spills.

But the outgoing Transportation Secretary rejected pleas from the Federal Trade Commission and the Justice Dept. that he impose limits on "excess profits" that the two agencies said pedtroleum firms would earn from their investments in the two ports.

Coleman also rejected a proposal from city and port officials in Galveston, Tex., who have proposed building a publicly owned, onshore superport they said would be cheaper to construct.

The two proposals approved by Coleman were made by Seadock, Inc., for a superport 26 miles from Freeport, Tex., and Loop, Inc., for a similar facility 18 miles off Grand Isle, La. Use of the new ports -- which would be the first in the U.S. designed to handle huge tankers carrying imported oil -will lead to a 30 percent reduction in oil transport costs, Coleman said. Carter Meets More Cabinet Prospects

President-elect Carter met with more prospective Cabinet appointees Friday. Among them were Joan Manley, a vice president of Time, Inc., Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus, Lane Kirkland, AFL-CIO Secretary-Treasurer, and Juanita Kreps, vice president of Duke University. On her way to meet with the President-elect in Plains, Dr. Kreps said, "I'm very happy where I am." (CBS)

15% Boost Rejected by 2 Nations

Conservative oil giant Saudi Arabia broke with the oil cartel Friday and refused to go along with a lt percent price increase decread by 11 of the 13 members. The Saudis said they will lift all production ceilings to hold the price increase to 5 percent for the next year.

Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamani, the Saudi oil minister, predicted the ll members of the OPEC who voted for the higher increase will be unable to apply their increase.

"I expect the increase in the world's price of crude won't be more than 5 percent," Yamani said.

But Iranian delegation chief Jamshid Amouzegar said the average increase -- taking into account the majority 15 percent increase, the 5 percent increase by Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates, plus their one-third share of the OPEC production -would amount to 8 or 8.5 percent.

Yamani said he doubts that the higher prices approved by the other members will hurt the world economy because those prices will not hold up on the open market.

. Yamani said, "What will happen is this: If they insist on this 10 percent and 15 percent increase, their production will drop very sharply and our production of course will go up and I think that our prices will prevail." (NBC)
