Mr. Tunney (for himself and Senator Randolph) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Labor and Public Welfare

A BILL

To provide for the establishment of model programs for displaced homemakers, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 That this Act may be cited as the "Displaced Homemakers"
- 4 Equal Opportunity Act".
- 5 FINDINGS AND PURPOSE
- 6 SEC. 2. (a) The Congress hereby finds that—
- 7 (1) homemakers are an unrecognized and unpaid
- 8 segment of the national work force who make an invalu-
- 9 able contribution to the welfare and economic stability
- 10 of the Nation, but who receive no health, retirement,
- or unemployment benefits as a result of their labor;



1	(2) an increasing number of homemakers are dis-

2	SEC. 4. (a) The Secretary is authorized to establish
3	either directly or by way of grant, contract, or other arrange-
4	ment, a maximum of thirty model programs of outreach,
