I have just received from the printers the poem that each child will receive at the Easter Egg Roll. I thought you would like to have several copies.


Also enclosed is the badge which the "winners" of the egg-rolling contests will receive.

The Easter Egg Roll is a tradition for young people which may go back to Dolley Madison's time. We know that children

gathered on the grounds of the Capitol to roll eggs in the mid-19th Century. By the 1870's, most likely during the Rutherford B. Hayes administration, the Easter Egg Roll had moved to the White House grounds, where it has been held with few interruptions each year since.

By the end of the 19th Century, games known as "egg picking," "toss and catch" and "egg croquet" were firmly established. "Egg rolling" was the favorite, however. Observers reported eggs by the hundreds rolling down the hills of the grounds, with children often right behind. (The first one to the bottom won.)

Over the years, thousands of people -- including children and grandchildren of Presidents -- have participated in this Easter celebration. Today, you will be entertained by bands and clowns, and in the best White House tradition, there will be an egg rolling contest. Good luck! The President and I hope you will have a most enjoyable day.
