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

BACKGROUND

SOCIETY FOR THE FAMILY OF MAN DINNER

You are accepting for the President the 1975 Family of Man Award given by the Society which is a division of the Council of Churches of the City of New York. The Council includes 1,700 New York City churches with a representative Board of Directors which voted three times in successive meetings in the spring to give the Award to the President. While this vote was unanimous on all three occasions, recent events have caused some consternation on the part of an element of the Council Membership. Due to the diverse nature of the group, protests and demonstrations are an accepted part of each year's dinner program.

CANCER DETECTION CENTER

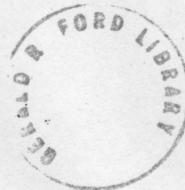
On Friday, you will join Johnny Bench for a tour of the Guttman Institute which specializes in early detection of breast cancer. Dr. Phillip Strax, whose book I have given you, will guide you



through the institute and mobil unit which is one of 27 nationwide sponsored by the Federal Government and the American Cancer Society.

AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY DINNER

You are Guest of Honor at the annual Award's Dinner of the American Cancer Society, which will feature awards to Dr. Pierre Denniox of Paris, Frank Rauscher, Director of National Cancer Institute and Ann Landers. Johnny Bench, Catcher for the World Champion Cincinnati Reds and Chairman of Athletes against Cancer and Flip Wilson, 1976 Cancer Crusade Chairman, will also be featured.



BACKGROUND on Guttman Clinic

The Guttman Clinic, 200 Madison Ave., New York, is a breast cancer diagnostic screening clinic in existence since 1968. It is the prototype for 27 breast cancer diagnostic centers across the country being funded jointly by the federal government and the American Cancer Society.

The Guttman Clinic provides comprehensive diagnostic tests free of charge. It is currently serving about 250 people a day. The testing includes palpation (physical examination of the breast); mammography (x-ray); thermography (heat pattern); and detailed patient history.

Dr. Philip Strax

Dr. Strax has been Medical Director of the Guttman Institute since 1968. He is also director of Radiology for LaGuardia Hospital and is Associate Clinical Professor at New York Medical College. He is also a consultant in radiology for several New York hospitals.

Born in 1909, Dr. Strax was graduated from the New York University School of Medicine at age 18 and became a doctor at age 22. He is on the National Cancer Institute's National Breast Cancer Task Force and serves on a similar task force for the American Cancer Society.

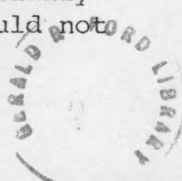

COMMENTS: President Ford will receive the Society for the Family of Man Gold Medallion for his outstanding leadership as President of the United States during one of the most critical periods in our history. Because he is unable to attend the Family of Man Awards Dinner in New York on November 6th, he has asked Mrs. Ford to attend and accept the award for him. The Dinner is sponsored by the Council of Churches of New York representing 1700 churches and is attended by the key religious and business leaders of the metropolitan New York area. Mr. Maurice Granville, Chairman of Texaco, Inc., is Chairman of the dinner; Governor Raymond P. Shafer, of the Vice President's staff, is President of the Board of Guardians of the Society for the Family of Man; and Reverend Kenneth Folkes is President of the Council of Churches of New York. The group, of course, was initially disappointed when they learned that the President could not attend.

BACKGROUND

WASHINGTON, D. C. DEPARTURE

You and Mrs. Ford and Susan will depart the South Grounds via helicopter en route Andrews AFB at 7:55 a.m. After being greeted by representatives of each of the countries that you will visit, you proceed directly to the airport stand located in front of the press area to deliver departure remarks. Susan and Mrs. Ford and the country representatives will stand behind you. At the conclusion of your statement, you will board Air Force One and depart en route Alaska. (Flying Time: 7 hours, 30 minutes. Time Change: -5 hours)

Your guests aboard Air Force One will be Senator Gravel, Congressman Young, Mr. and Mrs. James Lynn and Mr. Frank Zarb.

FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, ARRIVAL

Air Force One will arrive at Eielson AFB, Fairbanks, Alaska, at 10:45 a.m. local time. The plane will be towed into a large hangar where the arrival ceremony will take place. You will be met by Governor and Mrs. Jay Hammond (R-Alaska); Senator and Mrs. Ted Stevens (R-Alaska); LGEN James E. Hill, Commander, Alaska Air Command; Borough Mayor and Mrs. John Carlson (I); Mayor and Mrs. Harold Gilliam (I) Fairbanks; Mr. and Mrs. Edward L. Patton, President, Alyeska Pipeline Service Company, and Colonel and Mrs. Philip Shepherd, Base Commander, Eielson AFB.



You and Mrs. Ford will be escorted to a platform and, after a brief statement by Col. Shepherd and Governor Hammond, you will be introduced by Senator Stevens for remarks. Following your remarks, you will have an opportunity to greet some of the crowd, then escort Mrs. Ford to her motorcade. She will proceed directly to the guest quarters on the Base. You and your party will change into arctic weather gear for your tour of the pipeline. Susan will ride in another car in the motorcade throughout the pipeline tour.

Mr. Ed Patton, President, Alyeska, will ride with you in your limousine during the first leg of the drive to the pipeline.

TRANS-ALASKA PIPELINE VISIT

You will make two stops during the 40-minute drive to Pump Station #8 to view pipeline welding, x-ray quality control and arctic pipeline construction equipment. At each of the two stops, you will switch guests in your limousine. The guest on the second leg will be Mr. Frank Moolin and for the third leg Mr. Peter DeMay, both Alyeska senior officials.

At the Pump Station, you will take a walking tour of the area including the air pressure supported equipment maintenance facility. You will join the work gang in the mess hall for coffee and doughnuts and have a chance to shake hands and talk with several of the employees. There are no planned stops on the way back from the Pump Station to Eielson AFB.

Additional background material on the Pipeline prepared by Frank Zarb is attached at TAB A.

Upon your return to the Air Force Base, you will remove the arctic weather gear and join Mrs. Ford on board Air Force One for your 50-minute flight to Anchorage, Alaska. In addition to those who accompanied you from Washington, your guests will be Governor and Mrs. Hammond and Senator and Mrs. Stevens.



ANCHORAGE ARRIVAL

Upon arrival at Elmendorf AFB, Anchorage, you will board your limousine with Mrs. Ford and Susan for the 10-minute drive to the Anchorage Westward Hotel. You will arrive at your suite at 3:30 p.m. and will have 3 hours personal time until 6:30 p.m. when former Governor Wally Hickel will join you for a 10-minute meeting in your suite. During this personal time, you may wish to have dinner since there will be no opportunity to eat at the Stevens' party.

GOP MEETING

At 6:40 p.m., you will depart your suite for the Turnagain Room to attend a private 30-minute meeting with approximately 30 members of the Alaska Republican Party. Following this meeting, you return to your suite for 10-minutes personal time. Background material on the Alaska GOP is enclosed.

SENATOR STEVENS' BIRTHDAY PARTY

At 7:30 p.m., Senator and Mrs. Stevens will arrive at your suite to escort you and Mrs. Ford to the Grand Ballroom to attend the Birthday Party. It has been a custom to hold this party every other year. The format is a reception/buffet for approximately 750 guests. After mingling with the guests for 25-minutes, you and Mrs. Ford will join Senator and Mrs. Stevens on the platform. Following Senator Stevens' introduction, you will deliver remarks (live local television) and conclude by requesting the audience to join with you in singing "Happy Birthday" to Senator Stevens. You and Mrs. Ford will depart immediately for your suite and remain overnight. (Non-partisan event - ticket costs covers expenses only)

Your first commitment Sunday morning will be the 7:45 a.m. departure from the suite en route Elmendorf AFB.

THE TRANS-ALASKA PIPELINE

Background

It is estimated by some authorities that there are 9.6 billion barrels of crude oil in the Prudhoe Bay area of the North Slope of Alaska which can be recovered using existing technology. This amounts to nearly one quarter of U.S. proven crude oil reserves. Moreover, the completion of the pipeline should provide a stimulus for additional exploration and development in this area with the possibility of significant new finds. The Alaskan oil will be shipped from Valdez to the West Coast for refining and distribution there or for further transport to crude deficient refineries along the Northern Tier. The North Slope oil will be a major supplement to our declining domestic production.

The Alyeska Pipeline Service Company is responsible for building, maintaining, and operating the Trans-Alaska Pipeline. The Company is owned by and is common agent for seven major oil companies and subsidiaries:

Project Description

The Trans-Alaska Pipeline, a 48-inch line which will carry crude oil from Prudhoe Bay on the North Slope of Alaska to the ice-free port of Valdez on the Prince William Sound, was begun in April 1974. It is projected that the project will become operational during the summer of 1977 with a capacity of 600,000 barrels per day. Operating capacity of 1.2 million barrels per day should be reached by late 1977. This will eventually be increased to 2 million barrels per day making it the largest privately financed construction project in history. In terms of its employment impact, the pipeline employed about 9,100 persons in construction crews in 1974 and is scheduled to employ a total of 14,200 in 1975 and 10,600 in 1976. About 450 persons will operate the pipeline system when it is completed.

*After the pipeline capacity is expanded, Sohio will transfer 15.84 percent of its own ownership to an affiliate which shall be a company incorporated in the U.S., and owned directly or indirectly by the British Petroleum Co., Ltd. This will leave Sohio with a post-expansion percentage in the system of 33.34 percent.

Technology

Construction of an 800-mile oil pipeline in the Alaskan Arctic climate and environment has obviously presented many unique technological problems, all of which are apparently being satisfactorily resolved. The most significant new technology required of the pipeline has been the need to elevate some 382 miles of the trunk of pilings above ground to prevent the hot oil within from thawing and damaging permanently frozen areas. Special techniques have also been applied to facilitate caribou crossings, river crossings, etc.

Present Status and Problem Areas

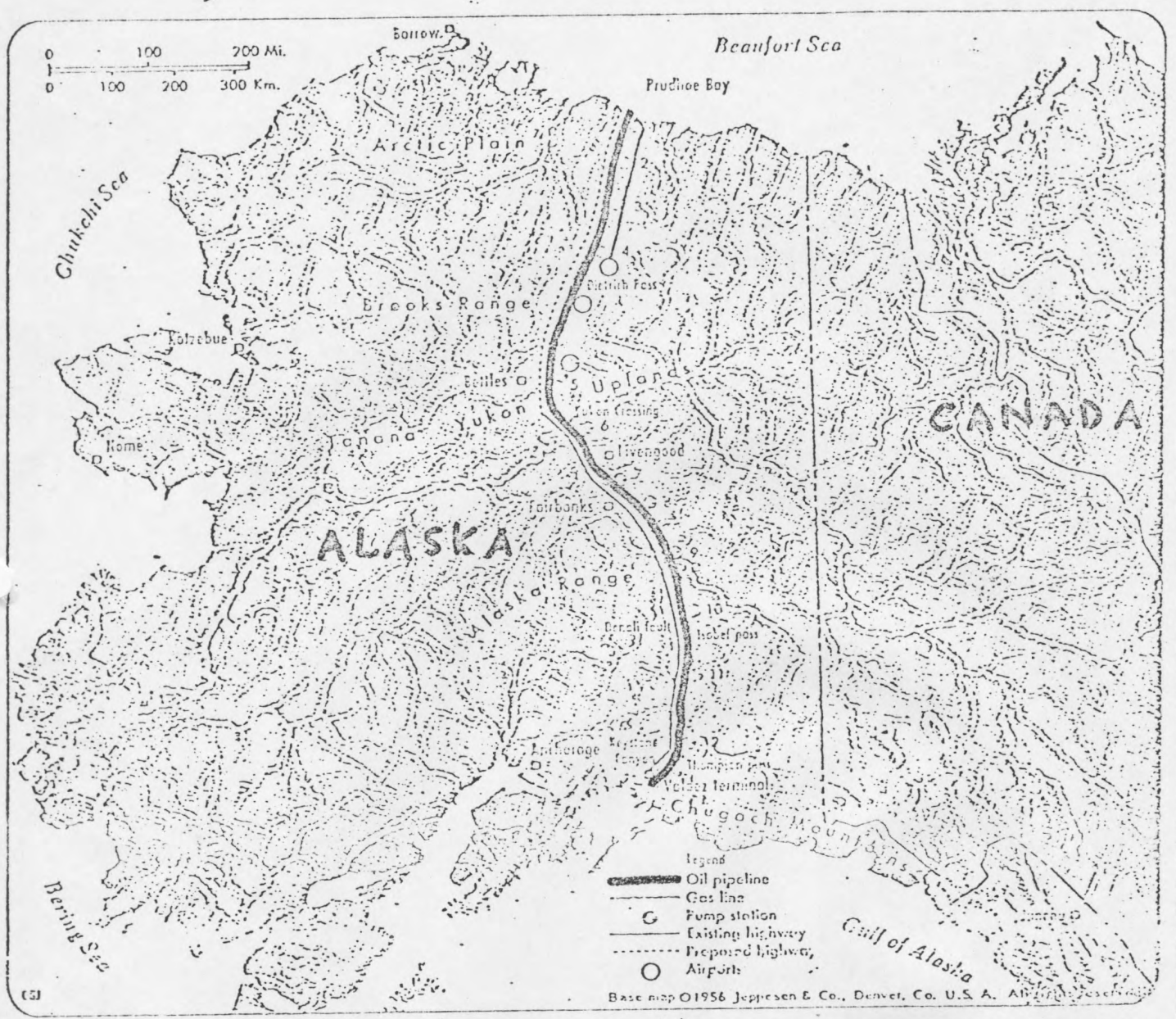
At the present time, the pipeline portion of the project, scheduled for completion in late 1976, is actually ahead of its construction schedule having reached nearly 50 percent of completion. The Valdez terminal and the nine pump stations required for initial operation of the pipeline, due to be finished by mid-1977, are some 19.6 percent and 16.7 percent complete, respectively. Alyeska is forecasting that all sections of the pipeline project will meet the scheduled start-up date of July 1, 1977.

During 1974, a shortage of certain materials required in construction of the pipeline threatened to cause delays. After being granted priority under the Defense Production Act, Alyeska was able to resume its planned construction schedule.

In August of this year, the temporary inability of a barge flotilla carrying equipment to get through the Bering Straits to the Arctic Ocean again threatened delays; but with the aid of several Coast Guard ice-breakers, the passage was negotiated.

At 7:45 a.m., You and Mrs. Ford and Susan will depart your suite and board the motorcade for the 10-minute drive to Elmendorf AFB. There is no departure ceremony and no remarks. The flight to Haneda International Airport, Tokyo, Japan will require 7 hours, 25 minutes. (Time Change: + 5 hours, less one day).

TOKYO, JAPAN, ARRIVAL

You will arrive at the Haneda International Airport at 10:30 a.m. local time. Foreign Minister Kiichi Miyazawa and Ambassador Hodgson and other officials will be on hand to greet you. You will proceed by foot to a VIP Lounge for a press photo and refreshments. When the press have departed, Ambassador Yukawa, Grand Master of Ceremonies of the Imperial Household, will deliver orally a message of greetings and best wishes from His Imperial Majesty. You may wish to give a brief response.

After 20-minutes in the VIP Lounge, you will be escorted to Air Force One where you will have 15-minutes personal time prior to departure.

The flight to Peking requires 4 hours, 30 minutes. (Time Change: - 1 hour)



PEKING ARRIVAL

Arrival in Peking will be at 3:00 p.m. local time. Chu Ch'uan-hsien, Director of Protocol, and Ambassador Bush will come aboard Air Force One to greet you and Mrs. Ford, then deplane. You and Mrs. Ford will proceed down the ramp together and be greeted by Vice Premier Teng Hsiao-Ping (Phonetic: dung) and Mrs. George Bush. Secretary Kissinger and Susan will follow.

The Vice Premier will escort you to greet the Chinese Official Party. Mrs. Ford will be accompanied by another PRC official and will follow. After the greeting, the Vice Premier will escort you to a position on the ramp for the Anthems. Following the Anthems, and accompanied by Vice Premier Teng, you will inspect the Honor Guard. You then greet a group of Chinese Ministers, Chinese officials who have visited the United States, third-country Mission Chiefs and USLO personnel.

The Vice Premier will accompany you for the 30-minute drive to your guest house. Mrs. Ford will ride in a separate vehicle.

En route, the motorcade will pass through Tien an Men Square. On the left in this large Square is the Museum of the Chinese History, the Monument of the People's Heroes and the Great Hall of the People. On the right is the Gate of Heavenly Peace. The Square occupies approximately 100 acres and lies south of the Forbidden City in the center of Peking. Several large mass demonstrations which were landmarks in the evolution of modern China took place here. On October 1, 1949, Chairman Mao hoisted the red flag here and proclaimed the People's Republic of China. The Gate of Heavenly Peace is an entrance to the Imperial Palaces and overlooks the Square from the north. The Monument to the People's Heroes is a massive granite obelisk 120 feet high.

When you arrive at the Guest House, you will proceed to the sitting room for brief refreshments with both Official Parties. After approximately 15 minutes, you and Mrs. Ford will escort the Vice Premier to his motorcade, then proceed to the Residence Quarters for 2 hours, 50 minutes personal time.



WELCOMING BANQUET

At 7:15 p.m., you and Mrs. Ford board the motorcade for the 10-minute drive to the Great Hall of the People for the Welcoming Banquet. You will proceed up the stairs of the Great Hall to a position where the Vice Premier will greet you and escort you to the foyer for a photo session with approximately 75 members of the Chinese and U.S. Official Parties, staff and USLO personnel.

Following the photo session, the Vice Premier will escort you and Mrs. Ford to the Great Hall where you will greet a group of dignitaries and take your seats at Table #1. At approximately an hour and 15-minutes into the dinner, and after two hot dishes, the Vice Premier will proceed to the microphone on the platform behind your table to deliver a toast. He will return to his place while the U.S. National Anthem is played, then he will move around Table #1 to toast individually you and Mrs. Ford and the other members of the U.S. party. He will likely do the same at the two tables to your left and right.

After the next hot dish, you will proceed to the stage to deliver your toast, then return to the table for the Chinese National Anthem. You then toast the Chinese officials at your table and then at the two tables on either side.

The dinner will conclude at approximately 10:00 p.m. You proceed directly back to your Guest House and remain overnight.

The Great Hall of the People is the meeting place of Party and National People's Congresses and frequently the site of small leadership groups. State banquets and most meetings between the Chinese leadership and foreign leaders are held here. During your visit, the Great Hall will be the site of the Welcome and Reciprocal banquets, a cultural soiree, and substantive meetings.

Construction of the building which contains more floor space than the former Imperial Palace took an amazing 10 months from the end of October 1958 to the end of August 1959 at the time of the Great Leap Forward. During each day of its construction, more than 14,000 people from various parts of China, including the Chinese leaders, worked on the project. # # # #

Chinese Customs and Etiquette

There are relatively minor differences between modern social usage in the PRC and more formal Western practice. Some traditional Chinese forms have carried over to the present, but they are often not evident, probably because the Chinese wish their guests to feel at ease. During the Peking visit, however, you may wish to observe the following points to avoid giving unconscious offense:

DO

-- The traditional way of toasting at banquets has changed somewhat: there is less emphasis on details, and much less actual drinking. In toasting, you may either raise your glass to your lips without drinking any wine, or take a small sip.

-- If one of the Chinese at your banquet table raises his wine glass to you, you should match the gesture, raising the glass to your lips and taking a sip if you wish; sometime thereafter, you should reciprocate the courtesy.

-- After his formal toast at the Chinese-hosted banquet, Vice Premier Teng will descend from the rostrum and toast you personally. He will clink glasses with you and sip from his. You should raise your glass to your lips and sip if you wish. He will then probably repeat the process with other Americans at the head table. He may also clink glasses with Americans at the one or two ranking tables nearby, toasting them collectively after doing so. After you complete your formal toast, you should follow Teng's lead, toasting first him, then other Chinese at the head table, then at other tables to which he has gone. At your return banquet, you will give the first



formal toast, and should then circulate as above. Teng will reciprocate.

-- Make the first move to rise from the table when you are the guest, and wait for the Chinese to do so at your banquet.

-- Make at least token gestures of granting precedence to Chinese counterparts in passing through doors, boarding automobiles, taking seats at banquet tables (as the guest, however, you will be expected to go first, and should acquiesce after making the necessary gesture).

-- Be precise about the use of titles when known (e.g. Mr. Vice Premier), since the Chinese do not freely substitute their equivalent of "Mr." for the titles of even low-ranking officials.

DON'T

-- Clink glasses with American members of your party.

-- Drink from the toasting glass of mao-t'ai or other wines except when toasting (other beverages will be provided for non-toast use).

-- Touch or put your arm around the shoulders of Chinese (especially women), some of whom may be offended by this friendly American gesture.

-- Beckon to Chinese with hand or arm gestures (this way of calling to someone is generally reserved for inferiors and children, and may be insulting to adult Chinese).

-- Stand with hands on hips or arms folded (these are traditional Chinese postures which still denote angry defiance and arrogance, respectively, to many Chinese).

BACKGROUND

OVERVIEW

You have 3 events scheduled for Tuesday: (1) In the morning, a Head-to-Head Meeting at the Great Hall of the People, (2) In the afternoon, a tour of the Temple of Heaven and (3) In the evening, the ballet at the Great Hall of the People. Two hours personal/staff time is scheduled after the Head-to-Head, and three hours personal/staff time after the tour of the Temple.

Mrs. Ford has the morning and afternoon free. She is scheduled to accompany you to the ballet in the evening. She may, if she wishes, join you for the afternoon tour of the Temple; however, the likelihood of cold weather and winds coupled with a long and difficult walk over cobble stones might render the tour inadvisable. An option exists whereby Mrs. Ford could join you during the latter portion of the tour thereby avoiding most of the exposure and walk.

Susan is scheduled to depart by motorcade at 8:00 a.m. for the Great Wall and the Ming Tombs. She will return to the Guest House at 3:45 p.m. She is scheduled to join you and Mrs. Ford for the evening ballet.



HEAD-TO-HEAD MEETING

You are scheduled to board the motorcade at 9:45 a.m. for the 10-minute drive to the Great Hall of the People to attend the first Head-to-Head Meeting. Participants are listed in the sequence. Following the two hour meeting, you will return to the Guest House for 2 hours personal staff time.

VISIT TO THE TEMPLE OF HEAVEN

You are scheduled to depart the Guest House at 2:30 p.m., board the motorcade, and depart for the 25-minute drive to the Temple of Heaven. You will be accompanied by a senior PRC Official whose identify has not yet been disclosed to us.

The Temple of Heaven is the most famous temple in all of China. It is not really a temple in the classic sense of the word. It is a triumphal avenue eight hundred yards long with three terraces rising from it. Most of the buildings were built in the 15th century and subsequently repaired. Traditionally, the Emperor carried out two types of ceremonies here. At the winter solstice, he came to speak with the heavens to tell of all the important events of the last year. In the first month of the New Year, he went to render homage to the heavens and to gain their confidence.

After 1911, the Emperor or his representative no longer performed the ceremonies. On October 10, 1912, the first Chinese National Day, the Temple of Heaven was opened to all the public. Until that time, the people had never been allowed to enter the temple.

You will visit three of the four principal sites of the Temple as follows: At the far end of the way stands the Temple of Annual Prayer in the midst of a large courtyard. It was built in 1420 and restored in 1751. It was struck by lightning in 1889 when it was said by the Chinese that the thunderbolt struck a centipede that dared to desecrate it by crawling on the roof. The hall was burned to the ground and was quickly rebuilt on the original plans.



The hall stands on a triple round marble terrace and is topped by a triple cone-shaped roof of brilliant blue tiles and at the highest point is topped by a gilded ball. Not one nail was used to build the Hall. It was entirely constructed of wood supported by 28 wooden columns. The four large pillars in the middle symbolize the four seasons of the year; the 24 other columns arranged in a double circle around the four central ones signify the twelve months of the year and the twelve hours of the day as the ancient Chinese divided their days into twelve hours. In the middle of the floor is a circular stone of natural veining called the Phoenix and dragon stone. This is where the Emperor came to ask for confidence or to pray for good harvests.

The Imperial Heavenly Vault contains the Temple of the Universal God built entirely of wood dating from 1530. The cone shaped roof of blue tiles is topped by a gilded ball. The temple is 63 feet high and 51 feet across. Two curious accoustic phenomena occur here. A mere whisper exchanged between two people standing on opposite sides of the courtyard can be heard around the wall. Along the central walkway are the three echoing stones. A single shout or handclap given at the first stone starting at the bottom of the steps of the circular temple will produce a single echo, at the second stone it produces a double echo, and at the third, three echoes. The surrounding wall is grey with bright blue roofing tiles. Three gates lead from the inner courtyard.

The Altar of Heaven consists of three terraces surfaced with stone slabs. The numbers of stone slabs, the balustrades in the three tiers and the stone steps are all multiples of nine. The number nine was the symbol of the sky and the Emperor. The 360 balustrades represent the degrees in the celestial circle. Here a ceremony involving sacrificed oxen was performed in elaborate detail involving a significant ceremonial role by the Emperor.

The Hall of Abstinence, which you will not visit, contains a group of buildings surrounded by a square enclosure and a moat. This fourth site is closed to visitors.



BALLET PERFORMANCE

At 7:05 p.m., you, Mrs. Ford and Susan board the motorcade at the Guest House en route the Great Hall of the People to attend the China Ballet Troop performance of the dance drama, "Ode to the Yimeng Mountains", a modern revolutionary ballet. Background by PRC follows.

"The background of this dance drama is the people's militant life in the old revolutionary base around the Yimeng Mountains of Shantung Province during the War of Liberation (1946-1949). Depicting the stirring story of a poor peasant woman who saves the life of a wounded PLA soldier by giving him milk from her own breast, this dance drama is an ode to the heroes and heroines who incarnate the spirit embodied in Chairman Mao's words, "If the army and the people are united as one, who in the world can match them?" With its well-knit plot and skillful characterization the drama achieves a high level of artistry."

"The time is the autumn of 1947 when the War of Liberation is entering its second year. The Chinese revolution is at a historical turning point when darkness gives place to dawn. To implement Chairman Mao's grand strategy of switching from strategic defense to a strategic offensive, the People's Liberation Army (PLA) embarks on large-scale mobile warfare and withdraws temporarily from some areas formerly in our hands. "

A synopsis provided by the PRC follows:

Evening - Outside Yiho Village - Prologue

Amidst gunfire and smoke, Sister Ying and other villagers bid farewell to her husband, Lu Ying, and the armed working team led by him, who have been fighting guerrilla warfare in the mountains. Armed working teams, consisting of cadres drawn from various organizations -- the Communist Party, the governments in the Liberated Areas, the People's army and mass organizations -- and equipped with some weapons, went deep into the enemy-occupied areas to organize the masses and strike blows at the enemy.



In the wake of rifle shots, the run-away despot landlord Lai Chin-fu leads his "Home-going legion" back to the mountain village. ("Home-going legions" were made up of landlords and local tyrants who fled from the Liberated Areas to the Kuomin-tang areas, and who had been organized by the Kuomintang into these reactionary armed bands to attack the Liberated Areas together with the Kuomin-tang troops.) A Kuomintang bandit officer gives the despot landlord a towel which the PLA platoon leader Fang Tieh-chun lost when he was wounded, and orders the landlord to get hold of the wounded PLA man within three days.

Scene One

Two days later --- From dawn to Noon. On Ching Shih Ridge

Lu Ying and two members of the armed working team have been instructed to find Platoon Leader Fang. Unable to locate him, Lu Ying decides to return alone to the village to continue the search.

Badly wounded and in great pain, Fang Tieh-chun staunchly endeavours to catch up with his unit, but he faints from loss of blood and extreme thirst.

Sister Ying who is picking edible weeds in the gully comes upon the PLA officer. The sight of this badly wounded comrade fills her with anxiety. For a moment she doesn't know what to do, for it is too far away to get water for him from home, and it is unsafe for the wounded comrade to be left alone there. Suddenly, she hits upon an idea: "Why not save the wounded comrade with my own milk?"

The despot landlord and his gang search high and low for the wounded officer.

Sister Ying devises a clever way to hide her comrade.

Scene Two

From dusk to night -- At Sister Ying's house.

The bandits of the "home-going legion" put the village under fire and sword, and wantonly loot the villagers' grain.



After she gets home, Sister Ying lulls her baby to sleep. Then she deftly catches and kills her hen and lights the stove to make chicken soup for the wounded comrade.

Her husband, Lu Ying, returns and is delighted to learn that she has saved Platoon Leader Fang. He decides to go back immediately to the mountain and lead the armed working team to transfer the wounded comrade to a place of safety.

The despot landlord and his "home-going legion" break into Sister Ying's house. Sister Ying is undaunted by enemy threats and torture and remains true to the revolution. Bruised all over, she faints away.

The cunning enemy resorts to the plot of letting Sister Ying escape so as to follow her to the hiding place of the wounded officer. Seeing through the enemy's scheme, Sister Ying cleverly turns it to her own advantage. She pushes open the window and tricks the enemy into thinking that she has jumped out of it. They rush off in hot pursuit. Then Sister Ying, with a bamboo basket in her arm, hurries to the mountain.

Scene Three

Dawn. The hiding place of Platoon Leader Fang on Ching Shih Ridge.

Platoon Leader Fang emerges from his hiding place. He painfully does physical exercise in the hope of returning soon to the front.

Braving difficulties and risks, Sister Ying and Chu Lan bring the chicken soup and food to Platoon Leader Fang. Deeply moved, he expresses his determination to fight valiantly against the enemy after his recovery so as to repay the villagers for their kindness.

In their search for the wounded officer, the "home-going legion" now comes up the mountain.

Sister Ying deliberately attracts the enemies' attention so as to protect her comrade.



Scene Four

Dusk.

On the edge of the village.

The "home-going legion", who failed to find the wounded PLA officer, then threatens to kill Sister Ying if she doesn't reveal the whereabouts of the wounded PLA officer. She denounces them with righteous anger. In desperation, the despot landlord snatches away her baby and shouts ruthlessly: "Whom do you want, your baby or the wounded soldier?"

"Bitter sacrifice strengthens bold resolve
Which dares to make sun and moon shine in new skies."

In order to save the wounded PLA man, Sister Ying is ready to bear the greatest sacrifice.

At this critical moment, Platoon Yeader Fang steps out of hiding and declares boldly: "Here I am!"

All of a sudden, shouts and gun-fire are heard on all sides. Lu Ying arrives on the scene with his armed working team. They wipe out the "home-going legion" and put the despot landlord to death.

Sister Ying, her baby and the platoon leader are all saved. The mountain village is liberated. Cheers ring across the skies in praise of Chairman Mao and the Communist Party.

Epilogue

A few days later.

The towering Yimeng Mountains stand majestically over Yiho Village where red flags flutter in the wind. High-ranking officers and men of the PLA respectfully express their gratitude to Sister Ying and the other villagers.

Platoon Leader Fang bids farewell to the villagers and returns to the front with fond memories of their loving concern.

BACKGROUND

OVERVIEW

You have 4 events scheduled for Wednesday: (1) In the morning, a Head-to-Head Meeting, (2) In the afternoon, a tour of the Agriculture Exhibit Hall, (3) In the evening, a special private dinner hosted by Vice Premier Teng Hsiao-P'ing in a room at the Great Hall for 90 people including approximately 50 guests from the U. S. side, and (4) The Sports/Gymnastic event at the Capital Gymnasium. You will have approximately 2 hours personal time following the Head-to-Head Meeting and again in the afternoon following your tour of the Agriculture Exhibit Hall.

Mrs. Ford will depart the Residence at 10:30 a.m. for a tour of the Palace Museum. In the afternoon, she will visit the Dance-School of the Central May 7 Art College to observe classes in session and a performance. In the evening, she will accompany you to the Private Dinner and to the Sports/Gymnastic event at the Capital Gymnasium.

Susan will depart at 9:00 a.m. for the Red Star Commune where she will tour a farm tool repair shop, dairy farm, fields, and living quarters. Following the tour of the Red Star Commune, she will visit the Temple of Heaven. In the afternoon, she will be escorted on an informal tour of the Summer Palace, and in the evening, accompany you and Mrs. Ford to the Private Dinner and to the Sports/Gymnastic Event at the Capital Gymnasium.



HEAD TO HEAD MEETING

Today's Head-to-Head meeting will be held in your Guest House rather than at the Great Hall of the People. At 9:25 p.m., you will leave your suite and proceed to the front entrance of the Guest House to greet the Chinese participants as they arrive. Meeting participants will be the same as in the first Head-to-Head. The meeting concludes at 11:30 a.m. You have personal/staff time scheduled until 2:00 p.m. when you depart for the Agricultural Exhibition Hall Tour.

AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITION HALL TOUR

Escorted by a PRC official whose identity has not been disclosed to us, you depart the Guest House at 2:00 p.m. for the 25-minute drive to the Agricultural Exhibition Hall where you will view the various exhibits which show the organization, development and progress of Red Banner communes that have shown exceptional achievement in dealing with the challenges of their land.

Key products from each commune are on display, together with models of the acreage under management showing the raw land before development and land as it presently exists after the commune effort. There are many photographs showing the people at work and the general topography of the commune as well as examples of the primitive tools used in the early stages of the commune projects.

On display are product examples of fruit, grasses, grains, vegetables, animals, herbs and medicinal animal by-products, as well as various handicrafts from each commune.

The degree of mechanization varies, but most of the achievements represent the accomplishment of massive hand labor.

In the entrance to the Hall is a large monument of Chairman Mao with some peasants.



PRIVATE DINNER

Vice Premier Teng Hsiao-P'ing has indicated a desire to host a special private dinner beginning at 6:00 p.m. in a room at the Great Hall of the People for you and approximately 90 persons including 50 from the U.S. side. There will be no formal toasts and the dinner is expected to run no more than 45 minutes.

Following the dinner, you will either return to the Guest House for brief personal time prior to departing at 7:40 p.m. for the Capital Gymnasium, or the Vice Premier may suggest a short meeting (or some other as yet unannounced activity). The schedule is unclear at this time.

THE SPORTS/GYMNASTIC EVENT

Beginning at 8:00 p.m., the Chinese have planned a three-part sport and gymnastic event to include gymnastics, a traditional Chinese martial arts (Wu Shu) demonstration and a ping pong display.

Sports and athletic programs are very popular with the Chinese, and events are invariably well attended. In addition to organized sports, efforts to maintain physical fitness are attempted by a large portion of the population, often in sizable calisthenics groups. Chairman Mao set the example for this with his early enthusiasm for sports and athletic activities.

As you know, ping pong is the sport for which the Chinese are known throughout the world. In ping pong, as well as in other sports, the Chinese stress sportsmanship and skill, proclaiming that these are more important than winning or losing. Chinese Wu Shu -- or martial arts -- is a colorful display of swordplay and acrobatics performed with traditional Chinese weapons in which opponents engage in mock combat. Timing and footwork is very intricate and often resembles ballet. Gymnastics is also very popular in China, and troupes of Chinese gymnasts have visited many parts of the world as a part of their cultural exchange program.

The Capital Gymnasium is a large, modern building. The stadium in which these events will take place has a seating of 17,000. Its main floor can be converted for the use of ice hockey and other athletic events. It was built in 1968.

THE SUMMER PALACE

The Summer Palace is located in the northwestern suburbs of Peking, about seven miles from the Guest House. The first palace was built at this site during the twelfth century A.D., but the present layout of the Summer Palace dates mainly from the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, when the lake was enlarged. Most of the large pavilions and halls were built, and scenic spots from other areas of China were replicated on the grounds for the Emperor's enjoyment. The Summer Palace has been extensively restored since 1949, and it is now one of Peking's most popular parks, crowded in the winter with skaters and in the Summer with boaters and strollers.

The Summer Palace is historically associated with the Dowager Empress, the actual ruler of China during the last years of the Ching Dynasty (1644-1911). It was her favorite retreat, and she channeled considerable funds from the Imperial revenues into restoration and improvements. She also gave the Summer Palace its present name, which in Chinese means "The Garden Where Peace is Cultivated."

The total area of the Summer Palace is 659 acres, of which three-quarters is occupied by Kunming Lake, and the remainder by Longevity Hill on the northern shore of the lake. This is where most of the temples, pavilions and halls are located. A lakeside covered promenade, about 800 yards long, runs from east to west, at the base of Longevity Hill, linking buildings on the lakefront. Painted on the beams of the covered promenade are hundreds of restored depictions of mythological and historical scenes, as well as landscapes.

Just before reaching the center of the covered promenade from the east a good view can be obtained of the most prominent structure in the Summer Palace, the "Tower for Incense for the Buddha". This pagoda, 150 feet high, was first built during the Ming Dynasty and restored by the Dowager Empress in the late nineteenth century. Below the pagoda stands a collection of buildings reaching almost to the lakeside, the largest of which is known as the "Hall that Dispels the Clouds."

Farther west, near the end of the covered promenade, is the "Pavilion for Listening to Orioles," which the Dowager Empress used as a theater for staging her favorite Chinese operas, but which is now used as a teahouse.

At the western end of the covered promenade the famous Stone Boat, built by the Dowager Empress in 1888, stands in the lake. The Boat is generally considered a symbol for the decadence and corruption of the late Ching Empire since misappropriated funds for Chinese navy were used in its construction.



THE SPORTS/GYMNASTIC EVENT

The Chinese have planned a three part sport-and-gymnastic event, to include gymnastics, a traditional Chinese martial arts (Wu Shu) demonstration and a ping pong display.

Sports and athletic programs are very popular with the Chinese, and events are invariably well attended. In addition to organized sports, efforts to maintain physical fitness are attempted by a large portion of the population, often in sizable calisthenics groups. Chairman Mao set the example for this with his early enthusiasm for sports and athletics activities. In the early mornings one often sees people in the parks or in groups in front of their office or apartment buildings engaging in physical exercise.

Ping pong, of course, is the sport for which the Chinese are known throughout the world, fielding teams which are rarely beaten. In recent years their teams have visited many countries and continents, including the United States, Africa, Europe and many parts of Asia. In ping pong, as well as in other sports, the Chinese stress sportsmanship and skill, proclaiming that these are more important than winning or losing. In international meets the Chinese hold that their primary objective is to promote friendship rather than to emerge victorious. Chinese Wu Shu - or martial arts - is a colorful display of swordplay and acrobatics performed with traditional Chinese weapons in which opponents engage in mock combat. Timing and footwork is very intricate and often resembles ballet. Gymnastics is also very popular in China, and troupes of Chinese gymnasts have visited many parts of the world as a part of their cultural exchange programs.

The Capital Gymnasium is a large, modern building. The stadium in which these events will take place has a seating of 17,000. Its main floor can be converted for the use of ice hockey and other athletic events. The Gymnasium was built in 1968.



AGRICULTURAL EXHIBIT HALL

(In the entrance of the Agricultural Exhibition Hall is a large monument of Chairman Mao with some peasants.)

The President will be escorted to view the various exhibits which show the organization, development and progress of Red Banner Communes that have shown exceptional achievement in dealing with the challenges of their land.

Key products from each commune are on display, together with models of the acreage under management showing the raw land before development and land as it presently exists after the commune effort. There are many photographs showing the people at work and the general topography of the commune as well as examples of the primitive tools used in the early stages of the commune projects.

On display are product examples of fruit, grasses, grains, vegetables, animals, herbs and medicinal animal by-products, as well as various handicrafts from each commune.

The degree of mechanization varies, but most of the achievements represent the accomplishment of massive hand labor.



SONG OF THE YIMENG MOUNTAINS

- A Modern Revolutionary Ballet -

China Ballet Troupe

SYNOPSIS

Autumn 1947. In the Yimeng Mountain Region.

Prologue

Evening.

Outside Yiho Village.

Amidst gunfire and smoke, Sister Ying and other villagers bid farewell to her husband, Lu Ying, and the armed working team¹ led by him, who have been fighting guerrilla warfare in the mountains.

In the wake of rifle shots, the run-away despot landlord Lai Chin-fu leads his "Home-going legion"² back to the mountain village. A Kuomintang bandit officer gives the despot landlord a towel which the PLA platoon leader Fang Tieh-chun lost when he was wounded, and orders the landlord to get hold of the wounded PLA man within three days.

(translator's note: Armed working teams, consisting of cadres drawn from various organizations -- the Communist Party, the governments in the Liberated Areas, the people's army and mass organizations -- and equipped with some weapons, were small working teams which went



deep into the enemy-occupied areas to organize the masses and strike blows at the enemy.)

2. (translator's note: "Home-going legions" were made up of landlords and local tyrants who fled from the Liberated Areas to the Kuomintang areas, and who had been organized by the Kuomintang into these reactionary armed bands to attack the Liberated Areas together with the Kuomintang troops.)

Scene One

Two days later. From dawn to noon.

On Ching Shih Ridge.

Lu Ying and two members of the armed working team have been instructed to find Platoon Leader Fang. Unable to locate him, Lu Ying decides to return alone to the village to continue the search.

Badly wounded and in great pain, Fang Tieh-chun staunchly endeavours to catch up with his unit, but he faints from loss of blood and extreme thirst.

Sister Ying who is picking edible weeds in the gully comes upon the PLA officer. The sight of this badly wounded comrade fills her with anxiety. For a moment she doesn't know what to do, for it is too far away to get water for him from home, and it is unsafe for the wounded comrade to be left alone there. Suddenly, she hits upon an idea: "Why not save the wounded comrade with my own milk?"

The despot landlord and his gang search high and low for the wounded officer.

Sister Ying devises a clever way to hide her comrade.



Scene Two

From dusk to night.

At Sister Ying's house.

The bandits of the "home-going legion" put the village under fire and sword, and wantonly loot the villagers' grain.

After she gets home, Sister Ying lulls her baby to sleep. Then she deftly catches and kills her hen and lights the stove to make chicken soup for the wounded comrade.

Her husband, Lu Ying, returns and is delighted to learn that she has saved Platoon Leader Fang. He decides to go back immediately to the mountain and lead the armed working team to transfer the wounded comrade to a place of safety.

The despot landlord and his "home-going legion" break into Sister Ying's house. Sister Ying is undaunted by enemy threats and torture and remains true to the revolution. Bruised all over, she faints away.

The cunning enemy resorts to the plot of letting Sister Ying escape so as to follow her to the hiding place of the wounded officer. Seeing through the enemy's scheme, Sister Ying cleverly turns it to her own advantage. She pushes open the window and tricks the enemy into thinking that she had jumped out of it. They rush off in hot pursuit. Then Sister Ying, with a bamboo basket in her arm, hurries off to the mountain.

Scene Three

Dawn.

The hiding place of Platoon Leader Fang on Ching Shih Ridge.

Platoon Leader Fang emerges from his hiding place. He painfully



does physical exercise in the hope of returning soon to the front.

Braving difficulties and risks, Sister Ying and Chu Lan bring the chicken soup and food to Platoon Leader Fang. Deeply moved, he expresses his determination to fight valiantly against the enemy after his recovery so as to repay the villagers for their kindness.

In their search for the wounded officer, the "home-going legion" now comes up the mountain.

Sister Ying deliberately attracts the enemies' attention so as to protect her comrade.

Scene Four

Dusk

On the edge of the village.

The "home-going legion", who failed to find the wounded PLA officer, then threatens to kill Sister Ying if she doesn't reveal the whereabouts of the wounded PLA officer. She denounces them with righteous anger. In desperation, the despot landlord snatches away her baby and shouts ruthlessly: "Whom do you want, your baby or the wounded soldier?"

"Bitter sacrifice strengthens bold resolve

Which dares to make sun and moon shine in new skies."

In order to save the wounded PLA man, Sister Ying is ready to bear the greatest sacrifice.

At this critical moment, Platoon Leader Fang steps out of hiding and declares boldly: "Here I am!"

All of a sudden, shouts and gun-fire are heard on all sides.

Lu Ying arrives on the scene with his armed working team. They wipe out the "home-going legion" and put the despot landlord to death.

* Sister Ying, her baby and the platoon leader are all saved. The mountain village is liberated. Cheers ring across the skies in praise of Chairman Mao and the Communist Party.

Epilogue

A few days later.

The towering Yimeng Mountains stand majestically over Yiho Village where red flags flutter in the wind. High-ranking officers and men of the PLA respectfully express their gratitude to Sister Ying and the other villagers.

Platoon Leader Fang bids farewell to the villagers and returns to the front with fond memories of their loving concern.



The Forbidden City (Palace Museum)

The Forbidden City was the residence of the Emperor and his household during dynasties over a 500-year period.

Common people were forbidden access to the 250-acre expanse, located in the geographic center of Peking, protected by walls more than 35-feet-high and a moat 160-feet-wide.

The Forbidden City began to be built in 1406 by the third Ming Emperor, Yung Lo, after his decision in 1403 to establish the capital of his empire at Peking. The work was done primarily from 1407-1420, with more than 200,000 workmen employed.

The Forbidden City comprises about one-sixth of the Imperial City, an area also walled which surrounded the Forbidden City. The Imperial City housed the administrative and maintenance organizations, granaries, stables, orchards, parks, residences of officials and princes, and some of the palaces and pleasure gardens of the Emperor.

The outer buildings of the Forbidden City became a museum in 1914, with more than 20,000 relics on display. Treasures in the Jade Rooms to be visited by Mrs. Ford range from the Imperial jewels and garments to a five-ton piece of jade.

Also included in Mrs. Ford's visit is Yu Hua Yuan (The Imperial Garden), an area of more than 7,000 square metres built during the Ming period. There are pines and cypresses several hundred years old interposed with rocks of several kinds. To the north side is a rockery hill. It was here that the Ming and Ch'ing emperors passed their leisure hours.

The Forbidden City was also known as the "Purple Forbidden City." Purple was symbolically attributed to the North Star and was used here to show that the Imperial Residence was a cosmic center.



The Ming Tombs (Shih San Ling)

The 13 tombs of the emperors of the Ming Dynasty lie in an amphitheater formed by low purple mountains 26 miles north of Peking.

An impressive five-arch gateway, built of marble in 1541, announces the approach to the Tombs. About a mile beyond is the Ta-hung Men (Great Red Gate). Everyone in China, including the reigning emperor, was forced to dismount here and walk along the "sacred way" or "way of the spirit." (The body of the deceased was carried along the route at the funeral ceremony.)

On down 500 yards is the Stele Pavilion (Pei T'ing), erected in 1426. And beyond this, the avenue of animals, followed by the avenue of human statues, all dating from the 15th century. The mythical beasts were said to be animals of good omen. The men, horses and elephants were erected to serve the dead in the next world.

Four miles from the first gateway is the Chang Ling, chief tomb, where the 15th century emperor Yung Lo is buried. The columns in this tomb are so large that two people with outstretched arms can barely encircle one. The tomb was excavated in 1957.

Most of the tombs consist of a round artificial burial mound known as a tumulus, under which the remains are buried in a palatial vault, and a rectangular compound of gates, courtyards, halls and pavilions laid out to resemble a giant keyhole. Once the Emperor had been buried, the passage leading to the vault was sealed, theoretically forever.

The tombs were originally protected by a long wall in the valley and by guard posts on the hilltops. Only individuals in charge of upkeep could enter the enclosure.



The Great Wall

Built 22 centuries ago as a defense against invaders, the Great Wall winds snakelike from east to west across more than 1500 miles of China. Arched gateways were built at intervals, ramps led up to the wall, and watchtowers were placed at strateg points.

Considered one of the world's oldest and largest engineering projects, the Wall is between 22 and 26 feet high with a width ranging from 21 feet at the base and 19 feet at the top. The top of the wall with its built-up sides was used as a roadway and was wide enough to take five horses abreast.

The Wall gradually fell into disrepair over the past few hundred years, but has now been restored at three famous points: The Shan hai guan Pass, the Ba da ling Fort and the Jia yu guan Pass. The Ba da ling Fort is the point closest to Peking. At this site, there is an arched gateway through the wall as well as steps leading to the top, where there is a two-story watchtower.



THE TEMPLE OF HEAVEN

The Temple of Heaven is the most famous temple in all of China. It is not really a temple in the classic sense of the word. It is a triumphal avenue eight hundred yards long with three terraces rising from it: The Temple of Annual Prayer, The Temple of the Universal God, and The Altar of Heaven.

The Temple is a unique and privileged spot. Every year, at the moment of winter solstice, the Emperor came here to make solemn sacrifice. This ceremony dates back to pre-historic days. On his role of "Son of Heaven" the sovereign took upon himself the sins of all the people, offering himself as a kind of sacrifice to his Father. For this he put on a costume of dark blue and quit the imperial palaces on the eve of the holy day, escorted by soldiers and officials by musicians, and by princes of the royal blood. Every gate and every window overlooking his route had to be closed tight.

The Temple of Annual Prayer is a high building covered with a three-tiered roof, also in blue tile, first built by Yung Lo but rebuilt since 1899. It is the exact replica of what it was over 500 years ago. It was here the Emperor spent a night of fasting and prayer.

The Temple of the Universal God is located to the south at the other end of the Sacred Way. It is a circular pavilion covered with tiles of deep blue. It is here the Emperor burned incense and honored his ancestors.

Nearby is the Altar of Heaven where a ceremony involving sacrificed oxen was performed in elaborate detail. Scrolls of silk were unrolled, and priests recited ancient prayers. Musicians played sacred melodies and the Emperor's ceremonial role was at its peak.



The Peking #1 Carpet Factory

The Peking Carpet Factory produces primarily handmade rugs and tapestries. They are produced mainly for export, mostly to European countries.

The Factory employs more than 1,500 workers, 60 per cent of whom are women. It began with about two dozen employees in 1949.

More than 100 different designs are produced here, in one of five basic styles: Peking, antique, artistic, multicolor and unicolor. The process begins in the design room, where workers draw and trace designs. It continues in the weaving rooms, where workers sit at floor-to-ceiling loom devices and hand pull and cut each thread into the carpet design. The rugs are cut, and patterns defined by a scissors process in another department, and are washed before going to the shipping room. Threads used in the carpet-making are dyed on the premises also.

It takes anywhere from three to six months to produce a carpet and about three years to fully train a weaver. The Factory produces about 60,000 square meters of carpet a year in more than 100 different colors.

BACKGROUND

OVERVIEW

You have 4 events scheduled for Friday: (1) Peking Departure Ceremony (No Remarks); (2) Jakarta Arrival Ceremony (No Remarks); (3) Individual Courtesy Calls by Indonesian Vice President Sultan Hamenghu Buwono IX and Governor and Mrs. Ali Sadikim of Jakarta. (Mrs. Ford will join you for the call by Governor and Mrs. Ali Sadikim and you will have a brief exchange of gifts); and (4) The State Dinner which includes a receiving line, exchange of gifts, toast, and after-dinner entertainment. You will return to your Suite at approximately 11:05 p.m.

Mrs. Ford and Susan have no separate, personal schedules today.



PEKING DEPARTURE

Escorted by the Vice Premier, you, Mrs. Ford and Susan board the motorcade at 8:30 a.m. and depart the Guest House for the 40-minute drive to Peking Capital Airport. Upon arrival at the Airport, you and the Vice Premier proceed to a viewing area for the playing of the National Anthems, after which you review the honor guard. You then greet a group of Chinese ministers, a group of third-party mission chiefs, and USLO personnel. (Mrs. Ford follows as on arrival.) You bid farewell to the Vice Premier and other PRC officials at the ramp of Air Force One, board and depart the Peking Capital Airport for the 7 hour, 45 minute flight to Jakarta, Indonesia. (Time Change: - 1 hour).

JAKARTA ARRIVAL CEREMONY

Air Force One arrives Jakarta International Airport at 4:15 p.m. and Widya Latif, GOI Chief of Protocol and U. S. Ambassador and Mrs. David Newsom proceed on board to greet you and Mrs. Ford, then deplane. You and Mrs. Ford follow and are met by President and Mrs. Suharto and Vice President Sultan Hamenghu Buwono IX at the foot of the ramp. President Suharto introduces you to the Indonesian Suite of Honor and other dignitaries. The arrival ceremony includes the playing of the Anthems, a 21-gun salute, review of the Honor Guard, and introduction of Indonesian dignitaries, Diplomatic Corps, and selected U. S. Embassy personnel. President Suharto joins you for the 30-minute ride from Jakarta International Airport to Istana Merdeka (Independence Palace); Mrs. Ford rides with Mrs. Suharto.

Upon arrival at the Palace, you proceed inside to the Credential Hall where the U. S. Official Party is presented to President and Mrs. Suharto and the Suite of Honor. President and Mrs. Suharto then escort you and Mrs. Ford to the Jepara Room for a brief conversation after which they escort you on foot to Wisma Negara (your quarters). After showing you your suite, they depart and



you have an hour and ten minutes personal time. Since the next events are Black Tie/Long Dress, you will have to change during this period.

THE ISTANA MERDEKA (FREEDOM PALACE) is an impressive building with tall Corinthian pillars. It was completed in 1878 and is of great historical significance since it is the building over which the Dutch flag was lowered in 1949 following four years of fighting. Heads of State and Ambassadors are normally received at the elegantly decorated Istana Merdeka. A spacious, well-tended lawn with flowering bushes enhances the Palace, where each year on August 17 the Indonesians witness the Independence Day ceremonies. On the front steps of Istana Merdeka, the President hands the Bendera Pusaka (the flag used on August 17, 1945) to boys and girls representing the Indonesian Provinces.

THE ISTANA NEGARA (STATE PALACE)

Built a half century earlier as a residence for the Dutch Governor Generals, the Istana Negara has a small gallery of Indonesian paintings depicting episodes of Indonesia's struggle for independence and a display of traditional weapons used in Indonesian battles. The dining hall where State banquets are held is decorated in a neo-classic style but decorative themes may vary depending on the country of the guest. The most historical room at the Istana Negara is the ceremony room where formal ceremonies may be held and where the President and the First Lady may meet with delegations. At the side of this large hall is a stage where traditional Indonesian dances and music are usually performed for guests.

At 7:20 p.m., you depart your suite and proceed to the sixth floor lounge where Indonesian Vice President Sultan Hamenghu Buwono IX



joins you for a brief (7-minute) courtesy call. Upon his departure, Mrs. Ford joins you for the arrival of Governor and Mrs. Ali Sadikim of Jakarta. You and Mrs. Ford sign the Golden Book of Jakarta, exchange gifts, and Governor and Mrs. Ali Sadikim depart. You and Mrs. Ford return to your suite for 5-minutes personal time prior to departing en route Istana Negara for the State Dinner Reception.

STATE DINNER RECEPTION

Foreign Minister and Mrs. Malik will meet you in the lobby of your residence at 7:40 p.m. and escort you to the motorcade for the short ride to Istana Negara where you are met by President and Mrs. Suharto and Vice President Buwono IX and escorted to a salon for an exchange of gifts. (Foreign Minister and Mrs. Malik take Susan under escort.)

Following the exchange of gifts, you proceed to the lobby area, form a receiving line, and greet the 150 guests. Approximately one hour after the dinner begins, President Suharto will propose a toast and the U. S. National Anthem will be played. After you propose your toast, the Indonesian National Anthem is played and the dinner concludes.

President and Mrs. Suharto then escort you and Mrs. Ford to a hall for a 50-minute cultural performance. Following the performance, you and Mrs. Ford, escorted by the Suhartos, proceed on stage to greet the performers.

Escorted by President and Mrs. Suharto and other members of the Suite of Honor, you depart Istana Negara on foot for Wisma Negara where your escorts bid you good night and depart. You will arrive in the Presidential Suite at approximately 11:05 p.m.

There will be a receiving line at the dinner and again at the conclusion of the Cultural Performance. You will return to your quarters at 11:10 p.m.

Mrs. Ford and Susan will depart Wisma Negara at 9:15 a.m. for a tour of "Mini-Indonesia." With the exception of your 30-minute meeting with President Marcos at Malacanang Palace, Mrs. Ford and Susan's Saturday schedule will be the same as yours.

HEAD TO HEAD MEETING WITH PRESIDENT SUHARTO

Accompanied by Foreign Minister Malik, you depart your suite at 7:55 a.m. and proceed on foot to Istana Merdeka Credential Hall for the 2-hour Head to Head meeting with President Suharto. Secretary Kissinger and Foreign Minister Malik will participate in the meeting. At the conclusion of the meeting, you return to Wisma Negara for 10 minutes personal time.



JAKARTA DEPARTURE

Accompanied by President Suharto, you depart Wisma Negara for the 30-minute ride to Jakarta International Airport. Upon arrival at the airport, you will be joined by Mrs. Ford and Susan who will have arrived independently from their tour of "Mini-Indonesia". The departure ceremony includes review of the honor guard, playing of the National Anthems and a 21-gun salute as you board Air Force One and depart for the 3 hour, 30 minute flight to Manila. (Time Change: + 1 hour)

ARRIVAL IN MANILA

Air Force One arrives at 4:00 p.m. at Manila International Airport. Immediately upon arrival, Ambassador Katigbak, GOP Director of Protocol, and Ambassador Sullivan, U.S. Ambassador to the Philippines, proceed on board to welcome you and Mrs. Ford. Escorted by Ambassador Katigbak and Ambassador Sullivan, you deplane and are met by President and Mrs. Ferdinand E. Marcos who introduce you and Mrs. Ford to Chief Justice and Mrs. Makalintal, Honorable Carlos Romulo, Secretary of Foreign Affairs, and Ambassador and Mrs. Romualdez. You and President Marcos then move to the salute stand for the playing of the Anthems, review of the honor guard, and welcoming remarks by President Marcos and your response which will be carried on live local television. Mrs. Ford and Susan view the ceremony from a special viewing area. Mrs. Marcos begins the program by presenting you the keys to the City.

Accompanied by President Marcos, you depart the airport for the 20-minute drive to Rizal Monument.

WREATH-LAYING CEREMONY AT RIZAL MONUMENT

President Marcos will stand by the car throughout the ceremony at Rizal Monument. He will not accompany you for the wreath-laying which includes playing of the Anthems, visual inspection of the troops, laying of the wreath, a 21-gun salute, and taps.

Rizal Monument - Dr. Jose P. Rizal, a young nationalist whose writings are credited with stirring the flame of freedom in the Philippines, was executed by a Spanish firing squad on December 20, 1896. He was 35 years old. The Rizal Monument stands over his remains near the spot where he died. The American flag was taken down for the last time from the flag-pole at the Rizal Monument when the Philippines became independent on July 4, 1946. An honor guard maintains a 24-hour vigil over the national shrine. The surrounding park, first known as the Luneta, was built on land reclaimed from Manila Bay. Now known as Rizal Park, it is one of Manila's most popular public attractions.



INTRODUCTION OF THE U.S. PARTY TO PRESIDENT AND MRS. MARCOS

Upon arrival at Malacanang Palace, President and Mrs. Marcos will escort you to the Music Room where you will introduce the U.S. Official Party to President and Mrs. Marcos. They will then escort you to your quarters for 10-minutes personal time.

Originally the summer estate of a Spanish aristocrat, Don Luis Roche, Malacanang Palace became the official residence of the Spanish Governor-General of the Philippines in 1863, when the former palace near the Manila Cathedral was destroyed by an earthquake. The American Governor General later had a residence there, and added the Executive Building in 1920. In 1935, when the Philippine Commonwealth Government was established, President Manuel L. Quezon made Malacanang his residence and it has remained the official residence of the President of the Philippines since. The name Malacanang is said to have been derived from Tagalog words meaning "nobles live in that place."

MEETING WITH PRESIDENT MARCOS

President Marcos will escort you from your residence quarters at 5:55 p.m. to the Music Room for a 30-minute meeting. Secretary Kissinger will join you and President Marcos. Mrs. Ford and Susan will not participate in this meeting.

At the conclusion of the meeting at 6:25 p.m., you return to your suite for 1 hour, 30 minutes personal time.

STATE DINNER:

The attire for the State Dinner is Black Tie and long dress. You, Mrs. Ford, and Susan depart your residence quarters for the Ceremonial Hall at 8:00 p.m. where you will be joined by President and Mrs. Marcos for the gift exchange. You then depart on foot for Maharlika Hall for the State Dinner which includes a receiving line, toasts by President Marcos and you, a 50-minute cultural performance following which you again from a receiving line and greet the guests. President and Mrs. Marcos will accompany you on foot to your residence quarters and bid you goodnight at approximately 11:10 p.m.

OVERVIEW

You have 4 events scheduled for today: (1) A 2-1/2 hour boat ride to Corregidor. While on board you will have breakfast and a 1-hour meeting with President Marcos; (2) Tour of Corregidor including a Wreath-laying Ceremony at the Wainwright Monument and a briefing on the Malinta Tunnel; (3) A 2-1/2 boat ride back to Manila. While on board you will have lunch and 1-hour personal time; and (3) Departure Ceremony requiring remarks.

Mrs. Ford will accompany you on the boat ride, the Wreath-laying Ceremony at the Wainwright Monument, and the Departure Ceremony. She will not attend the meeting with President Marcos nor attend the briefing on the Malinta Tunnel.

Susan will depart Malacanang Palace at 8:26 a.m. for a walking tour of Fort Santiago, then on to the Cultural Center. After shopping very briefly in one of the local department stores, she will go to Ambassador Sullivan's residence for lunch with Peggy Sullivan and a swim. She will join you and Mrs. Ford at Pier #15 when you return from Corregidor.



BOAT TRIP TO CORREGIDOR

You and Mrs. Ford, accompanied by President and Mrs. Marcos, depart Malacanang Palace via motorcade at 7:55 a.m. for Pier #15 where you will board the Presidential Yacht "Ang Pangulo" for the 2 hour, 25 minute sail to Corregidor. Breakfast will be served on board. In attendance will be approximately 25 members of the Official Parties. Following breakfast, you and President Marcos, along with Secretary Kissinger and Foreign Secretary Romulo, meet in an adjacent room for sixty minutes.

WREATH-LAYING CEREMONY AT CORREGIDOR - TOUR OF MALINTA TUNNEL

By the time the meeting concludes, the boat will have arrived at Corregidor where you and President Marcos participate in a Wreath-laying Ceremony at Wainwright Monument, the location where General Wainwright surrendered the Joint U.S. -Philippine forces to the Japanese in May 1942. You then proceed on foot to the Malinta Tunnel where you receive a briefing.

Corregidor is one of two historic islands located in the entrance to Manila Bay. During the Spanish occupation, the Island served as a fortress to protect the entrance to the Bay. Shortly after Admiral Dewey's defeat of the Spanish Armada in 1898, U.S. Forces began an extensive program of arming the Island.

Corregidor gained notoreity during World War II when it served as the Headquarters for General Douglas MacArthur and President Quezon. As the Japanese swept through Bataan, American and Philippine forces retreated to Corregidor and held out for 27 days against insurmountable odds. On the 27th day, General Wainwright surrendered the Joint U.S. - Philippine Forces to the Japanese and it is upon that spot that a marker was established. This is where you and President Marcos will lay the wreaths in today's ceremony.

Malinta Tunnel served as the actual headquarters on the Island for General MacArthur and President Quezon and consists of an elaborate and extensive network of tunnels built into the side of the "rock". It is said that President Marcos, while with the Philippine Forces, acted as a courier between the headquarters' tunnel and outlying areas.



MANILA DEPARTURE CEREMONY

The Departure Ceremony includes a 21-gun salute, the National Anthems, Inspection of the Honor Guard, and Farewell Statements. After bidding the GOP Official Party and President and Mrs. Marcos farewell, you board Air Force One and depart en route the 10-hour flight to Hickam Air Force Base, Honolulu, Hawaii. (Time Change: + 6 hours, and lose one day.)

OVERVIEW

You have 3 events scheduled for your stop in Honolulu: (1) Wreath-Laying Ceremony at the USS Arizona Memorial; (2) Breakfast with Community Leaders; and (3) Address at the East-West Cultural Center, University of Hawaii, followed by a Reception for the East-West Cultural Center Leadership.

Mrs. Ford and Susan will participate in all three events. Since Mrs. Ford is remaining in Honolulu, you will bid her goodbye at the Cultural Center as you depart for the airport.

ARRIVAL IN HONOLULU

Air Force One arrives Hickam AFB at 7:15 a.m. and you will be greeted by Governor and Mrs. George R. Ariyoshi, Senator and Mrs. Hiram L. Fong, Representative Spark Matsunaga, Admiral and Mrs. Noel Gayler, MGEN C. C. Patillo, PACAF Deputy Commander, and Acting Honolulu Mayor Richard K. Sharpless.

Accompanied by Admiral and Mrs. Gayler, you proceed via motorcade to the CINCPACFLT Aiea Boat Dock, board the CINCPACFLT Launch and depart for the USS ARIZONA Memorial (10-minute cruise).



WREATH-LAYING CEREMONY - USS ARIZONA MEMORIAL

The Ceremony at the USS Arizona Memorial includes remarks and the laying of a wreath. (Admiral Gayler will introduce you.) In addition, you will silently observe the laying of approximately 30 wreaths by representatives of patriotic groups.

The USS Arizona Memorial spans the sunken hull of the battleship USS Arizona which rests in 38 feet of water at the bottom of Pearl Harbor.

An enclosed bridge touching no part of the ship itself, the 184-foot memorial is supported by two 250-ton concrete girders resting on 36 pre-stressed pilings. It varies in width from 27 feet at the center to 36 feet at the ends and in height from 14 feet at the center to 21 feet at the ends.

The memorial is divided into three sections: The museum room, housing mementos from the ship; the assembly area, which can accommodate 200 persons for ceremonies; and the shrine room, where on a large marble wall are engraved the names of the 1,177 Navy men and Marines who were killed on the USS Arizona in the Pearl Harbor attack.

Construction of the memorial was authorized by the 85th Congress and approved by President Eisenhower in 1958. A bill appropriating \$150,000 for construction was passed by the 87th Congress and signed by President Kennedy in 1961. Under sponsorship of the Pacific War Memorial Commission, the remaining funds were raised through public contributions, including \$100,000 donated by the State of Hawaii. The memorial was dedicated on Memorial Day, 1962.

ADMIRAL AND MRS. GAYLER'S BREAKFAST FOR COMMUNITY LEADERS

Following the ceremony, you proceed via launch and motorcade to "Quarters A" for breakfast with approximately 70 community leaders and military personnel. The breakfast is hosted by Admiral and Mrs. Gayler.

Following the hour-long breakfast, you and Mrs. Ford board your motorcade and depart "Quarters A" at 9:50 a.m. for the 20-minute drive to the John F. Kennedy Theater of the East-West Center, University of Hawaii.



EAST-WEST CULTURAL CENTER - UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII

Upon arrival at the John F. Kennedy Theater, East-West Cultural Center, you will be met by Dr. and Mrs. Everett Kleinjans, President, and escorted to a holding room for 40 minutes personal time. (Mrs. Ford and Susan will remain in an adjacent room.)

Dr. Kleinjans introduces you for remarks which will be carried over LIVE LOCAL PUBLIC TELEVISION. Approximately 600 will be in attendance in the Theater.

The East-West Center (formally known as the Center for Cultural and Technical Interchange between East and West, Inc.) was established by the U.S. Congress in 1960 to foster better relations and understanding among the peoples of the United States, Asia, and the Pacific Islands through programs of cooperative study, training and research.

The Center awards grants to students for degree work at the University of Hawaii and to outstanding scholars and specialists to carry out research related to one of the five institutes of the Center: Culture Learning, Communications, Technology and Development, Food and Population. In addition, the Center staff carries out programs of research and training.

During 1975, 1,350 Asian and American students and specialists participated in Center programs. Since 1960 more than 27,000 grants have been awarded.

At present, the Center is funded almost entirely by the U.S. Congress, through the Department of State. The FY 1975 Congressional allocation amounted to \$7,400,000.

At the conclusion of your remarks, Dr. Kleinjans escorts you to an adjacent Reception Room where you informally greet 30 East-West Cultural Center leaders.

The reception concludes at 11:50 a.m., you bid Mrs. Ford goodbye, and board your motorcade for the 30-minute drive to Hickam AFB.

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The flight back to Washington requires 8 hours and 45 minutes, with a +5 hour time change. Senator Fong, Representative Matsunaga and Dr. Felts will accompany you on the flight.

SUBJECT: Invitation to You to Participate in
PFC/GOP Fund Raiser in Hawaii

You have been invited to participate as guest of honor in a fund raising reception and dinner (or some similar combination) given by the President Ford Committee of Hawaii and the (PFC) Hawaiian State Republican Committee during your stay in Hawaii. They can be flexible on the date, however, I would suggest Tuesday evening, December 9th, just prior to your departure for the mainland.

The positive reasons for doing this include the fact that both the President Ford Committee and the Hawaiian Republican Committee urgently need to raise money and because you will be there, this would be a relatively simple way for them to have a major fund raiser. The negative points include: your purpose in staying is basically to rest and have some personal time following the trip to China and before returning to Christmas preparations. Also, this trip to China will have been a major international diplomatic trip for you and the President. Will your participation in the political function in a warm and sunny climate dilute the principal impact of that mission?



The following are in-house points of view:

Gwen Anderson and Jack Calkins

Gwen (who is now out of town) initially called to explain this invitation which had originally been extended to the President but when they learned he was not staying and you were planning to, they are extending it to you. Based on her knowledge of their fund raising needs, Gwen, of course, is very hopeful you will have the opportunity to do this. I mentioned to Jack the question of this following an important trip and he did not see this as a concern but felt, of course, that this would be something you and the President needed to decide.

Barry Roth

Barry Roth of the Counsel's Office has signed off on your doing this from a legal point of view. The President Ford Committee of Hawaii and the Hawaiian State Republican Committee have offered to pay your expenses, as this leg of the trip would now have a political billing. In a word, Counsel's Office has given the okay on this with appropriate billing.

Bill Nicholson

Bill strongly feels that adding this political event can be misconstrued and could appear to be taking advantage of the trip. He suggests, however, as an alternative, attending a reception and dinner given by a private individual to which potential contributors could be invited as private guests and afterwards could be sent a mailing. The invitation and dinner itself would have no money attached. This would show your interest and encouragement. It would



mean inevitably a substantially smaller intake of funds for them. On the other hand they would not have the costs of the airplane, etc.

Terry O'Donnell

Terry does not see problems with your doing this, and his feeling is once the President is back to the White House, the trip is over. Thus he sees no problem with it.

Jerry Jones

I attempted to get Jerry Jones' views but was unsuccessful. Thus, I will touch base with him tomorrow and relay to you his comments.

Sheila Weidenfeld

Sheila has some concerns about concluding a diplomatic trip with a political event but does think the private dinner is a possibility.

My own feelings are a hesitation about doing it. Your ostensible reason for staying is to have a quiet stay and an opportunity to rest and relax and I would be glad to see you do just that: with no events, even the school visit. I also share the views of concern with regard to mixing a political event--though minor in the greater scheme of things--into a mission of international importance. I understand the Vice President is going to be vacationing in Hawaii in December. In an effort to help the Hawaiian GOP and the President Ford Committee, I wonder if he could be encouraged to do a fund raiser while he is there. I doubt he would raise as much money for them as you or the President, but this might get around the problem of the political event mixed in with the diplomatic trip.

GERALD R FORD LIBRARY

Attending the 5:00 reception today for the President Ford Committee Chairmen was Mr. Chin, Chairman of the President Ford Finance Committee in Hawaii. He may have spoken to the President about this.

I am sure this invitation is something you and the President will want to discuss and decide. As you can see you have a rainbow of points of view.
