In Iowa, the President leads Muskie and Kennedy by 8% and is 18% ahead of Humphrey. The undecided vote is less than 7%.

When Wallace is included on the ballot, the President's lead increases slightly over all candidates and the undecided remains the same.

On the Nixon/Muskie/Wallace ballot, the President's strength follows traditional Republican lines. He trails substantially among Catholics but is ahead nationally. The trade off between Republicans and Democrats is even for Muskie and the President, but the President receives over half of the ticket-splitters.

The President's overall approval rating is 57% with 35% disapproving. His rating on Vietnam and the economy are slightly higher than the national average. Catholics split evenly on the President's general job approval rating.

Over twice as many voters are able to rate the President's ability to handle issues as are able to rate Muskie. As in other states Kennedy is better known than Muskie, but still far behind the President. It can be assumed that there is a possibility Muskie and Kennedy will increase their share of the total vote as more voters are able to rate their abilities. The President appears to be most vulnerable on unemployment and drugs.

Iowa has a high proportion of rural and farm residents. These people tend to favor the President at a higher level than the state and national averages. Agriculture and farm problems are mentioned more often than the state average but still lag far behind the typical state problems of taxes and unemployment. There is no reason to expect that the farm vote will not support the President at least equally as strongly as it did in 1968.

Governor Ray, Senator Hughes, and Senator Miller all receive high approval ratings. Ray, whose term expires this year, is ahead of his Democrat opponent, Paul Franzerberg, with 60% compared to Franzerberg's 31% with 9% undecided.

The President is in good shape in Iowa and no serious compaign problems exist. He can be expected to win by at least 1968's margin.

In North Carolina, the President enjoys a substantial lead against all candidates. In the two way races, Mixon leads Muskie by 19% and Humphrey by 25%. Kennedy is the strongest Democratic contender; however, he is still 14% behind the President.

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Although the margin for Nixon declines in all races when Wallace is on the ballot, the President is still able to maintain a substantial lead. Nixon loses a substantial number of Republican voters to Wallace; however, he receives more Democratic votes to achieve a net gain on tradeoff.

Relative to Muskie, the President runs well with all voter groups, especially ticket-splitters and younger voters under age 35. The percentage of black voters for Nixon is more than twice the national level.

The President's approval rating among all voters is 57%, with 28% disapproving. This is slightly better than the national level. Younger voters (under 35) have a significantly higher level of approval than the national average. Younger voters also display greater approval of Nixon's handling of Vietnam and the economy.

Awareness of the President's ability to handle specific issues far exceeds that of his Democratic rivals. Only 37% are aware of Muskie's abilities while 63% are aware of Kennedy's. Awareness of the President's abilities to handle issues ranges from 85% to 97%. Nixon was rated lowest on his ability to handle problems relating to drugs, unemployment, and bussing.

The most important national issues are Vietnam, the economy and drugs. On the state level, the leading issues are drug abuse, education, and unemployment.

The opinion of North Carolina voters on school desegregation should be given special consideration because of the recent decision of the U.S. Supreme Court in Swann v. Charlotte-Mecklenburg Board of Education directly affecting a large metropolitan area in this state. Even with all of the publicity given to the case, only 1% said that school integration was the single most important problem facing the nation. Bussing is only mentioned by 8% when voters were asked the greatest problem facing the state. Throughout all of the bussing controversy, 60% of the North Carolina voters are in favor of school integration. When voters were asked to select the greatest failure of the President from an issue list (including bussing), 22% indicated selected the bussing answer. Bussing does not become important until it is mentioned and emphasized.

In general 60% of the voters approve of the treatment of blacks under the administration. Among blacks the approval rate is 47% favorable compared to 20% unfavorable Both figures of approval are higher in North Carolina than the rest of the country.

Republican senatorial candidate James Broyhill and James Gardner run substantially behind Democratic incumbent Everett Jordan. Gardner does very well with ticket-splitters (51%), compared to Broyhill who runs poorly with this voter group (16%). Broyhill is also weak among Republicans. Democratic gubernatorial candidate, Pat Taylor has a substantial lead over James Gardner and James Holshouser. Both Republican candidates do poorly with ticket-splitters. Senator Everett Jordan has an approval rate of 47% with 9% disapproving and 44% unable to answer.

CAMPAIGN IMPLICATIONS

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North Carolina is a safe state if either Muskie or Humphrey receives the nomination, regardless of whether Wallace is on the ballot.

Because of the likelihood of Muskie or Humphrey being chosen, North Carolina is not a priority state at the present time. If Kennedy receives the nomination, we should take an additional look at North Carolina them.

If North Carolina is typical of other border states, the President's ability to continue to attract ticket-splitters and particularly young voters in these states will be very important. It appears that young voters in the border states and in the South are much more inclined to support the President than they are in other regions of the country. Therefore, in these states the President's increased support among young voters may well help him offset the lack of behavorial Republicans in the electorate.

The data on school bussing from North Carolina is important in dealing with this problem nationally. The problem is not foremost in the voters mind and until it is mentioned, there are no negative implications for the President. In other words, the President's "low profile - voluntary compliance" approach has been effective, and should be continued here and elsewhere.
