You asked me to follow up on an amendment to subject measure.

The Domestic Council drafted an amendment to this legislation which grants to the President broad waiver authority based on "national interest".

Cabinet officers, departmental legislative personnel and industry lobbyists are hard at work trying to defeat the bill.

Sen. Norris Cotton is the leader of forces against the bill but is willing to offer and fight for the amendment. He is not optimistic about having it adopted however.

Therefore a decision needs to be made regarding your position should waiver authority not be granted in any cargo preference legislation reaching your desk.
