The purpose of the Executive order and the OMB implementing procedures is to increase awareness of Government decisionmakers of the full economic impacts of their actions. From the outset, we have attempted to avoid the creation of a cumbersome bureaucratic device like the environmental impact statement. Accordingly, in our guidance to agencies we included a provision for exempting agencies which do not propose major legislation, rules or regulations.

Under that provision, we believe the agencies listed below should be exempted from the procedural requirements of the OMB Circular. In these instances, there is little likelihood that agency actions will warrant detailed cost analyses. The Council on Wage and Price Stability concurs in these recommended exemptions. Naturally, these exemptions will be subject to review at any time should a change in agency authority or activities so warrant.

Independent Agencies

As you may be aware, most independent regulatory agencies have made the legal argument that they are not covered by your Executive order on inflation impact statements. Many, however, have indicated support of your policy and willingness to cooperate with this initiative. Clearly, none of these agencies ought to be granted an exemption.
