DONALD R. BRAYTON of Marguerita, Canal Zone, Deputy Director, Transportation and Terminals Bureau, Fanama Canal Company, for dynamic leadership, as Manager of the Panama Railroad, in moving the railroad from a condition of financial and operational crisis to a safe, successful, and reliable means of transportation. In his dedicated efforts to reshape the Railroad Division into a more effective and efficient unit, Mr. Brayton replaced outdated rolling stock at a savings of \$4,825,000, reduced personnel by 20%, and implemented a systematic preventive maintenance program. As a result of his efforts, passenger and freight schedules were increased substantially and Panama was provided with its only effective means of mass transit for moving people and supplies across the Isthmus.

LYLE D. COPMANN of McLean, Virginia, Assistant Director, Press and Publications Service, United States Information Agency, for successfully modernizing and streamlining the complex production and distribution network for overseas dissemination of editorial materials about the United States, its people, culture, and policies. Under Mr. Copmann's leadership, the number of magazines published by the United States Information Agency was reduced from 56 to 16 with a consequent savings of \$1 million per year, the daily transmission total for the Wireless File dropped from 22 1/2 hours to 18 1/2 hours resulting in a savings of \$60,400 per year, and 51 positions were climinated representing an annual savings of \$816,000. Through all of these changes, Mr. Copmann's orderly, cohesive style of management has molded one of the Agency's largest, most diversely specialized staffs into a tightly-knit, highly professional team.

XAVIER F. CORLIS of Hartford, Connecticut, Senior Master Sergeant, Laser Division, Air Force Weapons Laboratory, Department of the Air Force, for outstanding initiative in the procurement of deuterium (D₂), at a cost well below current market rates, for use in the development of chemical lasers, an essential part of Air Force weapons research. Acting on his own, SMSgt. Corlis purchased heavy water (D₂O), from the Atomic Energy Commission, isolated the deuterium at AEC's hydrogen-conversion plant at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, used surplus gas cylinders and trailers to store and transport the gas, and ordered the deuterium in large enough quantities to reduce the cost substantially. Documented savings from this low cost method of purchase were in excess of \$2.9 million during fiscal years 1973 and 1974.

MEYER LEPOR of San Diego, California, Physicist, Naval Undersea Center, Department of the Navy, for his perseverance and ingenuity in applying value engineering to the redesign of the acoustic barrier treatment for the SSN 688 Class submarine. Following a thorough study of the excessive sound levels generated by active sonar on submarines, Mr. Lepor discovered that substantial cost savings could be realized by reducing the barrier thickness one inch, altering the composition of the binder between layers, and changing the method of attachment, while retaining a satisfactory level of transmission loss. First year measurable savings, as validated by the Navy Cost Reduction Program Office, were \$7,656,040.

HUGH F. MCKENNA of Lutherville, Maryland, Director, Bureau of Retirement and Survivors Insurance, Social Security Administration, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, for innovative leadership, employing advanced management techniques, which has resulted in sharp reductions in the processing time of payments to beneficiaries and vast improvements in employee morale and the caliber of managerial talent within the Bureau of Retirement and Survivors Insurance. Significant among his managerial improvement efforts were the use of team building and participative management, a broad decentralization of program responsibility, and the initiation of building and office landscaping programs which were essential from an operational standpoint and supportive of his organizational restructuring.

CLIFFORD A. MYERS, JR. of Fort Collins, Colorado, Research Forester, Rocky Mountain Forest and Range Experiment Station, Forest Service, Department of Agriculture, for exceptional contributions to the science of forest land management through the conception, design, and implementation of computer-assisted forest management procedures. Using Dr. Myers' computer simulation processes, forest managers can, at any time, examine how various management decisions would effect long-term forest growth, yield, and monetary return, in view of current economic considerations and unexpected natural factors affecting forest growth. As a result of Dr. Myers' outstanding efforts, timber management reports are now being produced with 60% cost savings and these reports can be updated realizing 90% savings as compared to previous procedures

GERALD E. NEUMANN of Falls Church, Virginia, Director, Program Control and Analysis Staff, Office of Construction, Veterans Administration, for the development and implementation of a computer-based Management Information System to monitor all Veterans Administration construction projects from inception to completion, and, in so doing, to provide modern, vitally needed patient care for our Nation's veterans. The introduction of this system, following several years of streamlining and reorganizing, has aided immensely the management and control of project costs and schedules and provided better developmental planning for construction, particularly on modernization projects involving the movement of patients. Additional benefits to the Veterans Administration include the ability to validate contractor claims, the establishment of a common data base for construction information, and the consolidation of computer services.

CAPTAIN JOHN M. WOLFF of Danville, California, Commanding Officer, Naval Air Rework Facility, Alameda, California, Department of the Navy, for dealing successfully with the unparalleled challenges of change confronting the Naval Air Rework Facility, Alameda, during Fiscal Year 1974. At the beginning of the year, every facet of the Facility's operations and relations with the various components of the fleet was undergoing tremendous change. Captain Wolff instituted management improvements which revitalized the work force and the organization, while, at the same time, surpassing Federal, Naval, and self-imposed performance standards and goals in every segment of the Facility's complex operations.

ADMINISTRATIVE MANAGEMENT TEAM of Cincinnati, Ohio, National Environmental Research Center, Environmental Protection Agency, for effecting a quiet revolution in administrative management at the National Environmental Research Center; from fragmentation and disarray to unification and order. Over a two year period this team systematically applied management techniques to eliminate outmoded and unnecessary functions, improve operating methods and procedures, and consolidate organizational functions, which placed the Office of Administration in full service partnership with the operating technical and scientific components of the Center. Many of the innovative techniques employed by this team are now being used throughout the Environmental Protection Agency with excellent results.

FOURTEENTH AEROSPACE FORCE, Aerospace Defense Command, Department of the Air Force, for vast improvements in the U.S. Air Force's missile warning and space surveillance systems which have nearly doubled the warning time available in the event of attack. Command and control procedures were developed and implemented which assure the nation's decision makers almost instantaneous warning of land and sea-launched missile attacks on a global basis. Total validated Resources Conservation Program savings were \$1,263,300, which represents 294% of the assigned goal, and 60 manpower spaces were eliminated with an additional cost savings of \$532,000.

MEMBERS OF A TEAM TO STUDY HANDLING AND SHIPPING OF COINS, Bureau of the Mint, Department of the Treasury, for achieving substantial productivity gains in the handling and distribution of coins. To avoid problems inherent in the use of wooden pallets, which were inefficient because they required hand loading and unloading, members of the team devised a method of using easily stacked and transported steel pallets at the Philadelphia Mint. Over the past five years, the number of coins disbursed per manhour at Philadelphia has increased dramatically, from 114,930 in 1969 to 255,160 in 1973. The use of the steel pallets within U.S. Mints and Federal Reserve Banks has also greatly enhanced the efficiency of space utilization, sharply reduced loading and unloading time, and led to a decrease in transportation costs.

MARINER VENUS-MERCURY 1973 MANAGEMENT TEAM, NASA Headquarters and the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, National Aeronautics and Space Administration, for exceptional innovation in the management of the Mariner Venus-Mercury project, launched November 3, 1973. The success of this flight, which operated under severe cost restraints, was highlighted by the first utilization of a gravity-assist concept to permit a single spacecraft to go to more than one planet and the development of effective cost control techniques, now being used on other NASA projects. The scientific benefits accruing from this mission are extensive; particularly the addition of new data to better our understanding of the two planets and the Earth.

All Federal departments and agencies were invited to submit nominations for this honorary award. A committee composed of representatives from the Office of Management and Budget, the General Services Administration, and the Civil Service Commission advised the President on final selection. The twelve most exceptional contributions toward reducing costs and improving operating practices in the Federal Government were selected.

The Presidential Management Improvement Awards are in the form of plaques with the following citation:

DONALD R. BRAYTON of Marguerita, Canal Zone, Deputy Director, Transportation and Terminals Bureau, Panama Canal Company, for dynamic leadership, as Manager of the Panama Railroad, in moving the railroad from a condition of financial and operational crisis to a safe, successful, and reliable means of transportation. In his dedicated efforts to reshape the Railroad Division into a more effective and efficient unit, Mr. Brayton replaced outdated rolling stock at a savings of \$4,825,000, reduced personnel by 20%, and implemented a systematic preventive maintenance program. As a result of his efforts, passenger and freight schedules were increased substantially and Panama was provided with its only effective means of mass transit for moving people and supplies across the Isthmus.

LYLE D. COPMANN of McLean, Virginia, Assistant Director, Press and Publications Service, United States Information Agency, for successfully modernizing and streamlining the complex production and distribution network for overseas dissemination of editorial materials about the United States, its people, culture, and policies. Under Mr. Copmann's leadership, the number of magazines published by the United States Information Agency was reduced from 56 to 16 with a consequent savings of \$1 million per year, the daily transmission total for the Wireless File dropped from 22 1/2 hours to 18 1/2 hours resulting in a savings of \$60,400 per year, and 51 positions were eliminated representing an annual savings of \$816,000. Through all of these changes, Mr. Copmann's orderly, cohesive style of management has molded one of the Agency's largest, most diversely specialized staffs into a tightly-knit, highly professional team.

XAVIER F. CORLIS of Hartford, Connecticut, Senior Master Sergeant, Laser Division, Air Force Weapons Laboratory, Department of the Air Force, for outstanding initiative in the procurement of deuterium (D₂), at a cost well below current market rates, for use in the development of chemical lasers, an essential part of Air Force weapons research. Acting on his own, SMSgt. Corlis purchased heavy water (D₂0), from the Atomic Energy Commission, isolated the deuterium at AEC's hydrogen-conversion plant at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, used surplus gas cylinders and trailers to store and transport the gas, and ordered the deuterium in large enough quantities to reduce the cost substantially. Documented savings from this low cost method of purchase were in excess of \$2.9 million during fiscal years 1973 and 1974.

MEYER LEPOR of San Diego, California, Physicist, Naval Undersea Center, Department of the Navy, for his perseverance and ingenuity in applying value engineering to the redesign of the acoustic barrier treatment for the SSN 688 Class submarine. Following a thorough study of the excessive sound levels generated by active sonar on submarines, Mr. Lepor discovered that substantial cost savings could be realized by reducing the barrier thickness one inch, altering the composition of the binder between layers, and changing the method of attachment, while retaining a satisfactory level of transmission loss. First year measurable savings, as validated by the Navy Cost Reduction Program Office, were \$7,656,040.

HUGH F. MCKENNA of Lutherville, Maryland, Director, Bureau of Retirement and Survivors Insurance, Social Security Administration, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, for innovative leadership, employing advanced management techniques, which has resulted in sharp reductions in the processing time of payments to beneficiaries and vast improvements in employee morale and the caliber of managerial talent within the Bureau of Retirement and Survivors Insurance. Significant among his managerial improvement efforts were the use of team building and participative management, a broad decentralization of program responsibility, and the initiation of building and office landscaping programs which were essential from an operational standpoint and supportive of his organizational restructuring.

CLIFFORD A. MYERS, JR. of Fort Collins, Colorado, Research Forester, Rocky Mountain Forest and Range Experiment Station, Forest Service, Department of Agriculture, for exceptional contributions to the science of forest land management through the conception, design, and implementation of computer-assisted forest management procedures. Using Dr. Myers' computer simulation processes, forest managers can, at any time, examine how various management decisions would effect long-term forest growth, yield, and monetary return, in view of current economic considerations and unexpected natural factors affecting forest growth. As a result of Dr. Myers' outstanding efforts, timber management reports are now being produced with 60% cost savings and these reports can be updated realizing 90% savings as compared to previous procedures.

GERALD E. NEUMANN of Falls Church, Virginia, Director, Program Control and Analysis Staff, Office of Construction, Veterans Administration, for the development and implementation of a computer-based Management Information System to monitor all Veterans Administration construction projects from inception to completion, and, in so doing, to provide modern, vitally needed patient care for our Nation's veterans. The introduction of this system, following several years of streamlining and reorganizing, has aided immensely the management and control of project costs and schedules and provided better developmental planning for construction, particularly on modernization projects involving the movement of patients. Additional benefits to the Veterans Administration include the ability to validate contractor claims, the establishment of a common data base for construction information, and the consolidation of computer services.

CAPTAIN JOHN M. WOLFF of Danville, California, Commanding Officer, Naval Air Rework Facility, Alameda, California, Department of the Navy, for dealing successfully with the unparalleled challenges of change confronting the Naval Air Rework Facility, Alameda, during Fiscal Year 1974. At the beginning of the year, every facet of the Facility's operations and relations with the various components of the fleet was undergoing tremendous change. Captain Wolff instituted management improvements which revitalized the work force and the organization, while, at the same time, surpassing Federal, Naval, and self-imposed performance standards and goals in every segment of the Facility's complex operations.

ADMINISTRATIVE MANAGEMENT TEAM of Cincinnati, Ohio, National Environmental Research Center, Environmental Protection Agency, for effecting a quiet revolution in administrative management at the National Environmental Research Center; from fragmentation and disarray to unification and order. Over a two year period this team systematically applied management techniques to eliminate outmoded and unnecessary functions, improve operating methods and procedures, and consolidate organizational functions, which placed the Office of Administration in full service partnership with the operating technical and scientific components of the Center. Many of the innovative techniques employed by this team are now being used throughout the Environmental Protection Agency with excellent results.

FOURTEENTH AEROSPACE FORCE, Aerospace Defense Command, Department of the Air Force, for vast improvements in the U.S. Air Force's missile warning and space surveillance systems which have nearly doubled the warning time available in the event of attack. Command and control procedures were developed and implemented which assure the nation's decision makers almost instantaneous warning of land and sea-launched missile attacks on a global basis. Total validated Resources Conservation Program savings were \$1,263,300, which represents 294% of the assigned goal, and 60 manpower spaces were eliminated with an additional cost savings of \$532,000.

MEMBERS OF A TEAM TO STUDY HANDLING AND SHIPPING OF COINS, Bureau of the Mint, Department of the Treasury, for achieving substantial productivity gains in the handling and distribution of coins. To avoid problems inherent in the use of wooden pallets, which were inefficient because they required hand loading and unloading, members of the team devised a method of using easily stacked and transported steel pallets at the Philadelphia Mint. Over the past five years, the number of coins disbursed per manhour at Philadelphia has increased dramatically, from 114,930 in 1969 to 255,160 in 1973. The use of the steel pallets within U.S. Mints and Federal Reserve Banks has also greatly enhanced the efficiency of space utilization, sharply reduced loading and unloading time, and led to a decrease in transportation costs.

MARINER VENUS-MERCURY 1973 MANAGEMENT TEAM, NASA Headquarters and the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, National Aeronautics and Space Administration, for exceptional innovation in the management of the Mariner Venus-Mercury project, launched November 3, 1973. The success of this flight, which operated under severe cost restraints, was highlighted by the first utilization of a gravity-assist concept to permit a single spacecraft to go to more than one planet and the development of effective cost control techniques, now being used on other NASA projects. The scientific benefits accruing from this mission are extensive; particularly the addition of new data to better our understanding of the two planets and the Earth.

All Federal departments and agencies were invited to submit nominations for this honorary award. A committee composed of representatives from the Office of Management and Budget, the General Services Administration, and the Civil Service Commission advised the President on final selection. The twelve most exceptional contributions toward reducing costs and improving operating practices in the Federal Government were selected.

The Presidential Management Improvement Awards are in the form of plaques with the following citation:

"For achievement of outstanding improvements in Government operations.

Your innovative skills and dedication exemplify the qualities which have made this Country strong"
