SUBJECT: Follow-Up on Cabinet Discussion
of Affirmative Action

My notes on the Cabinet meeting last Wednesday, June 25th, indicate that the discussion on affirmative action, contract compliance, and funding cut off by federal agencies did not reach a conclusion. Attorney General Levi asked at the end of the meeting if the subject could be brought up again for discussion at Cabinet, and you indicated that it could. Given the high level of interest on the part of Secretary Dunlop, Secretary Weinberger, Secretary Coleman, the Attorney General and some others on the White House staff, particularly Bob Goldwin, you may wish to initiate some further activity prior to the next Cabinet meeting. Responsibility for follow-up most appropriately would be given to Jim Cannon. Do you wish me to inform him that he has the responsibility.
