CONFERENCE REPORT ON H.R. 4222. NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH ACT

Mr. PERKINS submitted the following conference report and statement on the bill (H.R. 4222), National School Lunch Act:

CONFERENCE REPORT (H. REPT. No. 94-427)

The committee of conference on the disagreeing votes of the two Houses on the amendment of the Senate to the bill (H.E. 4222) to amend the National School Lunch Act and the Child Nutrition Act of 1966 in order to extend and revise the special food service program for children and the school breakfast program, and for other purposes related to strengthening the school lunch and child nutrition programs, having met, after full and free conference, have agreed to recommend and do recommend to their respective Houses as follows:

That the House recede from its disagreement to the amendment of the Senate and agree to the same with an amendment as follows: In lieu of the matter proposed to be inserted by the Senate amendment insert the following:

That this Act may be cited as the "National School Lunch Act and Child Nutrition Act of 1966 Amendments of 1975".

SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM

SEC. 2. Section 4(a) of the Child Nutrition Act of 1966 (80 Stat. 885, as amended) is amended by striking out "for the fiscal years ending June 30, 1973, June 30, 1974, and June 30, 1975,".

SEC. 3. Section 4 of the Child Nutrition Act of 1966 is amended by adding at the end thereof the following new subsection:

"(g) As a national nutrition and health policy, it is the purpose and intent of the Congress that the school breakfast program be made available in all schools where it is needed to provide adequate nutrition for children in attendance. The Secretary is hereby directed, in cooperation with State educational agencies, to carry out a program of information in furtherance of this policy. Within 4 months after the enactment of this subsection, the Secretary shall report to the committees of jurisdiction in the Congress his plans and those of the cooperating State agencies to bring about the needed expansion in the school breakfast program.".

Sec. 4. Section 6(b) of the National School Lunch Act (60 Stat. 230, as amended) 15 amended-

- (a) By striking out "nonprofit private" the first time such term occurs in the provise of the third sentence and inserting in her thereof "any of the".
- (b) By striking out "nonprofit private the second time such term occurs in the proviso of the third sentence and inserting in lieu thereof "such".

SEC. 2. Subsection (a) of section 3: the Act is amended to read: "The Secr shall designate any area in the United Si Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands a emergency area if he finds that a na disaster has occurred in said area v substantially affected farming, ranching aquaculture operations. For purposes of subtitle 'acquaculture' means husband aquatic organisms under a controlle selected environment.".

SEC. 3. Subsection (b) of section 3: the Act is amended as follows:

(a) in the first sentence after the v
"major disaster" insert "or emerge
strike the words "oyster planters"
"oyster planting" and insert in lieu th the words "persons engaged in aquaculi and "aquaculture", respectively; and

(d) delete everything after the first tence, strike the period, and insert: are unable to obtain sufficient credit where to finance their actual needs at sonable rates and terms, taking into co eration prevailing private and cooper rates and terms in the community in or which the applicant resides for loans similar purposes and periods of time, provisions of this subsection shall no applicable to loan applications filed pri July 9, 1975.".

SEC. 4. Section 322 of the Act is anie to read: "Loans may be made under subtitle for any of the purposes autho for loans under subtitle A or B of this as well as for crop or livestock che deemed desirable by the applicant: Prot That such loans may include, but are limited to, the amount of the actual sustained as a result of the disaster.".

Sec. 5. Section 324 of the Act is ame to read: "Loans made or insured under Act shall be (1) at a rate of interest n excess of 5 per centum per annum on up to the amount of the actual loss of by the disaster, and (2) for any lear portions of loans in excess of that amthe interest rate will be that prevailly the private market for similar loans, a termined by the Secretary, All such shall be repayable at such times as the S tary may determine, taking into accounpurposes of the loan and the nature effect of the disaster, but not later than vided for loans for similar purposes t subtitles A and B of this title, and upor full personal liability of the borrower upon the best security available, as the
