- -- adds to deficit (as shown above);
- -- about half of deficit increase would be for Defense;
- -- Congress may disagree on individual items. That is their prerogative. But at least there should be opportunity for Senate to consider;
- -- Some of the funds could not be used in any case (Examples include State Department contributions to International Organizations and to International Trade Negotiations.)

 It makes no sense not to rescind funds that cannot be used.
- 2. All of the funds proposed for rescission have been released in compliance with law. (HUD "235" funds and \$13 million for Agriculture's Water Bank and Commerce's NOAA program have not been released because action now is not required in our view.) However,



^{1.} It is extremely important that Senate take action on this rescission bill. Failure to do so causes problems:

the release is not an obstacle to rescission. The Congress has the constitutional authority to rescind appropriations any time before their obligation.

3. House Appropriations Committee has reported on another rescission bill (H.R. 4075) involving \$1.2 billion in proposed rescissions (with outlay savings of \$300 million in 1975 and \$550 million in 1976). If the Senate takes no action on the first of this session's rescission bills, it is likely to discourage further movement of the next bill. Surely, the Congress should be able to vote rescission proposals up or down.

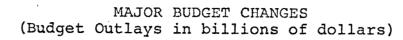

- ° reducing controllable non-salary costs by 15%. Deferral of planned change-of-station and home leave travel will hinder the effective deployment of the Foreign Service and seriously affect morale.

THE WHITE HOUSE

TO THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES:

I herewith report on additional deferrals for the fiscal year 1975, as required by the Congressional Budget and Impoundment Control Act of 1974. These deferral actions have been taken to reduce the inflationary effects of the Public Works for Water and Power Development and Atomic Energy Commission Appropriation Act of 1975 (Public Law 93-393). When I approved the Act, I did so with the hope and expectation that the Congress would work in cooperation with the Executive Branch to defer for one full year the expenditure of that amount of appropriated funds which would contribute excessively to inflationary government spending.

The deferral actions reported today decrease the amount of budget authority which would otherwise be available in the fiscal year 1975 by nearly \$82 million and thereby keep Federal spending from rising nearly \$57 million above current estimates. If the Congress and the President are to keep Federal outlays for the fiscal year 1975 within \$300 billion, such measures as the ones reported here are essential.
