WASHINGTON (AP) -- A BIPARTISAN PANEL OF 12 HOUSE MEMBERS TODAY ANNOUNCED THEIR FORMATION OF AN ENVIRONMENTAL STUDY CONFERENCE TO COLLECT AND DISTRIBUTE WITHIN THE CONGRESS EVALUATED INFORMATION ON THE ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS AND COSTS OF LEGISLATION.

"THIS IS NO TIME TO HAVE THE ENVIRONMENTAL MOVEMENT SHRINK IN THE FACE OF THE ENERGY CRISIS," SAID REP. RICHARD OTTINGER, D-N.Y., PRINCIPAL ORGANIZER OF THE GROUP WITH REP. HENRY HEINZ, R-PA.

OTTINGER AND REP. GILBERT GUDE, R-MD., SAID THEY DID NOT ANTICIPATE THAT THE GROUP WOULD ISSUE ENDORSEMENTS OR REJECTIONS OF SPECIFIC BILLS. OTTINGER SAID THE GROUP WOULD "GATHER THE BEST INFORMATION, SCIENTIFIC AND TECHNOLOGICAL, AND THEN, I THINK, THE CONCLUSIONS WOULD SPEAK FOR THEMSELVES."

OTTINGER SAID THE QUESTIONS OF STAFFING, OFFICE SPACE AND FUNDS FOR THE GROUP HAVE NOT BEEN RESOLVED. SIMILAR GROUPS ARE OPERATED WITH STAFF AND MONEY FROM HOUSE MEMBERS' REGULAR OFFICE ALLOWANCES.

REP. KEN HECHLER, D-W.VA., A LEADING OPPONENT OF STRIP MINING, SAID THE GROUP'S SERVICES "WILL PREVENT THE KIND OF ECONOMIC BLACKMAIL THAT'S GOING ON IN THIS COUNTRY" WHEN AN INDUSTRY THAT WANTS TO CHANGE SITES SHUTS DOWN A PLANT AND BLAMES ANTI-POLLUTION STATUTES.

REP. JOHN DINGELL, D-MICH., SAID ENVIRONMENTALISTS WITHIN THE HOUSE HAVE LONG NEEDED A "REAL, INSIDE COORDINATING MECHANISM" TO DRAW ON FOR INFORMATION IN BATTLING FOR ANTI-POLLUTION MEASURES.

ALSO, HEINZ SAID, "WE'VE GOT TO SEE THAT ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION ISN'T MADE THE FALL GUY" IN ARGUMENTS OVER HIGHER FUEL COSTS AND INFLATION IN OTHER BASIC COMMODITIES.

HECHLER SAID THE GROUP'S MEMBERS ARE NOT "ANTI-ENERGY, BUT IT'S GOT TO BE CLEAN ENERGY" THAT DOES NOT ENDANGER PUBLIC HEALTH OR WATER AND AIR SUPPLIES.

REP. TIM WIRTH, D-COLO., A FRESHMAN, SAID THAT EVEN IN HIS MINERAL-RICH DISTRICT THE FACTS ARE INCOMPLETE ON VARIOUS FUEL-SUPPLY ISSUES AND ALTERNATIVES, AND THE ESC WOULD HELP NEW MEMBERS AND VETERANS SORT OUT THE "BEWILDERLY ARRAY" OF PROPOSALS AND ARGUMENTS.

Twelve Members of the House have circulated a "Dear Colleague" inviting other Members to join a bi-partisan Environmental Study Conference.

The prime movers are Richard Ottinger (D-NY) and John Heinz (R-Pa). The letter was sent January 24th to be received in Members' first mail deliveries on Monday, January 27th. (Conte, while not a co-signer, is one of the organizers.)

Signatories participated in a news conference at 11 a.m. today at which they explained the purpose of the Conference, as detailed in the attached hand-out.

The organizers stressed that this is to be a bi-partisan group which will seek to provide accurate and complete information to all interested Members. It will not be taking positions, on environmental issues, but will be a clearinghouse. (Staff members contrasted the good information available on strip mining bills as opposed to the misinformation on clean air which was abroad during last year's legislative battles.)

During questions and answers from media (few media representatives attended) Members stressed the following points:

..Energy and a clean environment are not incompatible; we must enlarge energy supplies while safeguarding the environment.

..In the current climate environmental issues are likely to be a the "fall guy" for economic and energy problems.

..Such a study conference will transcend committee jurisdictions, thus giving Members broader information than would be available from committee staffs.

..Details as to office space, staff, financing are yet to be worked out (partially dependent upon interest of Members), but, basically, it is expected that Members will share their clerk-hire allowances for staff.

..The organization meeting will be Monday, February 3rd, at 2 p.m.

All co-signers except Vander Jagt and Prossler participated in the news conference.

Dear Colleague:

We are proposing to start an Environmental Study Conference, the tentative purposes of which are:

1. To give all Members interested in environmental legislation a vehicle for furthering their environmental goals.

2. To collect information about environmental problems and solutions, from knowledgeable institutions and organizations.

3. To follow the status of environmental legislation for interested Members.

4. To alert Members when environmentally significant legislation is under consideration by Congressional Committees and when such bills come to the floor of the House.

5. To serve as a two-way clearinghouse between Members and scientists, and Members and environmental organizations, in one direction giving information on Congressional activities; in the other obtaining resource information for Members in connection with legislation and hearings.

6. To serve as a two-way clearinghouse between Members and environmental lawyers, obtaining legal advice on environmental laws and enforcement for Members and obtaining information for lawyers.

7. Through Environmental Study Conference member task forces, investigating the operation of environmental laws and environmental threats that may be susceptible to legislative remedy, and providing a vehicle for Members to force public attention on environmental problems and solutions.

It is contemplated that the ESC will have a small staff paid for out of Members' staff allowances and will seek office space in the House office building complex.

--provide members interested in the environment with a vehicle for furthering their legislative goals.

--seek information about the environment from sources outside the Congress for the use of ESC members.

--follow closely the status of environmentally-significant legislation, and to alert ESC members when these bills are under consideration in committee or on the House floor.

--serve as a two-way clearinghouse between ESC members and informed outside sources, by gathering information for ESC members and by providing outsiders information on Congressional activities.

--seek information on environmental laws for ESC members, and to investigate their operation and enforcement.

--set up task forces within the ESC for particular subject areas, especially with regard to environmental threats that may be susceptible to legislative remedy.

--provide a vehicle for ESC members to focus public attention on environmental problems and solutions.

These are just a few of the possible services, said the 11 Congressmen, to be provided by the Environmental Study Conference. They said they hoped to have a small staff and some

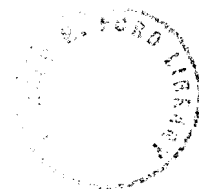

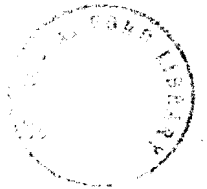
