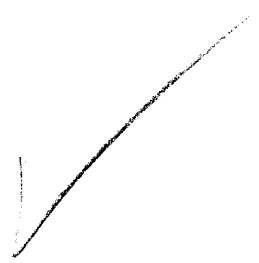

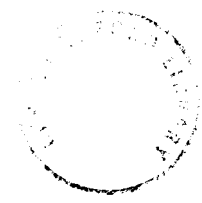
The House passed HR-5901, Education Appropriations Bill, by a voice vote on April 16, 1975. However, during this initial House consideration there was a record vote of 259 to 143 on the Roybal Amendment, which increased the appropriation by \$487 million. (See attached addendum A)

Subsequently, record votes were cast in the House on conference reports on July 16 and July 18, 1975, but these votes do not provide a proper indication of what we might expect on a veto. Therefore, the best indicator is the record vote on the Roybal Amendment described above.

The Senate passed by a vote of 64 to 12 the Education Appropriations Bill on June 27, 1975. (See attached addendum B.)

As these votes indicate, much work must be done in order for the President's veto to be sustained in either the House or the Senate.

SUBJECT: Education Appropriation Bill Veto

The Wentworth story in the Post Friday morning quoting a high White House source as saying the Administration really didn't intend to make an effort on the veto, has caused us big problems among House Republicans who supported us on the veto.

Our supporters are saying, "What the Hell, we voted with the President and now they are not even going to make a fight."

As you know, we are making a strong effort on this veto. Contacts were made all during the recess and despite discouraging expectations, we are still working to sustain.

When we appear to back off on these vetoes, whether we can win or not, it destroys our credibility and makes it more difficult to obtain support for other vetoes.

I am particularly disturbed about persons outside the White House Congressional Relations Staff making "source" statements that cut our legs off.

One Republican House supporter was livid about this story because he sent out 800 letters over the recess to his educators defending the President's position in an effort to support the veto.
