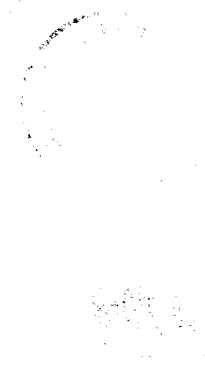
Although I do not see an opening at this time, I have arranged for him to be interviewed by Mr. John Nolan, whom you will remember from your Commission days. *(K)*

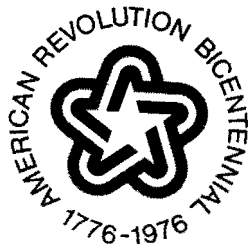

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

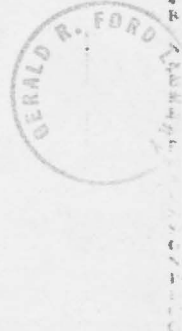

On October 2, 1974, President Gerald Ford nominated Mrs. Marjorie Lynch to be Deputy Administrator of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration. Mrs. Lynch, a naturalized American citizen, born in London, England, brings with her to her new position the talents of lawmaker, active volunteer and Government administrator.

Mrs. Lynch came to the United States in 1945 and became an American citizen in 1948. She was educated in public and private schools in England. During World War II, she served in the Women's Auxiliary Air Force, becoming an Assistant Adjutant with responsibility for the executive administration of both WAAF and RAF personnel. She also served with the American Red Cross in London and Paris, dealing primarily with problems related to family situations both in the USA and those of American servicemen married to both English and French nationals.

Mrs. Lynch was appointed to the Washington State Legislature in 1961 and was elected to the position in 1962. She was re-elected in 1964, 1966, 1968 and 1970. While in the Legislature, she served as Chairman of the Higher Education Committee for five years and was the senior member of the House Appropriations Committee.

During those years, Mrs. Lynch sponsored and co-authored legislation establishing a new system of Community Colleges that is now a model for many other states. She also sponsored legislation establishing a new state college, group homes for mentally retarded, licensing child care agencies, work release programs for inmates of penal institutions, new school for mentally retarded, child abuse laws, mandatory education for the handicapped, Vietnam Veterans' bonus, state scholarship bill, and community mental health and mental retardation acts.

Mrs. Lynch lived for twenty-five years in Yakima, Washington, and was an active participant in many areas of community services. She was Chairman of Volunteers and Chairman of Public Information for the local Red Cross chapter, Chairman of the local Heart Association, President of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Washington State Medical Association, active member of Yakima Chamber of Commerce, Chairman of their Government Affairs Committee and a member of their Military Affairs and Highway Committees, Vice President of the Foundation for Handicapped Children, Board member of the Washington State Mental Health Association, and Chairman of Region IV Planning Commission for Vocational Rehabilitation.

Mrs. Lynch resigned from the Legislature in December, 1971, and received a Presidential appointment to be ACTION Regional Director, Region X. In that position she was responsible for the coordination and program planning for the Foster Grandparents Program (FGP), Volunteers in Service to America (VISTA), Service Corps of Retired Executives (SCORE), Active Corps of Executives (ACE), Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) and University Year for ACTION (UYA), within the states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Alaska. ACTION is also the supervisory agency for Peace Corps volunteers serving developing nations throughout the world. Mrs. Lynch was the first woman appointed to a regional directorship within ACTION.

In 1973, Mrs. Lynch received a Presidential nomination and was confirmed by the Senate to be the Associate Director for Domestic and Anti-Poverty Operations. In this capacity, she was responsible for the total range of ACTION's domestic programs nationwide.

In 1969, still interested in flying, Mrs. Lynch traveled at twice the speed of sound (Mach II) in Air Force F1-6 from McChord Air Force Base near Tacoma, Washington.

Mrs. Lynch has three daughters: Ms. Valerie (Putnam) Barber, Tacoma, Washington; Mrs. Daphne (Chester) Duke, Yakima, Washington; and Ms. Teresa Lynch, Yakima, Washington.



I do this with considerable regret, as the Bicentennial is a subject of great importance to me and I have thoroughly enjoyed my association with you, the ARBA staff, and members of the Advisory Council.

I recommend as my successor Mrs. Gray Boone of Tuscaloosa. Gray publishes the magazine Antique Monthly, is a knowledgeable and dedicated preservationist, and is co-chairperson of the coordinating council for the four local Bicentennial Communities, including The University of Alabama. As you know, the Bicentennial spirit is particularly fervent in our area, in large part due to Mrs. Boone's initiative and leadership. She would be a valuable addition to the Advisory Council.
