Singer Vikki Carr will entertain at President and Mrs. Ford's State Dinner Tuesday night honoring Dr. Bruno Kreisky, Federal Chancellor of Austria.

Miss Carr met the President Nov. 6 in her capacity as National Chairwoman of the 1974 Christmas Seal Campaign. She and the President opened this year's campaign to fight lung disease in a ceremony in the Rose Garden.

Miss Carr will sing a variety of popular songs, including her hits "It Must Be Him" and "With Pen in Hand."

Miss Carr's promotional material refers to her as the only female singer of Mexican-American descent who has become a major recording star. She was born Florencia Bisenta de Casillas Martinez Cardona in El Paso, Tex. Since 1971, she has earmarked a portion of her earnings to help Chicanos receive better educations. Since that time, the Vikki Carr Scholarship Foundation has provided more than \$40,000 to Mexican-Americans, enabling 56 students to attend universities and colleges throughout the country.

She has also become known as, a crusader for non-smokers, due in part to her own toxic allergy to cigaret smoke and to her opposition to smoking for health reasons.

In addition to her work with the American Lung Association, Miss Carr has been involved in benefit work for the American Cancer Society, March of Dimes, St. Joseph's Hospital in Houston, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, the Overseas Federal Campaign Fund and Holy Cross High School in San Antonio, Tex.

A 5'1 1/2" blonde, Miss Carr is the eldest of seven children of Carlos Cardona, a construction engineer. Her first singing job was under the name Carlita with a Mexican-Irish band. Now under contract with Columbia Records, Miss Carr has appeared on every major network variety show and makes numerous nightclub appearances. In addition, she has appeared in musical comedies and does dramatic acting, debuting in 1972 as a non-singing guest star on "Mod Squad." She performed in 1967 for Her Majesty Oueen Elizabeth II.

Miss Carr was named "Visiting Entertainer of the Year" by the Mexican Press Association and was also honored as "Singer of the Year" by the American Guild of Variety Artists (1972). The Los Angeles Times named her "Woman of the Year" in 1970.

THE PRESIDENT: Mr. Chancellor, it is a great privilege and a very high honor to welcome you to the United States.

I might apologize for the weather. We could not do much about that.

But speaking on behalf of the American people, let me say how very happy we are for this further opportunity to strenghen the ties of affection and the ties of respect that bind our two nations and our two peoples together.

Like all of the world, America has profited very greatly, Mr. Chancellor, from Austria's great contributions to the arts, to the law, education, medicine and psychology and, of course, there is the great legacy of music, the legacy of Vienna that the whole world treasures, the music of Mozart, the Strausses and so many others; additionally, the great importance that Austria has served as a continuing force for peace and stability throughout the world.

Mr. Chancellor, modern Austria has proven beyond any doubt again and again in recent years that a small country can make big contributions to world peace and world understanding. Your positive involvement in world affairs, your generous support of the United Nations, including an important role in the peace-keeping forces in the Middle East and Cyprus, your gracious hosting of important international conferences, such as the initial phase of the Soviet-American strategic arms negotiations and the force reduction talks now in process -- all of these Austrian contributions are helping to build a better and more peaceful world.

We Americans, of course, are very, very proud of our long and sincere friendship with Austria. We cherish our many, many American citizens of Austrian ancestry, and we look with satisfaction and admiration at Austria's impressive economic achievements over the past ten years.

Mr. Chancellor, we also look forward to our discussions and to the future good relations of Austria and the United States. The nations of the world face many, many challenges today -- challenges in the field of finance, food and energy, to name only a few.

Meeting them will require our best common efforts and the counsel and understanding of many of our friends.

So, Mr. Chancellor, in anticipation of our session together and with our traditional Austro-American friendship in mind, America, one and all, bids you welcome and wishes you an enjoyable and most productive visit.

CHANCELLOR KREISKY: Mr. President, first of all, let me thank you for having invited me to come to Washington on an official visit at a time when you are extremely busy. We, in Austria, greatly appreciate this high privilege, and we take it as proof of the strong and unimpaired friendship which has existed for decades between the American people and the Austrian people.

Mr. President, I come from a country which greatly appreciates the great contribution made by the United States, and we know this from experience, for the liberation of Europe and for the economic reconstruction of our continent.

We remember with great gratitude the sacrifices which the American people in so many ways have made for the restoration of peaceful conditions in Europe.

Today, Austria is an economically prosperous country enjoying the blessings of freedom and democracy. We have not forgotten the significant contributions made by your country for this development.

Austria belongs among the smaller nations of Europe, and I regard it as an expression of international democracy that in its dealings with Austria, the United States has never disregarded the principles of equality and of respect for the sovereignty and freedom of our country. The friendship between our two countries and between our two peoples rests on the solid foundation of mutual trust and mutual respect.

Let me assure you, Mr. President, and Mrs. Ford, that Mrs. Kreisky deeply regretted to have been unable to join me in this trip, and to see her fervent wish to be here unfulfilled.

Mr. President, I want to again thank you sincerely for this invitation, and I am looking forward to our discussions with my Minister also with the greatest of interest.

Singer Vikki Carr will entertain at President and Mrs. Ford's State Dinner Tuesday night honoring Dr. Bruno Kreisky, Federal Chancellor of Austria.

Miss Carr met the President Nov. 6 in her capacity as National Chairwoman of the 1974 Christmas Seal Campaign. She and the President opened this year's campaign to fight lung disease in a ceremony in the Rose Garden.

Miss Carr will sing a variety of popular songs, including her hits "It Must Be Him" and "With Pen in Hand."

Miss Carr's promotional material refers to her as the only female singer of Mexican-American descent who has become a major recording star. She was born Florencia Bisenta de Casillas Martinez Cardona in El Paso, Tex. Since 1971, she has earmarked a portion of her earnings to help Chicanos receive better educations. Since that time, the Vikki Carr Scholarship Foundation has provided more than \$40,000 to Mexican-Americans, enabling 56 students to attend universities and colleges throughout the country.

She has also become known as, a crusader for non-smokers, due in part to her own toxic allergy to cigaret smoke and to her opposition to smoking for health reasons.

In addition to her work with the American Lung Association, Miss Carr has been involved in benefit work for the American Cancer Society, March of Dimes, St. Joseph's Hospital in Houston, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, the Overseas Federal Campaign Fund and Holy Cross High School in San Antonio, Tex.

A 5'l 1/2" blonde, Miss Carr is the eldest of seven children of Carlos Cardona, a construction engineer. Her first singing job was under the name Carlita with a Mexican-Irish band. Now under contract with Columbia Records, Miss Carr has appeared on every major network variety show and makes numerous nightclub appearances. In addition, she has appeared in musical comedies and does dramatic acting, debuting in 1972 as a non-singing guest star on "Mod Squad." She performed in 1967 for Her Majesty Oueen Elizabeth II.

Miss Carr was named "Visiting Entertainer of the Year" by the Mexican Press Association and was also honored as "Singer of the Year" by the American Guild of Variety Artists (1972). The Los Angeles Times named her "Woman of the Year" in 1970.

The White House Tuesday, November 12, 1974



Vikki met President Ford for the first time last Wednesday, Nov. 6, when as national chairman of the 1974 Christmas Seal drive she flew in forRose $G_{\rm a}$ rden ceremonies to officially open the American $L_{\rm u}$ ng Association's camaign with the Present, a ceremony that has been traditional forthe past 12 years.

Following that ceremony, which took place in the midst of a busy day after the national election, Vikki and the president chatted for 15 and 20 minutes in his office, after which the member of her staff who had accompanied her from L.A. were given a private tour of the White Hous situation room in the basement, and then spent another half hour chatting win Ron Nessen and Mrs. Ford's new press secretary, Sheila Weidenfeld.

Vikki returned to L.A. immediately after, but her own "press secretary," and Vi-Car staffer Barbara Best stayed on for meetings with Columbia Records execs in New York on Thursday, returning to Washington Friday for meetings with at Kennedy Concert regarding a concert performance there next year.

At about 2:30 Friday afternoon, Eastern time, President Ford called Vikki personally at her Beverly Hillshome, where she was meeting with her contractor, and her father, who is also a builder, regarding dedecoration plans forher house. Vikki was so stunned by the call her opening line to the President was a bubbly, "Hi there, What's Up?"

The President said Samething like "Hi there yourself, how ya doin,', Vikki recalled. She said, "Fan-tastic, how you doing?"

The President then told her he and Betty had gotten to talking that morning about Tuesday's State Dinner for the Chahcellor of Augtria, and had he thought about some kind of entertainment of the program? He told her he'd met Vikki Carr a day or so before, she seemed like a nice girl, and maybe he could have someone call and ask her if she'd do him a favor and come back for the dinner and sing for them.

The President then said Betty had thought it was a great idea, that Vikki was not only a wonderful singer but she'd heard what a nice person she is, and that if he wanted to ask her a favor, he should do it in person, not get someone else to call.

So, the President told Vikki, here I am, to see if you would be able to do me that favor, and was she free to fly back to Washington?

Vikki said actually, she had been told by her doctors after her recent exhausting tour to Venezuela and Mexico to rest her voice completely between now and her Music Center Pavilion engagement in Los Angeles in December. The Presient interrupted, very understandingly, and said he certainly didn't want her to do anything she wasn't supposed to. Vikki interrupted immediately and said, "Well, seeing as it you..... I won't even ask them. I'll just accept and tell you I'd be deighted to simple attacked.

The President said, well of course I want you to have dinner with us too, and I'll put my people in touch with your people to make all the arrangements."

Within an hour the White House press staff, who had just been infirmed, started trying to get background info on Vikki Carr for release to the Press Monday morning, and tracked down Vikki's rep at the Kennedy Center so that the necessary biographical material could be obtained over the weekend. Some was flown in from NY that night by the American Lwng Association, and addional material from Vikki's Los Angeles office arrived at the White House Saturday morning so the staff could prepare press and program material for the Tuesday night performance.

Vikki and her secretary rounded up her own staff of musicians etc, who wer "on vacation" in various locations, and arrangements were made for all to leave Los Angeles Monday in time for White House show rehearsls Tuesday. (2:30 p.m.)

Vikki Carr is a very special lady indeed.

Not only is she coming into her own this year as one of the greatest vocal talents of our generation, along with the Garlands, the Streisands, and the Minnellis, the idol of her fellow Mexican-Americans, and the darling of the nation's disc jockeys, she feels she is also coming into her own as a person.

Her latest album, "One Hell of a Woman", reveals a hint of the emotional maturing process that has been taking place along with the groth of Vikki Carr as an artist of power, polish, and sincerity. M

As a performer, she has proved herself in the hallowed halls of the Palace Theatre on Broadway, where in her first appearance a year ago she sold out to enthusiastic audiences, and where she will return later this year in the same concert performance that she presents in a pre-Broadway presentation at the Music Center in December.



For years, she has never failed to remind her audiences that her real name is Florencia Bisenta de Casillas Martinez Cardona, as she is the only female singer of Mexican-American descent who has made it to the top as a major recording and night club star. Vikki is fiercely proud of her heritage, just as her fellow Mexican-Americans are fiercely proud of her, not only for her career achievements but for her continued interest in them.

Despite an almost solid schedule of bookings, from the Mill Run Theatre in Chicago to the Del Prado Hotel in Mexico City to the famed Palladium in London, she somehow manages on her occasional days free to journey to places like San Antonio or El Paso, Texas to sing for a few hundred youngsters in a predominantly Mexican-American community, for whatever benefit or charity cause she hears about.

For this as well as other contributions to the community, the Los Angeles Times gave her its coveted "Woman of the Year" in 1970.

The heart of Vikki Carr is as big as her voice.

Perhaps that is why the first thing people notice about Vikki Carr is her smile. It's a wide open, honest-to-goodness sincere expression of her inner warmth --- the only kind that Vikki could possibly give. It is a look of happy loving ... of life and work ... of friends and family. For it is all these people and all these things that make up Vikki. She'd have it no other way.

Born in El Paso, Texas, the eldest of seven children of Carlos Cardona, a construction engineer, Vikki grew up in the San Gabriel Valley, just east of Los Angeles. She made her "debut" at four, singing "Adeste Fidelis" in Latin at a Christmas program. In Rosemead High School she signed up for all available music courses, plus taking leading roles in the school's musical productions. As if it wasn't enough, she began singing on weekends with local bands until graduation, when she was offered the soloist's spot with the Pepe Callahan Mexican-Irish Band. She opened as "carlita" at the Chi-Chi Club in Palm Springs and traveled later to Reno, Las Vegas, Lake Tahoe and Hawaii ... all with her mother and father's blessings. They wanted Vikki's success as much as she did.

Home again (with a name change to Vikki Carr) she cut her first demo and was promptly signed to a long-term contract with Liberty Records. After a tour of Australia, where she received a tumultous ovation, she was signed for the "Ray Anthony" tv series, as feature vocalist.

Since then, Vikki has guest starred on every major network variety show, including Dean Martin, Ed Sullivan, Hollywood Palace, Jackie Gleason, Smothers Brothers, Jerry Lewis, Jonathan Winters, Red Skelton and Carol Burnett, as well as specials with Bob Hope, Jim Nabors and Johnny Carson. To add a continental touch, Vikki often flies to London, where she has taped six Vikki Carr specials for London Weekend TV. She has also hosted the "Tonight Show" several times.

She had headlined in the finest nightclubs in the world, from London to New York's Persian Room to Las Vegas. She has sold out at the Colorado State Fair, the Gran Gala du Disque in Holland, and in concerts in Germany, Spain, France, England, Australia and Japan. Vikki also joined Danny Kaye in a threeweek tour of military bases in Viet Nam... an experience she rates as one of the most rewarding in her career.

Vikki made her musical comedy debut at the Starlight Theatre in Kansas City, starring as Lt. Nellie Forbush in "South Pacific". The critic's reviews were unanimous in their praise for her dramatic and musical performance, just as they were a year later when she starred with the John Kenly Players in Ohio as "The Unsinkable Molly Brown".

In 1972, she made her dramatic television debut in a nonsinging guest star role in "Mod Squad", and hopes to accept some of the acting offers which have followed in profusion, whenever her busy concert schedule permits.

Her status as an international star was heralded in 1967 by an invitation to perform for Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, at the Royal Command Performance in London. This was followed the next year by a singular accomplishment ... starring in her "Vikki Carr Show" at Britian's famed London Palladium.

In 1970, she performed in concert for President Nixon and his fellow guests at the White House State Dinner for the President of Venezuela, and in 1973 performed at Kennedy Music Center for the Inaugural Celebration in Washington. She visited the White House again in November as National Chairwoman of the Christmas Seal Drive to open the 1974 campaign with President Gerald Ford.



She made her first professional appearance in her grandparents' native Mexico at the Hotel Aristos in Mexico City in 1972, playing nightly to standing ovations and also hosting her own two television specials on the Mexican network. As a result, she was named the "Visiting Entertainer of the Year" an honor as meaningful to her as the coveted "Singer of the Year" award by the American Guild of Variety Artists which she won in 1972. Recently she returned to Mexico City to receive standing ovations at the Hotel Del Prado, following an equally exciting engagement in Caracas, where she broke Tom Jones' previous all-time record.

Vikki is also a proven best seller on records. Her list of hits includes the singles, "It Must Be Him," "With Pen in Hand," "Can't Take My Eyes Off of You," and "Wind Me Up," plus 28 best selling albums. At one point, Vikki managed the next to impossible, by having simultaneously two albums and two singles among the nations' top 100 records.

Her father drew her aside one night and said, "Listen to me, dear. Not everyone is going to like you ... not everyone is going to like your singing. It is impossible to please them all. Just do your very best and always follow the Golden Rule."

That just about explains Vikki Carr ... and her smile!

VIKKI CARR has a musical history of hit records, but one is very special.... "It Must Be Him," which sold more than a million copies all over the world. Special, because it was her first big record, and the one that catapulted her to recording fame as the lady who sings with her heart.

It's also special because of the unusual story behind the song. When released, the record by an "unknown" new singer passed un-noticed in an era when rock predominated. In England, however, its popularity grew steadily until it reached No.1 in sales, bearing out Vikki's original faith in the music and the lyric she had chosen.

American disc jockies began to play "England's Top Record," and a year after its original release, "It Must Be Him" established Vikki as one of the great ballad singers of our time.

Vikki is frequently asked what comes first? Her career? Her private life? Her Mexican heritage?

She thinks of herself first as a person, as a human being, a girl who happens to like to sing. Then she thinks of herself as an American, then as a Mexican-American, and lastly as a professional entertainer.

She practically never thinks of herself as an international star . . . But she is.

VIKKI CARR cries real tears when she sings sad songs on television, but it isn't an act. She also cries real tears when she sings the same sad songs in a recording studio, with nobody watching.

She says she likes the songs best that say something, and if they say something sad, she can't help crying. She admits to being a romanticist, and her favorite song, personally, is "That's All," because it says how she feels about living and loving. "I can only give you love that lasts forever, that's all."

She likes to sing the happy songs, too, because they make her feel good. "I feel like whatever I sing. Maybe I'm just kind of moody."

Actually, she says she has always been inclined to clown a lot, and make jokes, so nobody took her seriously because she was always laughing. "I had to work at making people take me seriously."





In her teens, she sang a lot, but never thought of making it a career. She fell into it when Pepe Callahan heard her sing and offered her a job with his Mexican-Irish band. She was working as a bookkeeper in a bank at the time, and remembers she was perfectly happy there. She had to be talked into accepting the job. She'd been singing all her life, without thinking of it as a potential career. "I just fell into it," she says, because "singing comes naturally in my family."

Today she is one of the top-selling vocal artists, recording for Columbia Records, and she wins her standing ovations regularly in concerts all over the world, from the London Palladium to the Las Vegas Tropicana Hotel, from the Mill Run in Chicago to the famed Palace Theatre on Broadway. The way her schedule looks now, she might get a vacation one day in 1978. It's taken Vikki fifteen years to be an overnight success, but today she says she's at last achieved the confidence she never felt before. She's singing better than ever, and enjoying it more.





Florence Bisenta de Casillas Martinez Cardona was born a Moon Child (July 19) in El Paso, Texas, to Mr. and Mrs. Carlos Cardona, a builder who moved to California when Vikki was still an infant. One of seven children, she grew up in the San Gabriel Valley, and played baseball, football, bowling and basketball with her three brothers, for whom she was always "fourth man on the team."

She made her singing debut at the age of four, singing "Adeste Fidelis" in Latin on a school Christmas program. She continued singing every year thereafter, through a capella choir in Rosemead High School, and acted in the school plays. But she noticed she never got a leading role in the musicals, and when she asked the teacher, he said it was because she wasn't in the drama class. She promptly enrolled, and the following year, she started playing leads in the musicals too.

My Dad has always been the most important and biggest influence in my life, and it was a joy to dedicate "Daddijs Dream" to him at the Greek Theatre in La Angeles. Jaw can hear it on the solum we recorded "Live at the Greek."

Vikki is a frequent guest host, subbing for Johnny Carson on his night's off from the "Tonight" show, and exchanging quips with Johnny's Doc Severinson. Vikki's guest-hosting stint in Mid-1974 was her sixth.



Vikki is often seen on television promoting good causes even more than she promotes her own records. One of her favorite charities is the John Tracy Clinic, which provides treatment for deaf youngsters. Poster Girl Sharon Alonzo posed for pictures with Vikki at the Clinic's 1974 fund-raising tennis tournament for which Vikki served as honorary chairman.



In 1972, Vikki made her television dramatic debut on "Mod Squad" in a non-singing, highly dramatic role, surprising many who had thought of her previously as "just a singer".

The phrase is a bit irritating to Vikki, as it is to many top vocalists who have bridged the gap from singing to acting. Some ultimately succeeded...brilliantly...as did Frank Sinatra, Barbra Streisand, and Julie Andrews.

"And why not," demands Vikki. "Nobody can sell a song without expressing the emotion behind it. There is a story behind every song lyric, and audiences respond only to those singers who can make the story believable."



Vikki's a frequent guest - and a witty one - on the popular game shows, and an oft-time -time repeater on "Hollywood Squares," hosted by Peter Marshall.

Vikki has guested on every top-rated television show, working with such stars as Bob Hope, Dean Martin, Ed Sullivan, Jackie Gleason, the Smothers Brothers, Jerry Lewis, Jonathan Winters, Red Skelton, Jim Nabors, and Johnny Cash. She has traded quips on talk shows with Johnny Carson, Merv Griffin, David Frost, and Mike Douglas, and has also hosted the "Tonight" show in Johnny's absence.

She has filmed six "Vikki Carr Specials" in London, and plans are for her to host a series of specials in the U.S. as well.

Not since Dinah Shore has a top female singer successfully hosted her own network variety show. Vikki could be the next one.

She'd enjoy that and so would the audience.

Someone once said that a good singer only has to sing well. But to be a great singer, one must also be an actress. Vikki Carr, a great singer by these or any standards, would like to be known as an actress too. Not long ago she gave up a lucrative night club season to star in "South Pacific" at the famous Kansas City Starlight Theatre. The critics said she had a voice younger than spring-time, and did flip-ups over her acting. The following year, Vikki starred in "The Unsinkable Molly Brown" with the Kenley Players in Ohio, and there won unanimous raves again from critics who called her "captivating," "effervescent," "buoyant," and "bewitching."

Vikki would never give up singing, although none of her friends are surprised when she turns up in a dramatic role in a television series or movie, and they don't rule out Broadway either.


"I don't rule out anything," says Vikki. "I love to sing, . . . but there's so much more that I want to do, and feel I can do."

Presentation of the gold cup award to Vikki was made by Otis Chandler, publisher of the Times, who publicly lauded her for her efforts on behalf of the Mexican-American community and especially its young people, and privately confessed to Vikki he'd long been such a fan of her singing that he had even carried cassettes of her albums into the wilds of Africa on a safari vacation.





Just before Christmas in 1970, Vikki Carr received one of the most thrilling awards of her career, when the Los Angeles Times gave her its coveted "Woman of the Year" accolade for outstanding achievement, adding her name to a distinguished group of show business good citizens (selected by the editors since 1950) that includes Irene Dunne, Rosalind Russell, Dorothy Kirsten, Dinah Shore, Lucille Ball, Dame Judith Anderson, Bette Davis, Julie Andrews, and Carol Burnett.

If a star is known by the company she keeps, Florencia Bisenta de Casillas Martinez Cardona couldn't be in any better company than that!

Vikki Carr Scholarship Foundation

In 1971, Vikki Carr inaugurated an annual scholarship award program for outstanding young Mexican-American Students. It was her plan to give a \$1,000 grant each year to help a bright, active and concerned young person go on to college. From a field of almost 200, Vikki selected eight applicants for personal interviews, was so impressed that she awarded scholarship grants to all eight, adding a ninth fellowship award to a graduate student.

The first annual grants totalled \$5,500. In 1972, nineteen youngsters were selected, and in 1973 Vikki awarded scholarships to six students in Dallas as well as the annual California scholarships to thirteen young people, bringing the awards total well over \$25,000 in the first three years of the Foundation. Vikki would like to thank those who have purchased the program for their donations, plus all the others who have generously contributed their efforts and assistance to the Foundation.



A \$1,500 award to David Luna (center) made it possible for the Azusa boy to begin his law studies at Harvaad. A \$500 Carlos Cardona Fellowship award, which Vikki named in honor of her father, was given to Arturo Sandoval (with Mrs. Sandoval) to study at Harvard for a doctorate in education. David along with Lupe Villegas, now serves on the Foundation Board of Directors.



In 1972, Vikki awarded \$1500 each to Sandra Palacios and Alvaro Flores (right). Sandra is now an ecology major at Yale and Alvaro is studying physics at Fresno State College. Grants of \$1000 each went to Francisco Galvan and Gloria Gonzales (left). Francisco enrolled in Columbia Law School and Gloria is continuing her nursing studies at UCLA.
