WASHINGTON (UPI) -- WEST GERMAN PRESIDENT WALTER SCHEEL TOLD A JOINT SESSION OF CONGRESS TODAY RECENT WORLD EVENTS -- INFERRING THE INDOCHINA DEBACLE -- HAVE STRENGTHENED RATHER THAN WEAKENED U.S. TIES WITH EUROPE.

IN THE RARE ADDRESS BY A FOREIGN LEADER TO THE NATION'S LAWMAKERS, SCHEEL ALSO CALLED FOR LONG TERM AMERICAN-EUROPEAN COOPERATION WHICH HE SAID SHOULD BE MARKED BY CANDOR AND MUTUAL TRUST.

"NOT AS SOME MAY HAVE FEARED AND OTHERS MAY HAVE HOPED," SCHEEL STRESSED, "RECENT DEVELOPMENTS HAVE NOT LOOSENED THE TIES OF EUROPEAN-AMERICAN SOLIDARITY.

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THE WEST GERMAN PRESIDENT, IN HIS HALF-HOUR LONG ADDRESS, NEVER DIRECTLY SAID THE WORDS INDOCHINA OR VIETNAM. BUT HIS REFERENCE TO THE COLLAPSE OF SOUTH VIETNAM AND THE U.S. INTERVENTION POLICY IN INDOCHINA WAS UNMISTAKABLE.

SCHEEL MADE THE ADDRESS TO THE LEGISLATORS IN THE COURSE OF HIS CURRENT STATE VISIT, THE FIRST BY A WEST GERMAN CHIEF OF STATE IN 17 YEARS.

SCHEEL'S REMARKS COVERED A WIDE RANGE OF FOREIGN ISSUES AND WAS LARGELY PHILOSOPHICAL IN TONE -- STRESSING GERMANY'S APPRECIATION FOR AMERICAN RECONSTRUCTION AID AFTER WORLD WAR II AND HIS NATION'S BELIEF IN DEMOCRATIC IDEALS.

SCHEEL SPECIFICALLY ENCOURAGED THE UNITED STATES IN ITS EFFORTS TO PROMOTE A MIDDLE EAST PEACE SETTLEMENT AND HE VOICED GERMANY'S DETERMINATION TO PROMOTE POLITICAL UNITY IN EUROPE.

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SCHEEL, WHO MET WITH FORD MONDAY FOR AN HOUR AND WAS GUEST AT A WHITE HOUSE STATE DINNER, ANNOUNCED FOUR GIFTS FROM HIS PEOPLE TO THE U.S., ALL EDUCATIONAL. HE WAS TO ADDRESS A JOINT MEETING OF CONGRESS TODAY.

IN A TOAST TO FORD LAST NIGHT, SCHEEL ANNOUNCED THAT WEST GERMANY WILL DONATE TO THE CAROLINA INSTITUTE'S AIR AND SPACE MUSEUM A LARGE PROJECTION APPARATUS FOR THE PLANETARIUM.

THE DEDICATION WILL TAKE PLACE ON JULY 4, 1970.

OTHER GIFTS ANNOUNCED BY SCHEEL WERE A NEW CHAIR AT THE NEW SCHOOL FOR SOCIAL RESEARCH IN NEW YORK; A UNIVERSITY FOUNDED BY GERMAN IMMIGRANTS; A GUEST PROFESSORSHIP AT GEORGETOWN UNIVERSITY; AND A \$1 MILLION FUND NAMED IN HONOR OF JOHN J. MCCLOY, FORMER U.S. HIGH COMMISSIONER TO GERMANY, TO SPONSOR EXCHANGES BETWEEN GERMAN AND AMERICAN FUTURE LEADERS IN THE FIELDS OF LABOR, JOURNALISM AND POLITICS.

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- PRESIDENT FORD CONFERS TODAY WITH WALTER SCHEEL, THE FIRST WEST GERMAN HEAD OF STATE TO VISIT WASHINGTON IN 17 YEARS.

SCHEEL WILL CONCENTRATE IN HIS TALKS WITH FORD ON THE NEED FOR EUROPEAN POLITICAL UNITY AND CLOSER RELATIONS WITH THE UNITED STATES, SOURCES IN BONN SAID.

FORD WILL BE HOST AT A WHITE HOUSE STATE DINNER TONIGHT, AND TUESDAY SCHEEL WILL ADDRESS A JOINT SESSION OF CONGRESS, THE FIRST FOREIGN LEADER TO DO SO SINCE MEXICAN PRESIDENT LUIS ECHEVERRIA WENT TO CAPITOL HILL IN 1972.

FORD PREPARED FOR THE MEETINGS BY GOING OVER BRIEFING PAPERS AT HIS CAMP DAVID, MD., RETREAT SUNDAY.

HE ENJOYED FATHER'S DAY BY SLEEPING LATE, PLAYING TENNIS, SWIMMING AND DINING ON LOBSTER THERMIDOR, WHITE HOUSE AIDES SAID. HIS WIFE, BETTY, GAVE HIM A RED PLAID SWIM SUIT AND A LEMON CAKE FOR THE OCCASION, THEY SAID. THE FORDS WERE JOINED BY THEIR SON, JACK, AND THE PRESIDENT'S SISTER-IN-LAW, JANET FORD.

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- THE TABLES FOR THE WHITE HOUSE DINNER MONDAY HONORING PRESIDENT SCHEEL OF WEST GERMANY WILL BE DECORATED WITH OLD WHISKY BOTTLES.

ACCORDING TO A STATEMENT FROM MRS. FORD'S PRESS SECRETARY, THE MOTIF WILL BE CENTERED ON A COLLECTION OF 19TH CENTURY AMERICAN FLASKS, "OR EARLY GLASS BOTTLE ORIGINALLY MADE AS CHEAP CONTAINERS FOR LOW-PRICE WHISKEY."

THE GLASS BOTTLES DEPICT VARIOUS HISTORIC MOMENTS, CAUSES AND PUBLIC FIGURES. THEY BEAR SUCH TITLES AS "THE FATHER OF HIS COUNTRY," "ROUGH AND READY" AND "SUCCESS TO THE RAILROADS."

THE STATEMENT FROM THE OFFICE OF SHEILA RABB WEIDENFELD SAID TWO BOTTLES WILL BE PLACED ON EACH TABLE AT THE DINNER AND AROUND THE BOTTLES WILL BE GROUPED ASPARAGUS, ARTICHOKES, EGGPLANT, BIB LETTUCE, CAULIFLOWER, GRAPES AND WILD FLOWERS.

ACCORDING TO THE WHITE HOUSE, THE TABLE ARRANGEMENTS WERE THE IDEA OF DECORATOR ROBERT MIGLIO WHO HAD DONATED HIS SERVICES FOR THE OCCASION. MRS. FORD HAS REQUESTED THE FRUITS AND VEGETABLES ON THE TABLES LATER BE SENT TO THE HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN OF WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- PRESIDENT FORD TODAY WELCOMED WEST GERMAN PRESIDENT WALTER SCHEEL WITH A STRONG REAFFIRMATION OF THE UNITED STATES COMMITMENT TO DEFEND WESTERN EUROPE.

AT A SUNBATHED CEREMONY ON THE SOUTH LAWN WITH FULL MILITARY HONORS, FORD SAID IN HIS WELCOMING REMARKS THAT THE UNITED STATES IS "STRONGLY COMMITTED TO SAFEGUARDING THE FREEDOM OF THE WEST.

"WE REMAIN COMMITTED TO THE FREEDOM AND SECURITY OF BERLIN," HE ADDED.

FURTHERMORE, FORD SAID THE UNITED STATES SEES THE SECURITY OF WESTERN EUROPE AS "A TRUE TEST OF WHAT IS KNOWN AS DETENTE."

SCHEEL WAS THE FIRST WEST GERMAN PRESIDENT TO VISIT THE UNITED STATES IN 17 YEARS AND THE SECOND SINCE WORLD WAR II. HE HAD VISITED THE UNITED STATES SEVERAL TIMES, HOWEVER, AS A PRIVATE CITIZEN.

HE AND HIS WIFE FLEW HERE BY HELICOPTER FROM COLONIAL WILLIAMSBURG, VA., WHERE THEY HAD SPENT THE NIGHT.

FORD, WEARING A BLUE SUIT, A BLUE AND WHITE STRIPED SHIRT AND A BLUE TIE WITH A PATTERN STRIPE WAS ON HAND TO WELCOME SCHEEL WHEN HE STEPPED OUT OF THE LONG BLACK LIMOUSINE WHICH BROUGHT HIM FROM THE ELIPSE WHERE THE HELICOPTER LANDED.

MRS. FORD, WEARING A SMART SUMMER DRESS WITH A BLUE OVERBLOUSE AND A WHITE FLARED SKIRT, PRESENTED MRS. SCHEEL WITH A BOUQUET OF AMERICAN BEAUTY ROSES.

BOTH PRESIDENTS STOOD AT ATTENTION WHEN THE MARINE BAND STRUCK UP "DEUTSCHLAND UBER ALLES" AND THE "STAR SPANGLED BANNER."

SCHEEL, IN PERFECT ENGLISH, TOLD THE GATHERING THAT HIS VISIT MIRRORED THE "EXCELLENT" RELATIONS BETWEEN WEST GERMANY AND THE UNITED STATES.

HE SAID THE GERMANS HAD "AMBIVALENT" FEELINGS ABOUT WORLD WAR II "BUT OWE A DEBT OF GRATITUDE TO THE UNITED STATES FOR THE HELP IT AFFORDED ITS FORMER ENEMIES.

"THIS HELP WILL NEVER BE FORGOTTEN," HE SAID.

BUT HE ADDED THAT INSTEAD OF DWELLING ON THE PAST, THE TWO COUNTRIES MUST FOCUS ON THE FUTURE OF STRENGTHENING THE ATLANTIC ALLIANCE TO DEAL NOT ONLY WITH THE PROBLEMS OF COMMON SECURITY BUT TO DEVELOPING A "COMMON APPROACH TO ECONOMIC AND MONETARY PROBLEMS."

HE SAID THAT THE "SURVIVAL OF DEMOCRACY" DEPENDS ON A UNIFIED APPROACH TO THE POLITICAL AND ECONOMIC PROBLEMS BY THE ALLIANCE.

"I HOPE TO BE ABLE TO WELCOME YOU IN THE NOT TOO DISTANT FUTURE AS A GUEST IN BONN," SAID SCHEEL.

FORD WAS EXPECTED TO VISIT BONN, PERHAPS IN EARLY AUGUST SHOULD THERE BE AN EAST-WEST SUMMIT MEETING FOLLOWING THE CONCLUSION OF THE EUROPEAN SECURITY CONFERENCE.

HE ALSO PLANS TO VISIT OTHER CAPITALS, INCLUDING BELGRADE, BUCHAREST AND LONDON.

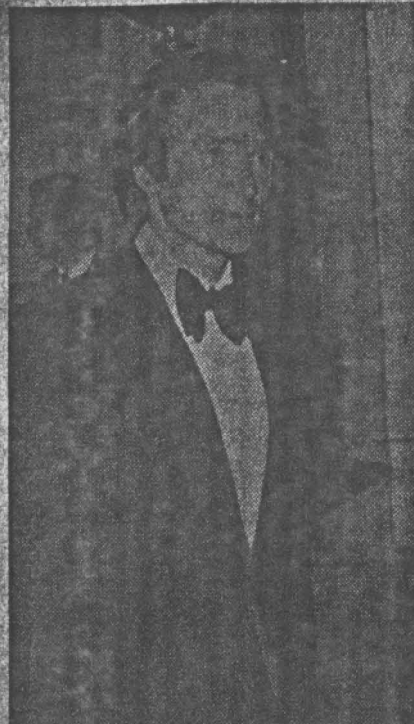

# A Meister-Dinner for a Meistersinger

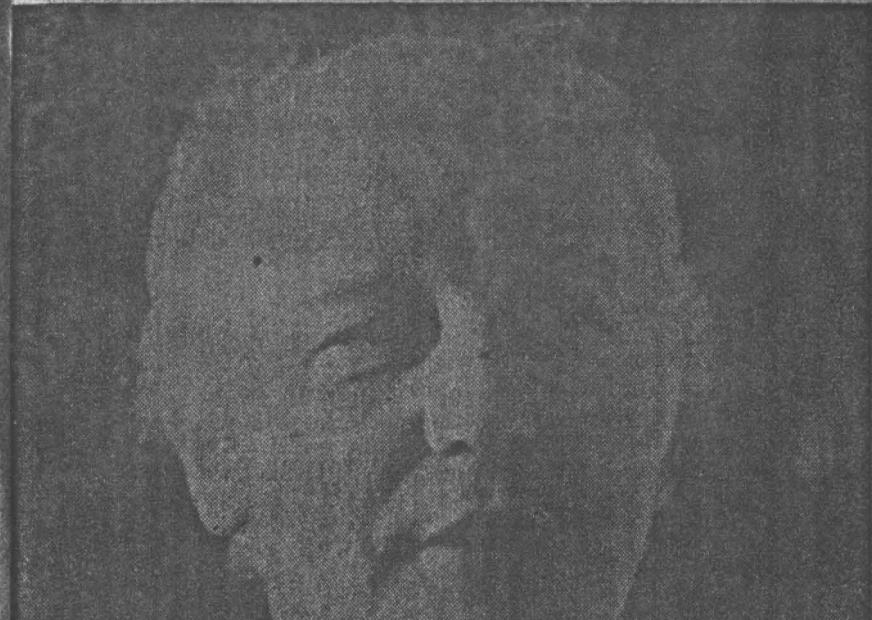

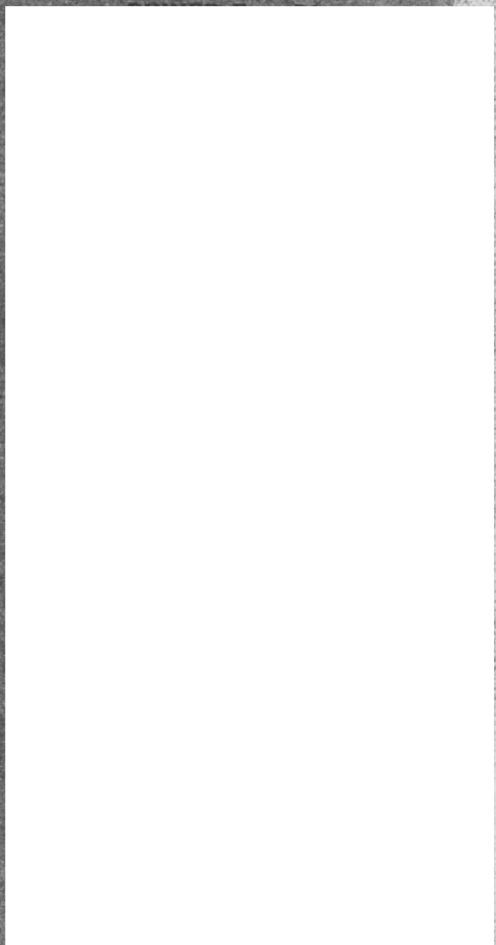
"Just about everybody accepted," said a somewhat overwhelmed White House spokesperson. "The Fords are known to give good parties."

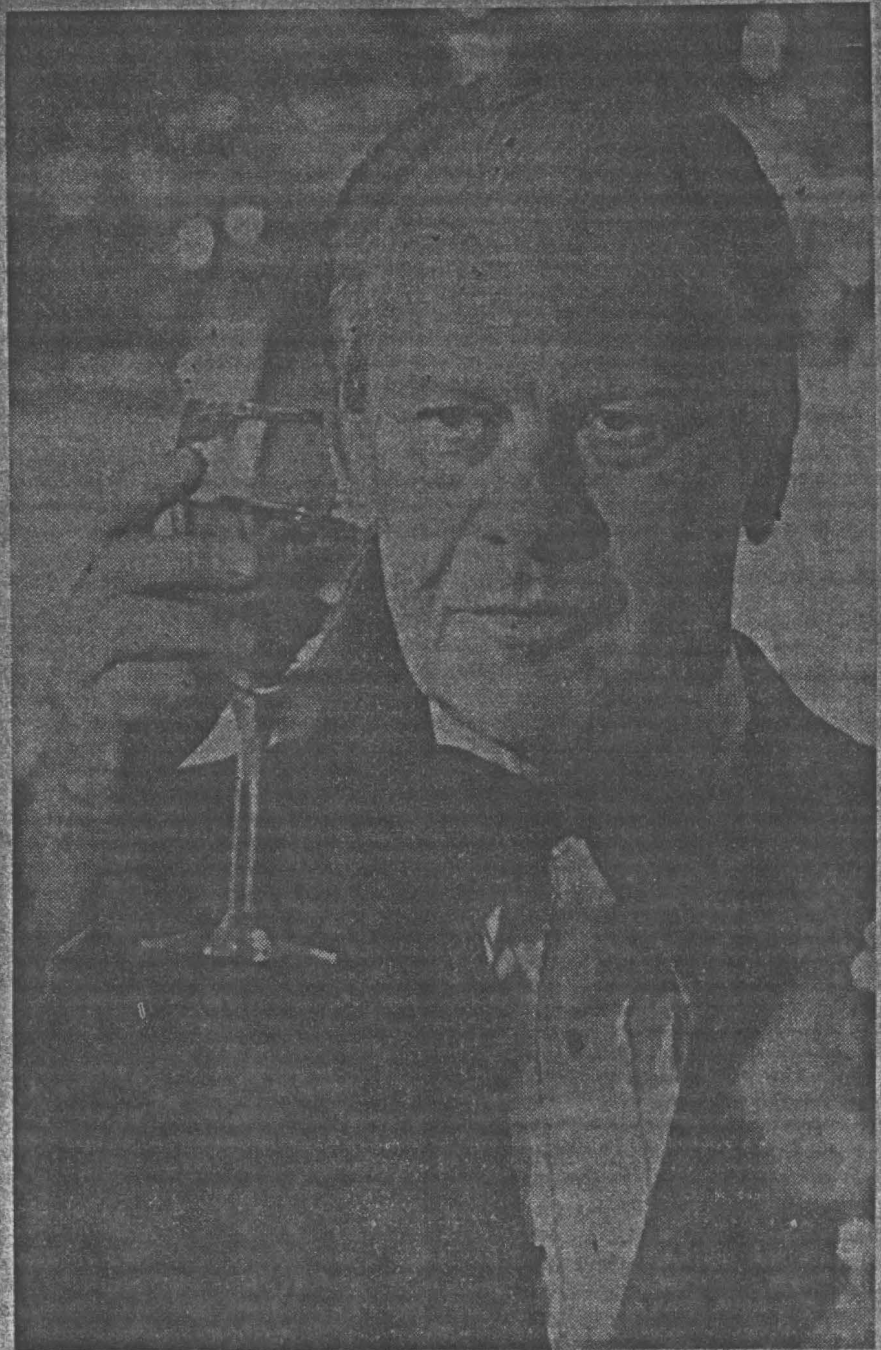
