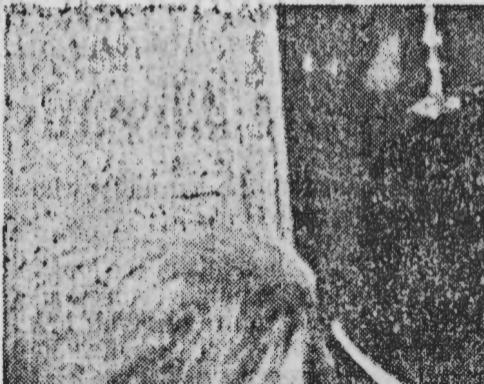


Warmest congratulations to you, your staff and readers as you celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of The Nashville Banner.
