Economic Base:

AGRICULTURE: Clover (ranked 1st in U.S.), timothy (ranked 1st), apples (ranked 2d to Washington), grapes (2nd to California). Ranked high in vegetables, melons, sweet and tart cherries, pears, potatoes. Other crops include corn, oats, wheat, peaches, peas, beans, beets, onions, cauliflower, cabbage. Livestock and Livestock Products: Milk (ranked 1st), milk cows (ranked 2nd). Ranked high in production of poultry and eggs.

Unemployment
Editorial 8/15/76

Supports attempts by Republican Rep. John Wydler to organize Long Island bankers and construction unions in an effort to provide financing for 16 projects which have never gone beyond the planning stage due to lack of funds. Says getting construction going again would be a first step toward a more vital Long Island economy.

Unemployment Rise
Article 8/31/76

Article details Long Island's 0.2% rise in unemployment in July, giving it an 8% rate. "The total number of jobs on Long Island decreased by 10,000 from June to July, with the biggest losses in construction which had 8,700 fewer jobs, government down 6,200, transportation and public utilities down 2,700 and manufacturing down 1,400. Government job losses were caused partly by closing of schools for the summer, but also reflected recent hiring freezes."

Off-Shore Drilling
Editorial 8/23/76

Supports efforts of Long Island environmentalists not to stop Atlantic offshore oil drilling but to insure they have a say in what happens to their shorelines. Calling the Interior Department's attitude a "local government be damned" one, editorial says local government still has control over the shoreline since the oil companies would be stymied if the states exercised their legal right to ban pipelines within the three mile limit, and local zoning ordinances could forbid the building of necessary onshore facilities. Urges oil companies to "stop ignoring local authorities and start negotiating."

Education
Editorial 9/12/76

Long Island schools are experiencing severe financial problems which meant dropping of summer school classes for 10,000 students and 500 teacher layoffs. Editorial urges citizens to question state government candidates on how they are prepared to meet worsening educational crisis.

SST

Editorial 8/26/76

Editorial says Long Island Republican leaders battling the SST have an unexpected ally: Jimmy Carter, whose opposition to the Concorde was published in a French magazine interview.

Local Politics (Poll)

9/6/76

In a poll of 500 Long Island residents conducted before conventions, 34% said they were less interested in politics than they used to be. Nearly 49% believed Americans care less than in the past. Fifty-six percent felt the quality of presidential candidates had declined in recent years and only 9% thought the quality had improved. Fifty-seven percent felt a candidate's stand on the issues during the primaries was more important than personality (38%). Finally, Long Islanders gave unemployment (41%) the edge over inflation (36%) as to which issue they considered more important.

Housing

Editorial (8/20/76)

Welcomes what it terms "new position" on housing for President Ford. Says housing permits on Long Island in the first six months of 1976 fell 19% in Suffolk County and 13% in Nassau County--the worst for homebuilding on Long Island since postwar boom began. Editorial describes "depression level statistics as forcing young people off Long Island for lack of adequate housing and locking older people into large homes they no longer need or can afford." Concludes Ford position is now close to that of Carter and Democratic platform.

CAMPAIGN

Editorial 8/18/76

On attempts by Reagan supporters to deny President Ford the nomination during the Convention: "Those who will ultimately suffer most are the loyal conservatives who put their trust in Reagan as a valid spokesman of conservative principle. Reagan's willingness to put ploys before principles cheapened their cause, adding to the cynicism that already plagues American politics and deepened the rift within the Republican Party."

Editorial 8/17/76

Attacking the GOP platform which it describes as concentrating so completely on "peacemaking" it fails to win votes, editorial

expresses real concern on education plank compromise which calls for study of possible ways of replacing federal school funds with other revenues. Relates "ambiguity and political unreality" of plank to severe funding problems of Nassau and Suffolk County schools.*

Column 8/19/76

In a lengthy article concentrating on President Ford's career since becoming vice president, Patrick J. Sloyan makes these observations: "from a purely political standpoint, the Nixon pardon may have damaged Ford's political future beyond repair." "If these guys (the White House staff) are lightweights, they are simply reflecting the man who picked them," said one House Democrat. "Ford's strength lies in his personal sincerity and integrity."

Editorial 8/20/76

Criticizes President Ford's apparent attempt at "wooing the right wing of the party when the real challenge is to capture the Democrats and independents without whom no Republican can win the Presidency." Calls Senator Dole "appealing and upright" but holding "no special attraction for the South."

Editorial 8/21/76

Says if President Ford refuses to sign the law to strengthen anti-trust regulations, "he will be undercutting the widespread bipartisan support that exists in both Congress and the nation for doing away with unnecessary federal regulation."

Editorial 8/27/76

Says President Ford and Jimmy Carter are wise to keep their distance on tax reform bill which it says makes a mockery of reform. Urges Congress to extend current income tax cuts and forget about reform elements in current legislation."

Editorial 9/2/76

Agrees with Carter camp description of President Ford's park proposal as "an attempt to cover up 8 years of GOP mismanagement of the parks system." However, agrees with President's goal of increased park heritage for nation and urges House of Representatives and Senate to finish details on its own bill for Ford signature.

Column 9/7/76

Pro-Carter

Columnist Patrick Owens discusses the Ford/Carter positions on amnesty/pardon and criticizes Senator Dole for his reaction saying his argument "consists of striking at an opponent's character and motives while purporting to attack his syntax or line of reasoning." Favorable to Carter's pardon position.

Editorial 9/10/76

Says President Ford has "flip-flops" of his own although they consider a "step forward" for the President his decision not to veto the new day care bill and his slight differences over the Republican abortion platform.

Editorial 8/4/76

Supports idea of legislation for postcard registration but says it is just as well legislation won't pass in time for this year's election since charges of "partisan politics" would be inevitable.

Editorial 9/21/76

While generally against the inclusion of abortion as a campaign issue, editorial says President Ford should sign the Congressional appropriation bill which would ban Medicaid payments for women who obtain elective abortions.

Article 9/20/76

Saying the South is not a sure thing for Jimmy Carter, article does a breakdown of Southern states:

Alabama: Pluses, Wallace support and identity as a Southerner; minuses, pardon of draft dodgers. Carter's chances: good.

Georgia: No serious problems in home state. Chances: excellent.

Louisiana: Major problems. Carter's stand on breakup of big oil companies and repeal of right to work laws are serious concerns of Louisiana voters. Chances: fair.

Mississippi: Pluses, full support of Governor and U. S. Senators, Southern roots and voter's belief he is fiscally conservative. However, strong state GOP organization plus hard hitting personal Ford visit could give state to Ford. Carter's chances: fair.

North Carolina: Pluses for Carter are his joint campaign with popular gubernatorial candidate Jim Hunt. Minuses: right to work and pardon stand. Chances: fair.

South Carolina: Pluses for Carter, disunity of Republican party after Reagan defeat. Minuses: right to work.*

Column 9/1/76

Two writers described as "unabashed Truman buffs" draw parallels between the 1948 Truman campaign and President Ford's efforts to come from behind in the 1976 polls. While not drawing any conclusions, the differences include: (1) President Ford does not head the majority party as did Truman. (2) For Americans, 1948 was a more prosperous year than 1976. (3) It is unlikely President Ford can assume Truman's image of "champion of the little man doing battle with the giants of special interest."

Report 8/20/76

New York Republicans reaction to Dole as vice presidential choice is generally good although article suggest Dole was not among those favored by GOP state leader Rosenbaum and Vice President Rockefeller's enthusiasm was said "to be more for public consumption than out of conviction."

Editorial 9/27/76

Discussing the "less than great Presidential debates," editorial says "we must agree with Carter that we simply cannot check inflation by keeping people out of work." Says public jobs need not be a boon-doggle with nation's housing, railroads, and land all in need of repair.

Column 9/19/76

President Ford is apparently trailing Jimmy Carter in five traditionally Republican states, with a large undecided vote a major factor.

Among the assessments in the article: President Ford's low budget of \$20,000 and lack of plans for a personal visit make Indiana a difficult state for the President. However, it is possible for popular Republican Governor Bowen and leading Senatorial candidate Richard Lugar to carry the President on their coattails.

Wisconsin: Behind in the polls and short on cash, Charles Davis, Ford state campaign manager, says outlook is gloomy. Though Carter support is soft, Carter has heavy labor backing.

Iowa: President is hurt by Rep. Grassley's request for Ford to stay out of his district during the campaign. Also behind because of former opposition to grain embargo and Nixon pardon. Colorado and Nebraska are also states where President is trailing. Facing a fight in South Dakota and close or leading in Kansas.

9/22/76

Pro-Carter

Says Carter is "moving in the right direction" with his proposals that "welfare burden be removed from the cities, with all welfare costs being paid by the federal and state government."

DEFENSE

Editorial 8/11/76

Calls for more cuts in defense budget and questions how nation "can continue to spend such a disproportionate share of its total resources on something that contributes so little to the country's welfare."

ECONOMY

Editorial 8/19/76

Says most recent unemployment statistics and the White House response that the "work force in July was larger than what we anticipated" indicate "the Ford Administration either hasn't done its homework or is clinging stubbornly to an ideology that the nation's burgeoning labor force."

FBI

Editorial 8/15/ and 9/3/76

Calls for President Ford to accept Clarence Kelly's retirement for "health reasons." Says FBI is "simply too important to remain under such debilitating clouds as suspected corruption and perceived ineffectiveness."

FOREIGN POLICY

Editorial 8/15/76

Says Ford and Carter agreement on tying Vietnam's admission into UN with information on MIA's is one time "bipartisanship is the last thing the country needs." Argues size of Vietnam with a population of 40 million is reason enough for acceptance of Hanoi.

Editorial 8/18/76

Urges exploration of possibilities of partition of Lebanon into Christian and Moslem sectors and a possible third sector, not on Lebanese soil, for Palestinians.

Editorial 9/15/76

Concerning deadlock at Law of the Seas Conference, suggests a share of profits from private development of the sea go into an international fund during the transition period when the private firms will have a monopoly on undersea exploration.

Editorial 8/13/76

Claims Iran is totally dependent on U.S. personnel--such as Grumman's Long Islanders--for training and maintenance of the F14s, F16s, tanks and missiles bought from the U.S. Calls question of U. S. involvement "ominous," if Iran went to war.

Editorial 9/10/76

In an editorial dealing with Sino/U.S. relations now that Mao is gone, calls Jimmy Carter's position if he were President that he'd rather see China's leaders come to the U.S. "a perfectly sensible one," implying that junkets must give way to hard bargaining on Taiwan question." Editorial believes this would be a signal to China that it wants to reverse recent cooling trend in relations."

Editorial 8/19/76

Expresses doubt Kissinger mission to Africa will meet with any real success since "all the delaying tactics of Rhodesia's Smith and South Africa's Vorster can only make the transition more difficult when it formally comes."

Editorial 9/25/76

"The White Rhodesian rulers grudging acceptance of majority government in their country within two years is an apparent triumph for Henry Kissinger's diplomacy."

Editorial 9/28/76

Questions whether Kissinger peace formula has been shot down by the five frontline African presidents. With Smith wishing to deal only with Rhodesian blacks, and frontline presidents wanting Britain to hold a conference outside Rhodesia, editorial believes "it is obvious no solution is possible unless all parties that have power to sabotage are included in negotiations."

GOVERNMENT

Editorial 8/30/76

Discusses statements of Carter and Ford on overseas bribery by American corporations. Calls President Ford's proposal of no penalty for firms admitting bribes "awfully close to condoning bribery." Says Carter believes bribery is a "subversion of society" and there is need for stiff jail terms to stop the practice, a view with which "most law abiding Americans will agree."

MEDICARE

Editorial 2/76

Says President Ford's Medicare proposals instead of improving Medicare and other federal health programs to help the elderly and the poor "who really need it, would do just the opposite." Editorial believes net Medicare benefits would increase 600 million but the elderly would pay an additional 1.9 billion in bills.

REVENUE SHARING -- WESTCHESTER COUNTY, NY

Since the beginning of general revenue sharing in 1972, the Westchester County government has received \$19 million in payments. The County, its cities, towns, and villages together have received more than \$53 million in the past four years. Of the \$3.4 million to be paid governments in the County in January, more than \$1 million will go to the county government itself.

Now that the General Revenue Sharing Program has been extended for another three-and-three-quarter years, Westchester County governments can expect to receive another \$48.5 million between April 1977 and October 1980. Of this amount, the County government will receive about \$17.5 million.

Recent reports from the Westchester County government to the Treasury Department's Office of Revenue Sharing indicate that the County is spending most of its shared revenues to provide health services for residents of the area. Some funds have been used for public recreation programs.

Note: The Office of Revenue Sharing has an audit-related case involving the County of Westchester. It is a matter which we expect to resolve without difficulty.

REVENUE SHARING -- NEW YORK CITY

Since the beginning of general revenue sharing in 1972, New York City has received \$1.2 billion in payments. The City will receive another \$73.5 million in January and approximately \$1.1 billion in addition over the three-and-three quarter year renewal period.

New York used its early revenue sharing payments to keep subway fares down. In recent years, the funds have been used to pay salaries in the Police, Fire, and Sanitation Departments.

Note: The Office of Revenue Sharing is investigating allegations that the city does not provide citizens with access to records concerning uses of revenue sharing funds (as is required by law). Also, LEAA is looking into an allegation of discrimination in the police department on the grounds of race and sex. There is also a question about adequate record-keeping of revenue sharing expenditures.

D. REVIEW OF MAJOR NEW JERSEY RACES

Senate

Republican David Norcross, a political newcomer whose campaign is poorly organized and under-funded, is challenging veteran Senator Harrison Williams, a three-term Democrat. Williams, apparently confident of victory, is doing a great deal in behalf of Mr. Carter.

House of Representatives

There are 15 Congressional districts, three of them held by Republicans. Our three incumbents -- Millicent Fenwick, Edwin Forsythe, and Matthew Rinaldo -- appear to be in good shape. We lost four seats in New Jersey in 1972 and will probably pick up two this year.

In Northern New Jersey, former State Senator William Schluter leads freshman Democrat Helen Meyner in the 13th District and is rated as a probable GOP win. We have an outside chance in the 7th District, where James Sheehan is challenging freshman Democrat Andrew Maguire, as well as in the 9th where Harold Hollenbeck is challenging six-term incumbent Henry Helstoski (who has been indicted for taking kick-backs to introduce special immigration bills).

In the balance of the state, two liberal freshmen Democrats are in some trouble: In the 1st District, Republican Joe McCullough is rated a good possibility against James Florio, and in the 2nd District, Republican James Hurley has a chance of unseating William Hughes.

E. PFC CAMPAIGN OVERVIEW

New Jersey is a state with what some observers call an "inferiority complex"--it is a "corridor" state between the South and New York City and points north.

The main strategy is to get out a heavy suburban vote in Bergen, Essen and Union Counties along with a strong showing in the smaller counties to offset the city vote. Special attention is being given to the ethnic vote, particularly Italian-Americans. The state's Catholic population is a significant 38 percent.

As in the past, the state Republican Party is hampered with a multitude of problems which neutralize its effectiveness as a campaign organization.

Eugene McCarthy will be on the November ballot and his presence is expected to hurt Carter. Maddox is also on the ballot, but he is not expected to be a major factor according to state sources. A plus for the Democrats, however, is the strong campaign of Harrison Williams. Dave Norcross, the GOP candidate, is reported to be a fine young man, but is plagued with insufficient funds and a poorly run campaign organization.

RNC Phone Centers

New Jersey contains approximately 186 telephones, operating out of 24 phone banks. RNC estimates that 700,000 households will have been contacted by election day. Number of phone calls made as of October 4 is 14,679.

As in New York, the phonebanks will have been in operation for five weeks by election day. Registered voter lists are the basis for all calls in the three key counties (Bergen, Morris, and Essex), and local voter lists are being used for the remaining target areas. There are approximately 1,400 target precincts. Again, the strategy is to contact the top GOP and ticket-splitting areas for voter identification purposes, and then shift to follow-up get-out-the vote calls by November 1.

Advertising

The advertising effort in New Jersey is unique in that the state receives all of its television programming from New York City and Philadelphia. New Jersey will have a spot radio program, as well as newspaper advertising. There will also be special voter group advertising.

Network advertising will be made up of 5 minute films and one minute spots dealing with the Ford Presidency, the Ford Family and the Ford Record. Also included will be "issue" spots featuring the President talking with various groups of people (senior citizens, workers, farmers).

As previously mentioned, the spot television for New Jersey will come from New York and Philadelphia and buys began the week of October 4 with spot radio beginning the week of October 11.

F. CARTER CAMPAIGN IN NEW JERSEY

Campaign Strategy

Though he campaigned in the New Jersey Primary, held June 8, Carter was not able to duplicate his triumph in the Ohio Primary held the same day. He was overwhelmed by an uncommitted slate (really for Humphrey) 42.1% to 27.9%.

Since the primary he has made only one visit to New Jersey--on his whistlestop tour September 20. He made stops at Newark and Trenton. Generally he had small crowds and was besieged by proponents of right-to-life. Moreover, the Playboy story broke the same day which caused consternation on the train.

In his remarks Carter wrapped himself in the great tradition of FDR, HST, JFK and LBJ. He identified you with Nixon, Hoover, Coolidge and Harding. Apparently no one occupied the White House from 1953 to 1960 since President Eisenhower's name was never mentioned. (In Chicago, October 11, Mayor Daley in a meeting with Carter referred to "the terrible Eisenhower years.")

Carter repeated his litany of Republican sins down through the years. The only new item he brought up was his promise to push for a law that would provide for automatic registration of voters when they reach 18 years.

ISSUES GUIDANCE

NEW JERSEY ISSUES OVERVIEW

GENERAL

The overview of issues provided in the New York summary applies to a great extent to the State of New Jersey. It, too, is a highly urbanized area with severe economic and social problems, particularly in the Newark, New Brunswick and other deteriorating areas.

UNIQUE NEW JERSEY ISSUES

(1) Income Tax

Governor Byrne has succeeded in passing a State income proposal through the State Legislature. This has been a highly emotional, political, and controversial issue. As a result, there is great sensitivity to local tax burdens, as there is throughout the entire New York-New Jersey area.

(2) Unemployment

Unemployment is seen as taking people off the tax roles, increasing crime, and reducing the ability of cities to provide necessary services, including police and fire protection. There is great interest in attempts to stimulate new investment. You should emphasize your policy of supporting new private investment in these areas to stimulate job creation, and expect questions of why it's not cheaper to put people to work than pay them unemployment insurance.

(3) General Revenue Sharing, Public Works/Countercyclical

At a recent meeting at the White House on General Revenue Sharing, Mayor Gibson of Newark said very bluntly that without revenue sharing his city would fold. There is also interest in the countercyclical legislation which would in essence give an additional amount of General Revenue Sharing type of funds. Public Works legislation funding will be highly sought after by communities.

(4) Crime

Particularly in the older urban areas, crime continues to be a significant problem. The cost of police patrols and the need for local reductions has worsened the problem in some areas.

(5) Mass Transit

Public transportation is important as a link with the employment centers in New York City, as well as a technique for stimulating urban areas within the State. An extension of a subway line running from New York City to Plainfield and beyond has been proposed by the State and approved by the U.S. Department of Transportation.

(6) Ellis Island

There is interest among some ethnic groups in restoring Ellis Island and are hoping for Federal support.

(7) Offshore Drilling

While there is interest in securing increased supplies of energy, there are equal concerns about the impact that this will have on the shoreline and the general environmental quality of the area.

(8) Statewide Gambling

Currently there is a statewide lottery. An effort is underway to bring casino-type gambling to the Atlantic City area with hope that it would help revitalize this community and restore its economic health. The clergy of the State are against it, and there is strong protest from other groups.

(9) Governor Byrne

Governor Byrne is in some trouble because of his recent success in passing the State income tax. Republican leaders in the State feel they are trying to associate him with Governor Carter in an attempt to soften Carter's following in the State.

WASTE DISPOSAL PROBLEMS IN NEW JERSEY

- Q. New Jersey is a highly industrialized, densely populated state that is running out of room. We have no place to put our garbage or the wastes from our sewage treatment processes. What can be done?
- A. We need careful national planning to make the best use of our resources, and we need local planning as a background for local decisions on how to preserve the lands and resources we cherish.

My Administration is providing monies to local planning agencies to enable them to decide how best to use their water resources. Over \$4.9 million has been granted to New Jersey agencies for this planning, and more is to come. In addition, we are looking at alternatives to ocean disposal for sludge and other possible hazardous wastes and at alternatives to landfills for solid-waste disposal.

Background

Because of EPA legal action, the Kin-Buc landfill in Edison, New Jersey no longer accepts hazardous chemical industrial wastes. It was closed to liquid waste as of July and will be closed to solid waste by December or earlier. A sealing-off procedure is to be completed by March 1977. Kin-Buc exceeded its capacity with up to 50 million gallons of liquid wastes and a million tons of solids.

The Sewage Treatment Plant Construction Program

- Q. There have been allegations that the program to build sewage treatment plants across New Jersey has been slow in making grants and has involved some financial mismanagement. What are you doing to ensure integrity and effectiveness in the program?
- A. As you know, this Administration's construction grants program for building and upgrading sewage treatment facilities is the largest public works program in the nation. Of the \$18 billion appropriated nationwide, more than \$1 billion has been obligated to New Jersey and over \$375 million is still to come. Using the formula prepared by the National Utility Contractors Association, this means that over 24,000 construction jobs have been created in New Jersey. The Federal grants will provide sewage treatment -- as well as cleaner lakes and rivers -- for New Jersey's residents. New procedures being instituted by the EPA and State agencies should go a long way toward making certain that mismanagement of public monies does not occur. In summary, the sewage system construction program in New Jersey is in high gear.

Background

In late 1975, there were allegations of mismanagement of grant funds by the Bergen County Sewerage Authority. An EPA audit found no evidence of corruption, but Congressman Andrew McGuire (D-NJ-7, Bergen County) claims the EPA audit was a whitewash.

Given the many opportunities for financial irregularities in such an extensive program, EPA nationally has tightened regulations and procedures pertaining to consultants, the monitoring of construction projects, and has increased auditing manpower by 50%.

EPA is also making certain that present as well as proposed plants meet requirements on the discharge of waste waters.

KENNEDY, LAGUARDIA AND NEWARK AIRPORTS
(Aircraft Noise)

- Q. What is the Federal Government going to do about the noise from aircraft operations at Kennedy, LaGuardia and Newark airports?
- A. I am well aware of the serious problem of aircraft noise at Kennedy, LaGuardia and Newark airports, as well as at a number of other airports around the country.

The Federal Government has taken important first steps in helping to solve this problem. The Airport Development and Assistance Program Amendments, which I signed in July 1976, make additional Federal funds available to purchase land for airport noise barriers. In addition my Secretary of Transportation has recently submitted a proposal to me on an approach to handling the aircraft noise problem. I am now reviewing this proposal and have had several recent meetings with Secretary Coleman and other top advisors on it. I hope we can reach a decision soon.

Background

Concern about aircraft noise continues. Individuals, community groups, and local Congressmen are calling for solutions to the problem. Civil associations neighboring the airports are demanding Federal support for the engine retrofit program. FAA and the aviation industry are making every effort to reduce airport noise. The major accomplishments in the New York/Newark area include:

- (1) Special noise abatement procedures are in effect at Kennedy, LaGuardia, and Newark. They are constantly reviewed to ensure the use of techniques and flight paths that take best advantage, consistent with safety, of open space, water, and recreational and industrial lands.
- (2) The computerized runway selection process used at Kennedy Airport (Dynamic Preferential Runway System) stores runway, operational, and meteorological information and makes a forecast every six hours -- the goal being to minimize "dwell factor" (excessive community overflight).
- (3) The lead-in light system used at at Kennedy enables aircraft to follow the periphery of Jamaica Bay when making landings on Runways 13L/R. New high conspicuity bulbs were recently installed at a cost of \$90,000. FAA is presently reviewing suggestions for further improving this system.

CANCER IN NEW JERSEY (TOXIC SUBSTANCES)

- Q. The National Cancer Institute, in a recent survey, found that New Jersey led the country in cancer incidence. Areas around the New Jersey Turnpike are termed Cancer Alley. What is the Federal Government doing to reverse that trend?
- A. New Jersey has special problems in this area because it is densely populated, industry-intensive, and has a highly developed chemical and manufacturing sector (\$4 billion in receipts each year). More reserach on these problems is needed.

In signing the Toxic-Substance Control bill, I have just taken one step to guard our future. The bill, which represents a reasonable compromise between environmentalists and industry, requires companies to submit toxicity data to the EPA 90 days before marketing any new chemical or old chemical for which new uses are intended. Marketing can be delayed or banned, if EPA considers the tests incomplete or finds indications of significant risk. Companies have the right to challenge such actions. The legislation offers a real opportunity to reverse the unacceptable practice of manufacturing and marketing a chemical and discovering later that it is a serious health threat.

Background

New Jersey cancer deaths total 353 annually for every 100,000 white individuals, compared to 304 nationally and 347 for New York State. (Non-whites were excluded because of insufficient data.)

The highest rates are for rectal cancer in adults, bladder cancer in men, and ovarian cancer in women.

The World Health Orgaization states that 60 to 90% of all cancers are environmentally related. Diet associated with affluent life style in the State may also be contributory.

OCEAN DUMPING

- Q. When will the Federal Government force a halt to the dumping of sewage sludge and other materials in the ocean off New York?
- A. There are four different kinds of materials dumped legally into the ocean off New York and New Jersey under EPA permits -- sewage sludge, dredge spoils, acid wastes, and other chemical wastes. It has been alleged that this dumping was a major factor in the wash-ups of "tar balls", "floatables", and other materials on area beaches this past summer. However, EPA, NOAA, and other agencies are confident the dumping was only a minor contributor, the major ones being untreated sewage from New York City and New Jersey, oil spills and garbage from passing ships, and debris from pier fires.

Nevertheless, EPA is phasing out ocean dumping. Industrial dumping permits have been reduced from 150 in 1973 to only 25 today. Fifteen of these will not be renewed when they expire in November. EPA also has placed the 14 municipal-sludge dumpers, the largest of which is New York City, on a specific timetable for finding and implementing alternate means of disposal by the end of 1981. As for dredge spoil, EPA and the US Army Corps of Engineers are working together to determine the actual environmental impact of this material and the best future course to take.

Background

For over 50 years sewage sludge has been dumped into the New York Bight at a site 12 miles equidistant from New York and New Jersey. (The City also dumped its garbage at sea until the mid '30s, at which time the Supreme Court put an end to this practice.) In 1974, there was great concern that the sludge was moving toward the Long Island beaches. EPA announced the site would be moved farther out to sea, if warranted, but subsequent investigation showed no significant risk to the beaches. The environmental impact statement recommended against moving the dumping to a yet-unsullied site on the assumption that dumping would be phased out altogether in good time.

The reason for future concern is that the volume of sludge for disposal is increasing as new area sewage treatment plants are built.

NEW JERSEY MASS TRANSIT

- Q. What is the current status of the New Jersey mass transit program?
- A. On September 23, Secretary of Transportation Coleman announced that DOT's Urban Mass Transportation Administration (UMTA) concurs, in principal, with New Jersey's request to use a \$400 million Federal grant for three major rail transit projects in northern New Jersey. As I understand it, UMTA will provide up to \$157 million for rail transit improvements in the Newark-Plainfield-Raritan corridor, and will commit funds for four years (FY 1976-1980) to the electrification and rehabilitation of portions of the Erie-Lackawanna Railroad and the New York and Long Branch railroad.

Background

For the Newark-Plainfield-Raritan corridor, UMTA will fund either the Port Authority Trans-Hudson (PATH) Corporation's rail extension from Newark to Plainfield or the upgrading of the Central Rail of New Jersey's (CNJ) commuter rail service. State and local officials are to decide which service to implement.

This \$400 million grant represents the first time UMTA has made a multi-year funding commitment to an entire package of public transportation projects.

VA HOSPITAL -- CAMDEN, NEW JERSEY

Q. What can you tell us about the new Veterans Administration hospital to be built in Camden?

A. We owe our veterans the finest in the way of medical care. My 1977 budget request of over \$4 billion for VA medical care activities was a record high for the system. On May 11, 1976 I announced my decision to build eight new VA hospitals, one of which will be constructed in Camden, New Jersey. I have requested design funds for all eight hospitals and construction funds for two of them. I will request construction funds for the remaining six hospitals at the rate of two a year for the next three years.

Background

The priority for constructing eight hospitals was established by the Veterans Administration. The Camden hospital will be one of the last two built; construction funds will be requested in FY 1980.

FISH KILLS OFF THE NEW JERSEY COAST

- Q. What is the Federal Government doing about the massive fish kills that have been hitting the Mid-Atlantic coast off New Jersey all summer?
- A. EPA and NOAA, along with State environmental agencies, are developing scientific workshops which will lead to a public symposium in January on the fish and shellfish kills which have plagued the New Jersey Coast since the July 4 weekend. The workshops will evaluate all available data and will present their reports on findings and remedial measures to the public symposium. The date and location of the symposium will be set shortly.

CETA -- NEWARK, NEW JERSEY

- Q. Recently, the Newark (New Jersey) prime sponsor for CETA was given an unsatisfactory rating. Will CETA funds be discontinued?
- A. No. The Regional Office of the Department of Labor is working closely with the Newark, New Jersey prime sponsor and expects acceptable levels of performance to be reached within the next three months.

ERDA activities in New Jersey include major efforts in magnetic fusion, solar energy, and conservation. The Princeton Plasma Physics Laboratory supervises design and construction of the Tokamak Fusion Test Reactor which will cost \$228 million and is scheduled for completion about 1981.

MAJOR SOLAR ENERGY PROGRAMS

-- Solar Heating and Cooling

Somerset County Park Commission, under a \$465,000 contract with ERDA, has designed and incorporated an aesthetically and environmentally pleasing solar heating and cooling system into the Environmental Education Center at Basking Ridge. The building will be dedicated the last week in October.

MAJOR FUSION ENERGY PROGRAMS

-- Magnetic Fusion Energy

Under ERDA contract, Princeton University operates one of the Nation's major fusion research laboratories, the Princeton Plasma Physics Laboratory (PPL). The Princeton Large Torus (PLT), the first experimental device in the country large enough to produce conditions near those needed for fusion power reactors, is located there and began operating in December 1975.

Princeton also supervises the design and construction of the Tokamak Fusion Test Reactor (TFTR) and will operate it for ERDA. The \$228 million TFTR is expected to begin operating in the 1980's.

MAJOR FUSION ENERGY PROGRAMS (contd)

-- Magnetic Fusion Energy

The TFTR is expected to be the first in the world to produce fusion energy, and to demonstrate that fusion can be used to successfully generate power.

MAJOR CONSERVATION PROGRAMS

-- Energy Storage

A Battery Energy Storage Test (BEST) facility, to cost approximately \$6.5 million, will be built and operated about 30 miles southwest of Newark, as a joint project of ERDA and the Electric Power Research Institute. Planned for startup in 1979, the facility will be constructed, tested and operated by the Public Service Electric and Gas Company of New Jersey.

MAJOR FOSSIL ENERGY PROGRAMS

-- Pilot Plants

Curtiss Wright Corporation at Wood-Ridge will design, construct, test and evaluate a pressurized fluidized bed pilot plant.

-- Combined Cycle Turbine

Curtiss Wright, also will begin development of a high temperature gas turbine system to generate electricity with fuels derived from coal.

REVENUE SHARING -- UNION COUNTY, NJ

Since the beginning of general revenue sharing in 1972, Union County's government has received more than \$10 million in payments. The County, its cities, boroughs, and townships together have received more than \$35 million in the past four years. Of the \$2 million to be paid to Union County governments in January, more than \$600,000 will go to the County government itself.

Under the three-and-three-quarter year extension of the program, Union County governments can expect to receive another \$31.6 million. Of this amount the County government will receive about \$9.6 million.

Union County has used most of its shared revenues in recent years to pay for health services. Large amounts also have been used to provide adequate police and fire protection and public transportation.

REVENUE SHARING - UNION CITY, NJ

Union, New Jersey has received \$3.7 million through general revenue sharing since the beginning of the this program in 1972. Union now is qualified to receive more than \$800,000 for the current period (July 1, 1976 through December 31, 1976); and we expect to pay the City an additional \$3.2 million during the three-and-three-quarter years for which the program just has been renewed.

According to reports received from the City, the money has helped to provide adequate police and fire protection for the city and to improve the environmental protection programs.

Note: The City of Union did not receive an October, 1976 payment because it had not returned its actual use report covering the period July 1, 1976 through June 30, 1976. The payment would have been \$402,036.

REVENUE SHARING -- BERGEN COUNTY, NJ

Since the beginning of general revenue sharing in 1972, Bergen County's government has received more than \$12.5 million in payments. The County, its boroughs, villages, cities and townships together have received more than \$66.4 million in the past four years. Of the \$2.7 million to be paid to Bergen County governments in January, more than \$722,000 will go to the County government itself.

Now that the General Revenue Sharing Program has been extended for three-and-three-quarter years, Bergen County governments can expect to receive another \$41.9 million. Of this amount, the County government will receive approximately \$11.1 million.

Bergen County has used almost all of its revenue sharing money in recent years to pay the costs of operating health services.

REVENUE SHARING -- PARAMUS, NEW JERSEY

Since the beginning of general revenue sharing in 1972, the Borough of Paramus has received approximately \$1.3 million. It will receive another payment of over \$79,000 in January, and approximately \$1.2 million more in the three-and-three-quarter year renewal period.

According to reports which Paramus has filed with the Treasury Department's Office of Revenue Sharing, the Borough has used most of its revenue-sharing funds to improve public transportation facilities.

REVENUE SHARING -- ESSEX COUNTY, NEW JERSEY

Since the beginning of general revenue sharing in 1972, Essex County's government has received nearly \$37.4 million dollars from the program. The County, its borough, cities, towns, and villages together have received more than \$102.9 million in the past four years. Of the \$5.7 million to be paid to Essex County governments in January, \$2.1 million will go to the County government itself.

Under the three-and-three-quarter extension of the program, Essex County governments can expect to receive \$80 million. Of this amount, the County government will receive about \$32 million.

Essex County has been using virtually all of its shared revenues in recent years to pay for health services.
