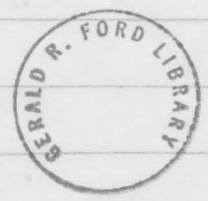

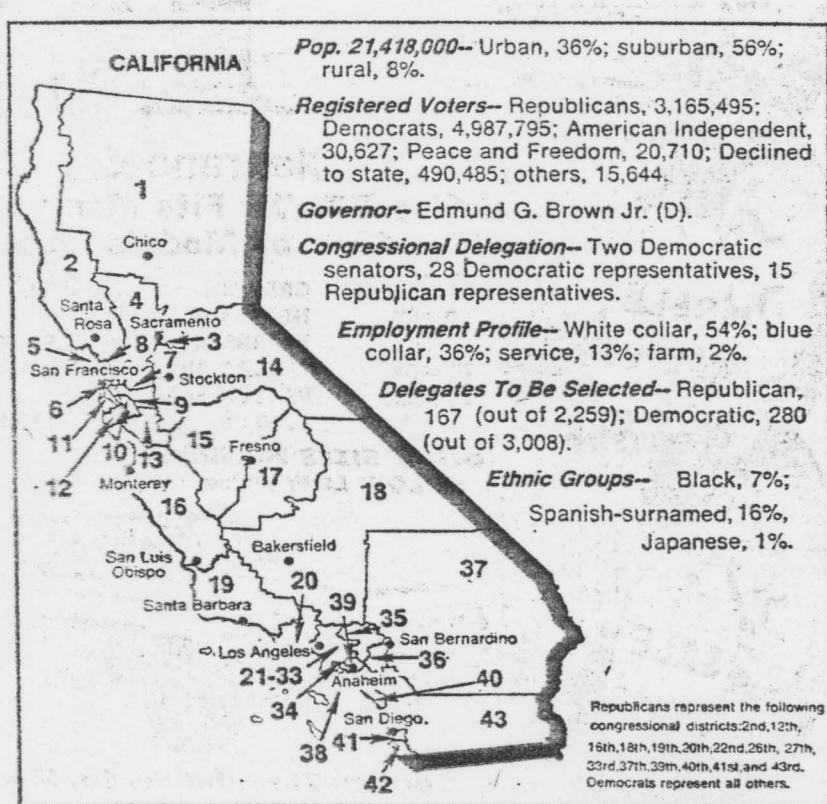
CALIFORNIA VOTING
