liace for progress -- to assist free men and free governments in casting off the chains of poverty ... let all our neighbors know that we shall join them to oppose aggression or subversion anywhere in the Americas.

To those people in the huts and villages of half the globe struggling to break the bonds of mass misery, we pledge our best efforts to help themselves We shall pay any price, bear any burden, meet any hardship. support any friend, oppose any foe to assure the survival and success of liberty.

To those new states ... we pledge our word that one form of colonial control shall not have passed away merely to be replaced by a far more iron t yranny.
