Tom,


I thought you might be interested in the attached correspondence between Proctor Jones, a San Francisco photographer, and a representative of the National Park Service.

Mr. Jones makes the point that the Park Service's Yorktown exhibit has an audio tape which is not historically accurate. Apparently the official who responded missed this point and instead referred to the visual aspects of the display.

This strikes me as one of those "little things" which, if improved, would greatly benefit the public.

At any rate, I thought it appropriate to bring the matter to your attention.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

I received a telephone call from Frank Zarb. He advised me that Secretary Tom Kleppe today told a newsman on the West Coast that the Administration would consider the option of shipping U.S. oil to Japan with an arrangement for an equal amount of Arab crude to come to the U.S. as a solution to the oil surplus on the West Coast.

Obviously this is not our policy. For the time being we have rejected the Japan/Arab trade-off option. I'll keep an eye on this one and if it surfaces, I'll knock it down here.
