These transfers are necessary to meet unanticipated and unbudgeted expenses associated with trial litigation, support of Federal prisoners in local detention facilities and operation of the parole system.

The expenses for these activities have been greater than originally anticipated because of uncontrollable increases imposed by the Courts, inflationary increases in care and custody costs of State and local jails, and because of unanticipated increases in the caseload of the Board of Parole requiring additional manpower.
