

These proposed budget amendments are necessary to provide for increases in the appellate workload of the Federal Labor Relations Council caused by an acceleration of collective bargaining activity in the Federal labor management relations program and by issuance on February 6, 1975, of Executive Order 11491 which creates a new class of appeal cases by removing certain arbitrary barriers to bargaining.

I have carefully reviewed these budget requests and am satisfied that they are necessary at this time. I recommend, therefore, that these proposals be transmitted to the Congress.
