

This request is necessary to purchase additional land for the National Arboretum in Washington, D. C. The additional property will allow the Arboretum to expand its horticultural, environmental, and educational activities. Some of the requested funds will be used to provide additional facilities for visitors to the Arboretum. Present facilities are not adequate for the estimated 600,000 annual visitors.
