#### ORDER OF PAHLAVI

Founded in 1925 in two classes, with and without collar, this is Iran's highest-ranking order. It is named for the family name of the Shah and awarded for civil merit. First class is limited to the immediate royal family, reigning monarchs and foreign heads of state. The second class is awarded to male members of the royal family and crown princes of foreign nations.

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BADGE: First and second class badges are identical, except that the former is of platinum and the the second class, gold. The four crowns of Pahlavi are arranged in the form of a cross. Between each crown are two gold loops joined with a blue enamel




Fig. 703 (Badge) Order of Pahlavi

ring. Center is an enamel medallion showing Mount Demavand with the sun rising above it, in natural colors.




Fig. 704 (Star) Order of Pahlavi

STAR: Same as badge, with the same differences in the metals used, and larger. The loops and rings of the badge which join the four crowns are replaced by five rays. The central ray is blue enamel, and the other four rays are either gold or platinum, depending on the class.

RIBBON: (First Class) Cornflower blue with yellow edges. (Second Class) Darker blue with gold edges.

### ORDER OF ARYAMEHR (Order of the Light of Iran)

Founded September 17, 1967, on the occasion of the conferral of the title Aryamehr (Light of Iran) on the Shah. This order comes in two classes, both for ladies. The first class is limited to Her Imperial Majesty, the Empress, and to the daughtet of the Shah, Queen Shahanbou. The second class is limited to the royal princesses.



Fig. 705 (Star) Order of Aryamehr (Second Class)

BADGE: Gold, multi-rayed star with 16 swallowtails, each one covered with diamonds. Center is a gold Pahlavi crown, on a circular blue enamel background, ringed by a circle of diamonds.

STAR: Identical, but larger.

RIBBON: Royal blue worn as a sash terminating in two gold tassels.

### ORDER OF HAFT PAYKAR (Order of the Pleiades)

Founded in 1957 as an award only to distinguished and high-born ladies. Award comes in three medals (gold, gold and silver, and silver). First class is limited to queens and to wives of foreign heads of state. The second class is limited to princesses. Third class is for distinguished ladies.




Fig. 706 (Star) Order of Haft Paykar

BADGE: First Class: Gold with white enamel, with openwork of gold surrounding the center medallion. The medallion is royal blue and portrays the seven stars of the constellation "Pleiades." Each star is diamond set. Surrounding the medallion is a goldrimmed, white enamel band with 24 small gold stars topped by the Imperal crown in red enamel.

Second class badge is identical but with silver stars. Third class is the same, except that it is worn on a bow (see under "Sash").

#### STAR: Identical to badge but larger.

SASH: First class: Light yellow with blue stripes toward each edge, terminating in two gold tassels. Second class: White with light blue stripe toward each edge, terminating in two white tassels. Third class: Colors as second class, but worn as a bow.

### ORDER OF THE TAJ (Order of the Crown)

Founded in 1941 in five classes and awarded for services to Iran. The first class is limited to ten Iranian nationals of cabinet rank and entitles the recipient to a state funeral. The other four classes are awarded to government officials and foreigners for outstanding services to Iran.




Fig. 707 (Badge) Order of the Taj

BADGE: Ten-pointed, gold-rimmed, green bordered white enamel star, each point tipped with a gold ball. Center medallion is blue and portrays the crown of Iran in natural colors. Badge is suspended from a small gold and green wreath, except in the fifth class

STAR: Obverse of badge, the arms of the cross on which are of faceted silver. The whole is superimposed on a multi-rayed, gold star.

RIBBON: Yellow moire, edged in light blue.

### ORDER OF HOMAYOUN (Order of the Lion and Sun)

Originally founded in 1808 by Shah Feth-Ali in five classes to reward high-ranking govenment officials and foreigners for outstanding services to Persia (now Iran). In 1925 the order was re-founded under the Pahlavi dynasty, and the badge and star were redesigned. It still comes in five classes, and three medals have been added. It is now Iran's fifth-ranking order.

BADGE: (Old Type): Eight pointed, silver faceted star. Center medallion portrays in natural colors Crest of Iran, a lion with an unraised sword in his right front paw with a rising sun behind his back.

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

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


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

Relations with Iran have suffered some strains in recent months because of our inability to help Iran in two important inter-related areas--escalating costs of US arms and insufficient oil revenues to meet these and the overall costs of Iran's ambitious military modernization program. More generally, the Shah remains concerned about the reliability of the US commitment to its friends and allies around the world. In these circumstances, it is important that the Shah be reassured of our commitment to a sound and special relationship with Iran, despite periodic differences on some issues. For the reasons outlined by Secretary Kissinger at Tab B, it is recommended that you send the Shah a letter of reassurance along the lines of Tab A. I have suggested the addition of the sentence referring to the Vice President's travels since this represents a tangible sign of our interest in continued close relations with Iran.

The Shah of Iran has, during the last six to eight months, come to realize that, in spite of a dramatic increase in Iran's income from oil since 1973, his expected revenues will not meet the costs of his ambitious civilian and military development programs. In the fourth quarter of 1975, Iran's exports of heavy crude oil plummeted by about 1.5 million barrels per day. In the last few weeks the Shah has made a series of direct and indirect approaches to us seeking the assistance of this Government in putting pressure on American oil companies to increase their purchases of Iranian heavy crude oil. He has suggested that, if Iran's oil income does not rise to meet his development spending plans, he will have to revise his foreign policy to fit the country's more modest financial capabilities.

Our studies have led us to the conclusion that the current world demand pattern for oil--particularly the heavy crudes--probably makes it impossible for us to be of any substantial assistance in increasing Iran's oil income. We are also unable to be of any assistance to Iran in the related problem of the high and steadily advancing cost of sophisticated defense equipment. We note, incidentally, that a decision by the Shah to slow the pace of his defense development program would have the positive aspect of permitting Iran's strained manpower and infrastructure to catch up with equipment procurements.

The President has reviewed the study of November 20, 1975, regarding the negotiation of a nuclear agreement with Iran, and has noted the comments and recommendations provided by the addressees.

He also believes any moves taken by the US to accommodate Iranian concerns should be taken in the light of a clear perception of Iran's principal problems with past US proposals as well as a clear understanding as to whether Iran still desires to transact much of its nuclear business with the US if a nuclear agreement can be concluded.

The President has noted the range of possible modifications to the current US position that ultimately might prove necessary to reach an agreement based on the above objectives. He has, however, decided to reserve his judgment as to the final position that the United States should take on the substance of the proposed agreement, while approving the proposal that the State Department and ERDA should promptly send a high-level team to Tehran. This team should seek to clarify the Shah's concerns with the US position and to expose the Shah and others (1) to the reasons for the US interests in discouraging the establishment of completely national reprocessing facilities in Iran and other countries, and (2) to the technical and economic factors which militate against a near-term decision to reprocess in Iran. The talks would be exploratory in character during which the US team would

endeavor to induce Iran to join with the US in an act of leadership designed to discourage the spread of independent national reprocessing facilities. In this regard, we would favor a commitment to the multinational concept but would be prepared to explore with Iran other techniques for achieving the same objective.

The US representatives are authorized to inform Iranian officials whenever they deem appropriate that the US would allow Iran to receive and store, under effective safeguards, all of its entitled share of the low enriched uranium that it might purchase through investment in a US facility. Retransfer of this material would be restricted to those countries with which the United States has an appropriate agreement for cooperation.

Following these high-level talks, and any further discussions required to sharpen our understanding of Iran's position, a report should be submitted to the President describing those alternate approaches which would be consistent with our objective of avoiding the spread of national reprocessing facilities while permitting us to reach an agreement on nuclear cooperation with Iran. The implications of these alternatives should be assessed in light of our non-proliferation and other objectives, and the prospects for Congressional approval. The report should include agency recommendations.

In light of the extensive analysis that has already been carried out, there should be little delay in the preparation of this report, for the President wishes to avoid any long hiatus between the discussions with the Shah and the resumption of detailed negotiations.

The President wants efforts to continue on a timely basis in assembling the technical and economic data needed to evaluate the multinational reprocessing concept. In this connection, he believes that the efforts underway to develop our domestic reprocessing industry will provide an important source of information and he expects the evaluation of the multinational concept to draw upon that information. He wants it understood that our efforts to deter proliferation by promoting the multinational concept in our international negotiations should in no way restrict our domestic policy with respect to reprocessing or the way we develop our domestic industry.

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### Your Imperial Majesty:

I appreciate your agreement to meet with Dr. Seamans and Under Secretary Maw to exchange views on the use of nuclear energy and our proposed nuclear power agreement. Given our desire to cooperate closely in this important field, I know that your Imperial Majesty shares our wish to see this agreement brought to a successful conclusion.

It is well known that under your leadership Iran has played a leading role in supporting the Non-Preliferation Treaty and other efforts to abate the spread of nuclear weapons. I know that you and I share the same desire to foster the goal of non-preliferation. I believe that Iran and the United States may have a unique opportunity to provide vital international leadership in helping to ensure that the sensitive aspect of the nuclear fuel cycle evolves in a manner that reassures the world.

In view of the special relationship between our countries and our strong desire for the secure development of nuclear energy, I have requested Dr. Seamans and Mr. Maw to explain to you how our specific proposals fit into our broader non-proliferation policies. I will be deeply interested in your own views and concerns. Dr. Seamans and Mr. Maw will report to me promptly upon their return.

At Tab A is the message of thanks from the Shah to the President's recent letter (copy attached). Since this is a thank-you letter, there is really no need for a further reply. The next step is the visit by the Vice President, which the Shah anticipates with pleasure.

### "DEAR MR. PRESIDENT,

I HAVE RECEIVED WITH GREAT PLEASURE THE LETTER WHICH YOU ENTRUSTED TO YOUR REPRESENTATIVES DR. SEAMANS AND UNDER-SECRETARY MAW WITH WHOM I HAD INTERESTING DISCUSSIONS DURING THEIR RECENT VISIT TO TEHRAN. THE PERSONAL INTEREST WHICH YOU HAVE SHOWN IN THE COOPERA-TION BETWEEN OUR TWO COUNTRIES IN THE FIELD OF NUCLEAR ENERGY IS GREATLY APPRECIATED AND REPRESENTS AN IMPORTANT STEP FORWARD IN THE CONCLUSION OF THE PROPOSED AGREEMENT BETWEEN IRAN AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. I FULLY SHARE YOUR CONCERN FOR THE NON-PROLIFERATION OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS AND, I APPRECIATE YOUR LEADERSHIP AND THE SIGNIFICANT ROLE WHICH THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA HAS ASSUMED IN THIS RESPECT. AS YOU YOURSELF KNOW SO WELL, IRAN HADINITIATED AN IMPORTANT NUCLEAR PRO-GRAMME IN ORDER TO SUPPORT ITS RAPID ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT WHICH NECESSITATES THE WIDESPREAD AND INCREASING USE OF

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ENERGY. PRESIDENT, THAT YOUR NON-PROLIFERATION POLICY WOULD REMAIN FLEXIBLE ENOUGH TO ALLOW A FRUITFUL AND MEANINGFUL COOPERATION TO PREVAIL BETWEEN OUR TWO COUNTRIES IN THE FIELD OF NUCLEAR ENERGY.
