Dear Mr. President:

I have had time now to kind of get used to the events of the last few days. The press has called me several times, and I have had to sit down and put my thoughts together. I thought you might like to know how one of your supporters saw it from "down in Mississippi."

You gave us a very strong Republican base to build on in the South. We were so close to carrying the state that we seriously were considering a recount Wednesday. These people in Mississippi, who voted Republican, had to do so after a lot of thought and study, and you gave them excellent reasons for supporting you. You fought gallantly and you had to carry Nixon's pardon, Watergate, the recession and the energy crisis on your back. You also had to put up with the disgruntled Reagan people who really didn't get their motors running in time. You had to build a national constituency for yourself and do your job all at the same time. It was a fantastic performance, and you nearlly pulled it off! The odds were impossible. I deeply enjoyed getting to know you and fighting by your side.

Our Republican Party must learn to reach out to the little people, too. I don't think we have to do it by promising more welfare or bigger federal programs, but I think that we should do it by opening up the economic system so that more blacks and more women can participate. Last December, when you and I sat and had coffee together, we talked about my Governor's race and the fact that my Democratic opponent had put together a coalition of blacks and labor and beat us. The same thing happened Tuesday night. This doesn't mean we turn our backs on them; quite the contrary.
