#### STATE CAMPAIGN ORGANIZATIONS

CALIFORNIA - A California Youth Program and a number of professional and ethnic special committees have been established and data for a Southern California telephone campaign has been completed. Similar information for other area phone banks should be available within the next week.

The Reagan organization is sending Senator Laxalt to travel throughout the State announcing the Reagan County Chairmen. Preliminary indications show these chairmen will largely be prominent financial leaders.

COLORADO - Our organization has named two of five District Chairmen, and the Advisory Committee includes John Love, Gordon Allott, former State Chairman Dwight Hamilton, and former National Committeeman Bill Powers. The State Convention has been scheduled for July 10 at the Colorado State University campus in Ft. Collins.

The Reagan organization is headed by Mike South, a former campaign manager for Congressman Don Brotzman. South is well respected and a good organizer.

The precinct caucuses will be held on January 27. All 27 District Chairmen have been named and our headquarters were opened last week.

The Reagan organization is very loose, with no leaders named to date. There is evidence of some people drumming up support independently, and two Reagan mailings have been sent into the State from the national level. However, our local leaders still believe they'll get all 19 delegate votes for you.

<u>IDAHO</u> - Idaho, along with Oregon and Nevada, have been targetted by the news media as key states as their May 25 primaries are seen as influencing the California primary on June 8.

We have a good organization with an Advisory Committee consisting of former Senator Len Jordan, former Congressman Orville Hansen, Bill Campbell (Len Jordan's campaign manager), John Fery, President of Boise Cascade, and former Governor Bob Smiley. All six districts have Chairmen and a headquarters has been opened in Boise. PFC Chairman Dave LeRoy has appointed a Youth Director, General Counsel, Treasurer, Speakers Bureau Director, and Precinct Director.

A mailing to 1,800 Republicans in the state was sent on January 15 announcing the formation of the State PFC Committee, along with a mailing to 150 media outlets. The Idaho College Republicans and Young Republicans seem to be very much in our camp, and there is a very active PFC organization on the University of Idaho campus.

The Reagan organization also appears to be strong. It is headed by Attorney General Wayne Kidwell and Peter Cenarrusa, the Secretary of State, is the Vice Chairman. (Cenarrusa, however, may have to resign since he is solely responsible for placing names on the primary ballot and local officials feel this is a conflict of interest.) Congressman Symms is supporting Reagan and hopes to merge his campaign organization with the Reagan organization. Reagan apparently has made a commitment to visit Idaho before the primary, but no date has been set.

INDIANA - Headquarters were opened in Indianapolis on Tuesday, January 13. Our Executive Director, J.C. Beck, a former Assistant to GOP State Chairman Tom Milligan, will focus on a petition drive, Congressional District Chairmen, and target precincts. The State Convention is June 18.

There is no evidence of Reagan activity to date.

 $\overline{\text{NEVADA}}$  - The 12-member Executive Committee and the Steering Committee are now complete. Headquarters are located in Reno and Las Vegas, with formal openings in mid-February.

The Reagan organization is very active from Paul Laxalt's Senate and law offices. His strength is centered in the Reno area, while our strength is in the more populous Las Vegas region.

NEW YORK - Dick Rosenbaum, GOP Chairman, says that we're "very well off" with regard to the 37-member At-Large delegation of which Rosenbaum will be Chairman. We're still pretty much in his hands but have little choice, and he says he'll deliver for us.

Reagan surprised his supporters here several weeks ago with his decision not to formally organize or campaign in the State.

OHIO - State PFC Chairman Keith McNamara is an excellent organizer. An Advisory Committee for Congressional District Chairmen is nearly complete and all GOP leaders have been contacted. They've badly fallen down, however, on fundraising and still have not appointed a Finance Chairman.

Reagan has delayed his efforts here pending the outcome of early primaries.

OREGON - The 8-member Executive Committee has been completed with the Steering Committee and County Chairmen to follow by the end of the month. A partial poll of State Legislators showed only 5 of 29 supporting Reagan.

<u>VERMONT</u> - After discussions with GOP Chairman Peanut Kennedy, we have agreed to file for the primary, but the extent of actual campaigning will depend on Reagan activity. This is strictly a beauty contest, with the 18 delegates being selected at the mid-May Convention. However, since writeins are allowed, we believe it essential to have your name on the ballot.

WASHINGTON - County Chairmen are 75% complete, and Fred Baker has appointed a 7-member Executive Committee. Mayor Dave Rogers of Spokane has agreed to be Eastern Washington Chairman but wants us to hold off on the public announcement. He was having a meeting of his 12-member Organizing Committee this past weekend.

<u>WISCONSIN</u> - Four out of nine Congressional District Chairmen are in place, with County Chairmen soon to follow. Our headquarters have been opened in Milwaukee.

Reagan visited the University of Wisconsin to speak, and was greeted with jeers and eggs, which helped him more than hurt. He has already sent mailings to the GOP leadership, and his strength among conservatives is considerable.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

\$96,984 was raised for the week for a total of \$1,866,665. \$226,641 was disbursed. The complete Treasurer's Report is attached at TAB A. The FEC has approved the next \$118,000 in matching funds.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

GOP STATE CHAIRMEN'S MEETING - Stu Spencer, Ed Terrill, Mimi Austin and I attended the meeting in Chicago and from an attendance standpoint it was very good, with 45 States represented. However, the meeting itself was poorly planned and there was a noticeable lack of enthusiasm. We met with a group of "big" State Chairmen which Kent McGough of Ohio arranged for the purpose of briefing them on the campaign, but again we noted a general listlessness. This doesn't seem to be directed at you or the campaign, but rather at politics in general and the feeling seems to be that nothing "exciting" is happening. Everyone seemed to be complaining about something. In follow-up meetings with members of the RNC staff, they agreed with our analysis but don't have a solution.

CALIFORNIA REPUBLICAN ASSEMBLY - I addressed approximately 200 members of the Executive Committee of the CRA at lunch on Friday, after meeting with our Northern California PFC organization in San Francisco. Both meetings were excellent. Dave Liggett, our PFC Coordinator for California, reported that they will follow up with CRA members in attendance and feels we have a chance for their endorsement in April. This was a tough group to speak to, but were not the solid, hard-core Reagan people that I expected.
