

State Campaign Organizations

Alabama Bill Seidman and Ed Terrill substituted for Senator Griffin here during a weekend of PFC events (that was referred to in last week's report) in Gadsen and Birmingham. Senator Griffin had to cancel his planned trip because of a vote on the Jobs Bill.

Alaska All the district caucus results are complete, and the delegate count for the State Convention shows: Ford - 105, Reagan - 78. Letter to our delegates will be sent as soon as our lists are complete. Efforts are underway to insure all our delegates attend the State Convention, where we anticipate receiving all 19 delegates.

The delegates to the State Convention are currently 62% - 38% in favor of Mr. Reagan, which would lead to a 21-8 advantage for them in delegates to the National Convention. We also lost Senator Paul Fannin and National Committeewoman May Krisp as candidates for National Delegate, both of whom were pressured into not running. The Reagan organization, headed by Congressman Conlan, continues to be strong.

 $\underline{\text{Arkansas}}$ A total of 10,000 names have now been gathered from previous primary voter lists, and two county chairmen were added during the past week.

Colorado A total of eight county chairmen were added this week. Telephone campaigns and mailings were started in various counties to contact registered Republicans urging them to attend precinct caucuses. In El Paso County, where a telephone campaign is underway, calls are funning 2-1 pro-Ford.

Connecticut The 980 delegates selected to the State Convention have all received a letter from our State Chairmen, and we have an active group of 80 workers, who are maintaining contact with these delegates to strengthen our position for the State Convention.

<u>Hawaii</u> State delegates here have received a Presidential letter, and it appears certain we will get 18 out of the 19 convention delegates. The Reagan organization has very little activity underway, and some of their people have had difficulty getting responses from their national headquarters.

Idaho The Idaho Central Committee has a definite pro-Reagan slant, with the Chairmen of both the Resolutions and Rules Committees being state Citizens for Reagan officials. Dave Leroy, State PFC Chairman, was awarded a co-chairmanship of the unimportant platform committee. Secretary Kleppe will be in the state this week to address the Rocky Mountain Oil and Gas Association and to formally open the PFC State Headquarters.

Indiana There are now 16 out of the 21 storefront phone centers in operation. A total of 96 telephones have been installed in an effort to call 266,000 households before the primary. Two additional newsletters are scheduled to follow the April 1st mailing, which went to 10,000 voters. The other newsletters will cover the President't trip as well as highlights from the advocates' speaking engagements. Scheduled advocates to date include Carla Hills, Secretary Simon, and Jack Ford. In addition, State PFC Chairman, Don Cox, and other advocates will be holding a series of press conferences.

A telephone poll taken in Indianapolis by Mayor Luger's campaign workers contacted 400 voters, and the results were 45.2% for Ford, 24.6% for Reagan, and 30.3% undecided. The poll also shows the 11th District to be a weak area, with a 39-33% split in our favor.

<u>Iowa</u> Meetings were held last week between our Regional Coordinator and state PFC officials to discuss delegate selection. We have recognized the need to distribute our delegates so that they are geographically representive of their districts. We have a good selection of delegates, many of whom are identified with the State Republican Committee, or publicly know Republicans in some other capacity. A telephone canvassing effort has begun in Des Moines, where volunteers are looking up phone numbers for the counties where we do not yet have chairmen.

Kansas The delegate count from conventions is complete in the 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 5th districts. Statewide totals show 406 for Ford, 328 for Reagan, and 169 uncommitted. The Reagan strength is centered in the Third District. John Connally is scheduled to visit the state next week to speak at a dinner in Wichita.

Kentucky Phone banks are being established in areas of the hightest population concentration, with a direct mail effort scheduled for rural districts. Congressman Carter announced his endorsement of the President, and the PFC Headquarters was opened, with both events receiving excellent media coverage.

The Reagan organization has concentrated its efforts on controlling the party in order to effect the State Convention, and they have not had a great deal of organizational activity.

Michigan A meeting last week established plans for the phone program, with initial banks to be placed in Oakland, Macomb, and Genesee, which are our three weakest areas. We have the lists used in Governor Milliken's campaign, which are very good, with a total of 200,000 names anticipated.

Minnesota A statewide PFC meeting last week attracted approximately 55 of our chairmen from around the state to discuss strategy for the Congressional District Convention which is being held April 24th and May 15th. The consensus at this point is that we can expect 36 to 38 delegates. A current estimate of our strength from the County Conventions that have been held show 1,025 for Ford, 429 Reagan, and 219 uncommitted.

Montana In order to become a delegate here, a candidate must send a request to state party headquarters in order to be considered. Current estimates show 70 such requests, 25 of which are pro-Ford, 25 for Mr. Reagan, and the remaining 20 uncommitted. Efforts are being made to name chairmen in those numerous counties where we are not yet represented.

Nebraska There are currently 44 county chairmen, which includes all the target counties and almost 2/3 of the statewide GOP vote. All our chairmen have requested voter registration lists, and 16 of them have been acquired, including Omaha and Lincoln. Phone banks are planned in these latter two counties, and volunteers are currently working to put phone numbers on these lists.

The Reagan organization announced a slate of delegates for the primary, the first time a slate has been tried in the history of the state. We sent a letter in response announcing there would be no Ford slate, and we are working to see that their strategy backfires on them.

Agriculture and gun control remain important issues in the state.

Nevada Although, we have been outnumbered by 2-1 at the State Convention, our telephone campaigns in Reno and Las Vegas indicate we may do much better in the primary, the results of which bind delegates to the National Convention. We have a chance of winning half of the 18 delegates, despite the strong Reagan organization being run by Senator Laxalt.

New Mexico Mr. Reagan is scheduled to visit this state April 20th, and a letter promising a Presidential visit to balance this trip has been sent in response. The precinct caucuses begin April 26th, and we are maintaining our estimates of gaining 2/3 to 3/4 of the delegates.

Anderson Carter, Reagan's southwest coordinator, has stated that he has conceded New Mexico.

Ohio The Reagan organization successfully petitioned to get Mr. Reagan's name on the at-large delegate ballot for the June 8th primary. They are also contesting five of the nine districts in which their delegates failed to qualify.

Oregon A recent poll taken by Bardsley-Wachlacker, an independent polling firm, which was completed April 1st, reported Ford 66%, Reagan 33% and 11% undecided among 240 Republicans voters that were interviewed. This contrasts with a poll taken last September which showed Ford 43%, Reagan 42% and 18% undecided. Our own telephone banks have begun operation, and with 1,776 calls completed, we have 51.2%, 34.1% for Reagan, and the balance undecided.

Pennsylvania A fund raiser featuring Vice-President Rockefeller has raised between \$25-30,000 to date. A second fund raiser is planned within the next week to bring the state closer to its goal.

During the course of last week, Congressman Bud Schuster came over to our side.

Rhode Island Our candidates for delegates and alternates have been screened and selected. A telephone operation and voter identification program are underway for the primary.

South Carolina The South Carolina District Conventions are complete, and 17 out of the 18 delegates selected favor Mr. Reagan. We are maintaining contact with all the delegates and alternates in an effort to acquire support prior to the State Convention.

Tennessee Delegates here are elected proportionally by district with the at-large slate based on the proportional statewide vote. Senator Baker, who had been Honorary Chairman, has now assumed the role of Chairman. We are also hoping for an open endorsement from Senator Brock, and Congressman Quillen is ready to assist us in the First District. The major battle will be in Shelby County, where we will concentrate our phone bank operation.

The Reagan organization is weak at this time, but Mr. Reagan drew a great response when he announced his intention to spend eight full days in the state prior to the primary. This decision brought a great deal of press coverage, and will be a significant advantage to their efforts.

Texas The statewide phone bank voter identification effort has now contacted 71,012 households, with 44.5% for Ford, 38.1% undecided and 17.4% for Mr. Reagan.

A strategy to elect Mexican-Americans Ford delegates is being implemented as these races will effect four Congressional Districts.

Vermont A press conference was held on April 16th to announce the State Executive Committee for the PFC, which included Senator Stafford and Congressman Jefforts. County Chairmen have been established in 2/3 of the counties.

Washington Earlier newspaper estimates have reported a 60-40% split in our favor, but it is doubtful that this will continue. We did not do as well as expected in the King County Convention, partly due to the fact that Mr. Reagan made a personal appearance shortly before the meeting.

Governor Evans has begun providing assistance in Pierce, Snolomush and Spokane Counties.

Wyoming Wyoming selects 10 delegates at-large during the State Convention, and seven delegates from the judicial districts. Of the latter, five have been chosen, all of whom are expected to be pro-Ford. The State Convention will be held on April 21st.

Campaign '76

Reagan has heavy advertising in Texas and Indiana. Our advertising started Thursday in Texas.

<u>Legal</u>

During the past two weeks, the Legal Department has been intensively engaged in working with Phil Buchen's office regarding proposed legislation amending the Federal election campaign laws. Also, a letter was forwarded to Loren Smith, General Counsel for the Citizens for Reagan, pointing out that certain apparent violations of the Federal election campaign laws may have taken place by delegates pledged to Ronald Reagan in Texas. As of this date, a response has not been received from Mr. Smith. If none is forthcoming or if the response is unacceptable, we may proceed with other appropriate legal action.

Treasurer's Report

A total of \$297,689.30 was received in contributions this past week, bringing to \$8,235,458.03 the amount of money received to date. There is currently a balance of \$453,466.10 on hand. A full Treasurer's Report is attached at TAB A.
