### GENERAL CAMPAIGN ORGANIZATION

Carolyn Booth, formerly Director of Volunteers, is now working fulltime coordinating "Young Voter" activities in the early primary states. Chairmen have been appointed in Illinois and Florida. Emphasis is on group activities, particularly on college campuses, with meetings, rallies and other special events being planned to help create the visible image of the campaign. Jim Miles, who coordinated Senior Citizen activity in '72, is now helping the PFC in this area, concentrating his program at present in Florida. Jim Low, President of the American Society of Association Executives, is developing a program for business and professional leaders and along with Henry Ullmann, who is a full-time volunteer in Florida, is working with business associations for their endorsements and volunteer assistance. Former Congressman Bill Ayres will be working with Henry in Florida to involve former Members of Congress in the campaign.

### STATE CAMPAIGN ORGANIZATIONS

ALASKA - Jerry Abramczyk, the PFC Director in the State, reports that the situation is improving somewhat and is about 50/50 right now. All county and district chairmen have been appointed, our headquarters are opened, and a letter to selected Republicans from Senator Stevens has been mailed.

The Reagan organization, which had a two-month head start on us, continues to spend a lot of money and remains very active. They have sent out at least three statewide mailings and hosted a lavish hospitality suite at the State Executive Committee meeting.

IDAHO - Dave LeRoy has done extensive travelling within the State to meet with GOP leaders. His trips have received good press coverage. The main problem continues to be agricultural

policy. Four members have been added to the Advisory Committee and a Director of Special Projects has been named.

<u>KANSAS</u> - A straw poll taken during the recent GOP Kansas Day meetings showed Ford 61%, Reagan 38%, and 1% undecided. During these meetings, the State Convention was set for May 22. A nine-member Reagan Steering Committee was announced on January 29 but contained no surprises.

MISSOURI - A headquarters has been opened in St. Louis and John Williams named Executive Director. No other appointments have been made in the State.

NEBRASKA - As of January 30, 27 people had filed as Ford delegates with 39 for Reagan. The filing deadline is March 12. Bill Barrett, PFC Chairman, is concentrating on delegate selection, while Dee Graham, Co-Chairman, is working on organization.

<u>NEW HAMPSHIRE</u> - The New Hampshire phone campaign completed its first full week of voter identification with a total of 22,519 calls made. 34% were identified as your supporters, 17% as Reagan supporters, and 49% undecided.

<u>NEW MEXICO</u> - Although the Reagan organization has gained some momentum with their headquarters opening, a straw telephone poll conducted by the PFC among 575 Party leaders showed the following response: Of 479 reached -- Ford 256, Reagan 83, Undecided 137. Also, of the 33 Republican legislators, 32 are supporting you, and of the 12 Republican senators, 7 are for you.

The GOP Committee in New Mexico announced that you would be attending their fund-raising dinner on March 13. The PFC people believe this was meant to embarrass them and will do what is necessary to counteract any negative press.

NORTH CAROLINA - There is a good organization in the 32 target counties that contain 75% of the Republican vote. In fact, they have found a serious Reagan threat in only 4 or 5 counties, in spite of a heavily financed Reagan campaign.

# NORTH CAROLINA (continued)

Governor Holshouser just completed a 13-city tour to meet with the telephone volunteers and is scheduled at twelve Lincoln Day dinners this month. In addition, he is hosting a series of dinners in the newly renovated Governor's Mansion.

WYOMING - The official announcement of Vince Horn as Chairman was made on February 5. In addition, a nine-member Steering Committee has been appointed which includes the former Governor, the State Auditor, State Treasurer, and Superintendent of Public Instruction.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

Contributions totalling \$340,808 were received during the week along with \$165,975 in matching funds for a total of \$506,783. Disbursements totalled \$337,944. An additional request for approximately \$300,000 in matching funds was submitted today. A copy of the report is attached at TAB A.
