It was suggested to me by Helen Collins that I submit this request to you for proper handling.

The New Orleans Chamber will hold its annual meeting on December 17. At this meeting the Chamber will also pay fitting tribute to retiring Congressman F. Edward Hebert, who is completing his 18th consecutive term of office.
