



Dear Mr. Hartmann:

Among the names most mentioned by the press as potential vice presidents, one is conspicous by its absence. I have gotten to recognize a substantial number of members of Congress in the past two or three weeks, and I have been most impressed by Congressman John Anderson of Illinois. I believe that Mr. Anderson has those qualities of thoughtful judgment and obvious competence that are suited to these troubled times.

Of the names most frequently discussed, only one troubles me to any extent. Former Congressman and Secretary of Defense Melvin Laird has left me with the impression that he is a slashing political partisan. Under normal circumstances, a partisan inclination would be of minor relevance. I understand that you assisted the President in drafting his inaugural address. I am impressed.

- 3. Former Pennsylvania Governor William W. Scranton: an experienced former chief executive of a large industrial state; renowned
