THE WHITE HOUSE

Dear Mr. Speaker:

I transmit herewith for the consideration of the Congress draft legislation which would authorize annual appropriations for the White House Office, the Executive Residence, Special Assistance to the President (i.e., assistance provided to the President by the Vice President for Executive branch duties), the Domestic Council, and funds to meet unanticipated needs for personnel and administrative expenses.

The activities provided for in this bill have been funded over the years in annual appropriation acts but these acts have been delayed the past few years because some provisions were not authorized in permanent legislation. This bill was drafted to remedy that situation and I am now requesting that permanent authorizations be enacted to facilitate the appropriation process.

The bill sets upper limits on the pay level of senior staff assistants in each of the offices concerned and is consistent with the present levels approved by the Congress in annual appropriation acts. It also authorizes and sets pay limitations on consultants hired by these offices. In addition, travel and official entertainment expenses, which are appropriated annually, would be made subject to the authorization provided for in this bill.

The bill would not change the requirements for annual appropriations for each of the offices concerned. Budgets will continue to be submitted annually to the Congress and the Appropriations Committees will have an opportunity for complete review during their hearings.



I urge the Congress to act favorably on this proposal and trust that its enactment will expedite the appropriation process.

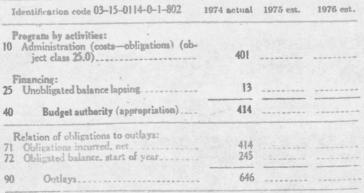

TITLE VI—GENERAL PROVISIONS

DEPARTMENTS, AGENCIES, AND CORPORATIONS

[Sec. 601. Unless otherwise specifically provided the maximum amount allowable during the current fiscal year in accordance with section 16 of the Act of August 2, 1946 (60 Stat. 810), for the purchase of any passenger motor vehicle (exclusive of buses and ambulances), is hereby fixed at \$2,100 except station wagons for which the maximum shall be \$2,400: Provided, That these limits may be exceeded by not to exceed \$900 for police-type vehicles.

may be exceeded by not to exceed \$900 for police-type vehicles. Sec. [602] 601. Unless otherwise specified and during the current fiscal year, and the period July 1, 1976, through September 30, 1976, no part of any appropriation contained in this or any other Act shall be used to pay the compensation of any officer or employee of the Government of the United States (including any agency the majority of the stock of which is owned by the Government of the United States) whose post of duty is in continental United States unless such person (1) is a citizen of the United States, (2) is a person in the service of the United States on the date of enactment of this Act, who, being eligible for citizenship, has filed a declaration of intention to become a citizen of the United States prior to such date and is actually residing in the United States, (3) is a person who owes allegiance to the United States, or (4) is an alien from Cuba, Poland, or the Baltic countries lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence: Provided, That, for the purpose of this section, an affidavit signed by any such person shall be considered prima facie evidence that the requirements of this section with respect to his status have been complied with: Provided further, That any person making a false affidavit shall be guilty of a felony, and, upon conviction, shall be fined not more than \$4,000 or imprisoned for not more than one year, or both: Provided further, That the above penal-clause shall be in addition to, and not in substitution for, any other provisions of existing law: Provided further, That any payment made to any officer or employee contrary to the provisions of this section shall be recoverable in action by the Federal Government. This section shall not apply to citizens of the Republic of the Philippines or to nationals of those countries allied with the United States in the current defense effort, or to temporary employment of translators, or to temporary employment in the field service (not to exceed sixty days) as a result of emergencies

Sec. [603] 602. Appropriations of the executive departments and independent establishments for the current fiscal year, and the period July 1, 1976, through September 30, 1976, available for expenses of travel or for the expenses of the activity concerned, are hereby made available for quarters allowances and cost-of-living allowances, in accordance with 5 U.S.C. 5922-5924.

Sec. [604] 603. No part of any appropriation for the current fiscal year and the period July 1, 1976, through September 30, 1976, contained in this or any other Act shall be paid to any person for the filling of any position for which he or she has been nominated after the Senate has voted not to approve the nomination of said person.

Sec. [605] 604. Funds made available by this or any other Act for administrative expenses in the current fiscal year and the period July 1, 1976, through September 30, 1976, of the corporations and agencies subject to the Government Corporation Control Act, as amended (31 U.S.C. 841), shall be available, in addition to objects for which such funds are otherwise available, for rent in the District of Columbia; services in accordance with 5 U.S.C. 3109; and the objects specified under this head, all the provisions of which shall be applicable to the expenditure of such funds unless otherwise specified in the Act by which they are made available. Provided, That in the event any functions budgeted as administrative expenses are subsequently transferred to or paid from other funds, the limitations on administrative expenses shall be correspondingly reduced.

Sec. [606] 605. Pursuant to section 1415 of the Act of July 15, 1952 (66 Stat. 662), foreign credits (including currencies) owed to or owned by the United States may be used by Federal agencies for any purpose for which appropriations are made for the current fiscal year and the period July 1, 1976, through September 30, 1976. (1) prohibits or prevents, or attempts or threatens to prohibit or prevent, any officer or employee of the United States Postal Service from having any direct oral or written communication or contact with any Member or committee of Congress in connection with any matter pertaining to the employment of such officer or employee or pertaining to the United States Postal Service in any way, irrespective of whether such communication or contact is at the initiative of such officer or employee or in response to the request or inquiry of such Member or committee; or

(2) removes, suspends from duty without pay, demotes, reduces in rank, seniority, status, pay, or performance or efficiency rating, denies promotion to, relocates, reassigns, transfers, disciplines, or discriminates in regard to any employment right, entitlement, or benefit, or any term or condition of employment of, any officer or employee of the United States Postal Service, or attempts or threatens to commit any of the foregoing actions with respect to such officer or employee, by reason of any communication or contact of such officer or employee with any Member or committee of Congress as described in paragraph (1) of this subsection.

Sec. [608] 607. No part of any appropriation contained in this or any other Act, shall be available to finance interdepartmental boards, commissions, councils, committees, or similar groups under section 214 of the Independent Offices Appropriations Act, 1946 (31 U.S.C. 691) which do not have prior and specific congressional

approval of such method of financial support.

Sec. [609] 608. Appropriations available to any department or agency during the current fiscal year and the period July 1, 1976, through September 30, 1976, for necessary expenses, maintenance or operating expenses, shall also be available for payment to the General Services Administration for charges for space and services and those expenses of renovation and alteration of buildings and facilities which constitute public improvements, performed in accordance with the Public Buildings Act of 1959 (73 Stat. 749), the Public Buildings Amendments of 1972 (86 Stat. 216), or other applicable law

Sec. [610] 609. Funds made available by this or any other Act to the fund created by the Public Buildings Amendments of 1972 (86 Stat. 216), and the "Postal Service fund" (39 U.S.C. 2003), shall be available for employment of guards for all buildings and areas owned or occupied by the United States or the Postal Service and under the charge and control of the General Services Administration or the Postal Service, and such guards shall have, with respect to such property, the powers of special policemen provided by the first section of the Act of June 1, 1948 (62 Stat. 281; 40 U.S.C. 318), but shall not be restricted to certain Federal property as otherwise required by the proviso contained in said section, and, as to property owned or occupied by the Postal Service, the Postmaster General may take the same actions as the Administrator of General Services may take under the provisions of sections 2 and 3 of the Act of June 1, 1948 (62 Stat. 281; 40 U.S.C. 318a, 318b) attaching thereto penal section 4 of the Act of June 1, 1948 (62 Stat. 281; 40 U.S.C. 318c).

SEC. [611] 610. None of the funds available under this Act shall

be available for administrative expenses in connection with the transfer of any functions, personnel, facilities, equipment, or funds out of the United States Customs Service unless such transfers have been specifically authorized by the Congress.

Sec. [612] 611. None of the funds available under this Act shall be available for administrative expenses for the purpose of transferring the border control activities of the Bureau of Customs to any other agency of the Federal Government. (Treasury, Postal Service, and General Government Approprial in Act, 1975.)

No part of any appropriation contained in this Act or any other Act may be used to pay any expenses of any kind to send, ship, transmit, convey, or deliver any of the Presidential documents, written materials, or tape recordings of former President Richard M. Nixon from the custody of Federal officials or agencies now in possession of them until the passage by the Congress of legislation determining the disposition of said documents, written materials, and tape recordings: Provided, That this limitation shall expire on June 30, 1975: And provided further, That this limitation shall not prevent compliance with subpense duly issued by State or Federal Courts or by the United States House of Representatives or the United States Senate.]

[Sec. 204. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, appropriations provided in this or any other Act which would otherwise expire on June 30 of the calendar year 1976, or on such date of any subsequent calendar year, shall remain available until September

30 of each such calendar year.]

[Sec. 205. None of the funds appropriated by this or any other Act which are available during the fiscal year 1975 for travel expenses, including subsistence allowances, of Government officers and employees may be obligated after the date of the enactment of this Act, at a rate for the balance of the fiscal year which exceeds 90 percent of the budget estimates for fiscal year 1975 for such expenses which were submitted for appropriations or otherwise provided by law: Provided, That none of the limitations on travel included in the regular appropriations for fiscal Year 1975 shall be exceeded. (Supplemental Appropriations Act, 1975.)

TEXT OF THE LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT TO THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE

Dear Mr. Speaker: (Dear Mr. President:)

I transmit herewith for the consideration of the Congress draft legislation which would authorize annual appropriations for the White House Office, the Executive Residence, Special Assistance to the President (i.e., assistance provided to the President by the Vice President for Executive branch duties), the Domestic Council, and funds to meet unanticipated needs for personnel and administrative expenses.

The activities provided for in this bill have been funded over the years in annual appropriation acts but these acts have been delayed the past few years because some provisions were not authorized in permanent legislation. This bill was drafted to remedy that situation and I am now requesting that permanent authorizations be enacted to facilitate the appropriation process.

The bill sets upper limits on the pay level of senior staff assistants in each of the offices concerned and is consistent with the present levels approved by the Congress in annual appropriation acts. It also authorizes and sets pay limitations on consultants hired by these offices. In addition, travel and official entertainment expenses, which are appropriated annually, would be made subject to the authorization provided for in this bill.

The bill would not change the requirements for annual appropriations for each of the offices concerned. Budgets will continue to be submitted annually to the Congress and the Appropriations Committees will have an opportunity for complete review during their hearings.

I urge the Congress to act favorably on this proposal and trust that its enactment will expedite the appropriation process.

- "(a) Without regard to any other provision of law regulating employment and pay of persons in the Government service, the President is authorized to appoint and fix the pay of-
 - "(1) fourteen administrative and staff assistants in the White House Office at the rate of basic pay then currently in effect for Level II of the Executive Schedule of section 5313 of title 5, and such other administrative and staff assistants as may be necessary in the White House Office at rates less than the rate of basic pay then currently in effect for Level II of the Executive Schedule of section 5313 of title 5, and
 - "(2) assistants, clerical, and other personnel in the White House Office at respective rates not more than the maximum rate of basic pay then currently paid under the General Schedule of section 5332 of title 5

who shall perform such official duties as the President may prescribe.

- (b) The President is authorized to procure and provide within the White House Office services, as described in and in accordance with section 3109(b) of title 5, but at respective daily rates of pay for individuals not more than the daily equivalent of the rate of basic pay then currently in effect for Level II of the Executive Schedule of section 5313 of title 5.
- "(c) The President is authorized to provide for the procurement of goods and services (other than services authorized to be procured and provided under any other provision of this chapter) necessary in connection with the performance of his official duties (including, without regard to any other law, care, maintenance, repair and alteration, refurnishing, improvement, heating and

lighting including electrical fixtures, operation, and preservation of the Executive Residence, for which purposes the President may procure services as described in and in accordance with section 3109(b) of title 5).

- "(d) There are authorized to be appropriated each fiscal year and for the period July 1, 1976 through September 30, 1976--
 - "(1) to the President, when specified in regular appropriation acts, such sums as may be necessary to pay official reception, entertainment, and representation expenses, to be expended at the discretion of the President and accounted for solely on his certificate, and
 - "(2) such sums as may be necessary for allocation within the Executive Office of the President for official reception and representation expenses.
- "(e) Without regard to any other provision of law regulating employment and pay of persons in the Government service, there are authorized to be appropriated each fiscal year and for the period July 1, 1976 through September 30, 1976, such sums as may be necessary to enable the Vice President to provide assistance to the President in connection with the performance of functions specially assigned to the Vice President by the President in the discharge of Executive duties and responsibilities, including the use of such funds to—
 - "(1) establish the basic pay for one position at a rate not more than the rate of basic pay then currently in effect for Level II of the Executive Schedule of section 5313 of title 5, and such other administrative and staff assistants as may be necessary at rates less than the rate of basic pay then currently in effect for Level II of the Executive Schedule of section 5313 of title 5; and
 - "(2) procure and provide services as described in and in accordance with section 3109(b) of title 5, but at respective daily rates of pay for individuals not more than the daily equivalent of the rate of basic pay then currently in effect for Level II of the Executive Schedule of section 5313 of title 5."
- (b) The table of sections at the beginning of chapter 2 of title 3, United States Code, is amended by deleting--
- "105. Compensation of secretaries and executive, administrative, and staff assistants to President."

and inserting in place thereof --

"105. Assistance and services for President and Vice President."

Sec. 3. (a) Section 106 of title 5, United States Code, is amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 106. Assistance to President for unanticipated needs.

"There are authorized to be appropriated to the President each fiscal year and for the period July 1, 1976 through September 30, 1976, such sums as may be necessary to enable the President, in his discretion, without regard to any other provision of law regulating employment and pay of persons in the service of the Federal Government or regulating expenditures of Federal Government funds, to respond to and deal with unanticipated needs for furtherance of the national interest, security or defense, including personnel needs services as described in and in accordance with section 3109(b) of title 5, but at respective daily rates of pay for individuals not more than the daily equivalent of the rate of basic pay then currently in effect for Level II of the Executive Schedule of section 5313 of title 5; and administrative expenses related thereto."

(b) The table of sections at the beginning of chapter 2 of title 3, United States Code, is amended by deleting--

"106. Administrative assistants."

White House Authorization Bill

As we have discussed over the phone, we are nearing a critical point in obtaining a suitable White House Authorization Bill. Perhaps it would be helpful to you if I outlined the issues and our current position as well as possible action steps to bolster our position.

ISSUES

As you know, last year during the "get Nixon session" the issues concerning our authorization bill were as follows:

- A) The White House has grown too large.
- B) There are too many high level positions in the White House and men occupying these positions have usurped the power of the Cabinet Officers. Therefore, unconfirmed, arrogant, unknown men are running the Executive Branch.
- C) There is no congressional control over the operation and responsibilities of the President's office. Lack of control has led to many abuses of power.

Consequently, a bill was passed with these major provisions:

- 1) A limit on high level slots available to the President.
- 2) A provision that all employees in the White House would be classified and we would have to adhere to Civil Service regulations concerning hiring classifications, pay, promotion, and separation.



3) We would be required to report annually as to the operation of the White House, particularly job descriptions of each employee.

The net effect of last year's bill was to drastically limit the President's flexibility in staffing and organizing the White House Office. The concept of comity between the branches was completely kicked out the window. In short, we were subjected to legislative tyranny.

This year the attitude in the House is substantially better than last year, although Chairman Henderson is stuck with last years rhetoric and this years Freshmen class. The provisions of the bill as of today are essentially what we asked for and Henderson has been most cooperative in attempting to give the President flexibility in the conduct of his office. One obnoxious provision remains, however; namely, that the authorization will contain specific numbers of employees which the President can hire in all positions above a GS 15. The original intent was to make these numbers quite constricting, although I think we have been successful in negotiating added flexibility. The problem, however, is more in principle than in fact. It simply isn't right for the Congress to tell the President what he can and cannot have in the way of an office structure.

The Subcommittee considering our bill has its markup meeting tomorrow. Bob Linder and I intend to be present during the markup to answer technical questions. At this point John Martiny is concerned that Henderson will not be able to carry the bill as it stands through the Subcommittee and may be forced into tightening provisions.

THE NEXT STEPS

Rumsfeld called Derwinski a few days ago and Ed suggested the following:

- 1) That our bill would carry the Subcommittee either 7 to 3 or 6 to 4.
- 2) That the President should call the three or four top Democrats and Republicans on the whole Committee down to the White House and lay his concerns on the line before the bill is considered by the full Committee. Ed feels this is necessary if we are to counter Udall's objections in Committee.



In addition, you suggested that the President should bring this up before the bill reaches the floor with the Bipartisan Leaders and strongly request that the principle of comity be reinstated and that he be given the flexibility necessary for the conduct of his business. Finally, Timmons has suggested that you sit down with Rhodes, Michel and Derwinski to discuss how the whole matter should be handled. If I can help you I will be more than glad to. Let me know.

White House Budget

I understand the decision was recently made that the White House Budget will be presented by OMB as opposed to a White House top staffer. I think this decision should be reevaluated for the following reasons:

- (1) Chairman Steed of the House Appropriations Subcommittee on the White House Budget has indicated he will do everything to support our budget but is most anxious for a White House official to present it.
- (2) It seems to me we can get around the precedent-setting rationale by distinguishing between testimony on a substantive issue as opposed to this, which is administrative in nature.
- (3) It would continue to demonstrate the President's willingness to have an "open" White House.
- (4) The President himself testified before the House Judiciary Committee with respect to the Nixon pardon thereby setting a very open and candid tone for the White House. It would be easier to volunteer than to run the risk of being subpoensed (which is not entirely out of the question).

The House Subcommittee on Treasury, Postal Service, and General Government has marked up and reported the White House appropriation bill. The bill is now scheduled to be considered by the full House Appropriations Committee on May 24, 1976. It is anticipated that the bill will come before the House of Representatives on June 15, 1976.
