I am writing to urge your consideration of a proposal you have received from the City of Pontiac, Michigan for assistance in building a downtown public parking garage -- a project which would help revitalize the community's long-suffering central business district.

Like many urban areas, Pontiac has experienced a loss of business in the downtown area and a general economic downturn in recent years despite the community's active efforts to reverse the trend.

Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital, a large downtown employer, is now weighing the option of expanding on its present site or relocating away from the downtown area. One of the problems at the present location is lack of adequate parking for the hospital's more than 800 employees, 122 physicians, and 1,400 daily visitors. The proposed \$4 million addition would, of course, increase the size of the staff, patient load and the parking problem. Another large, nearby downtown office building is suffering from only 40 percent occupancy because of a shortage of parking.

In an effort to remedy this situation and protect the jobs which would be lost should the hospital leave the city, Pontiac is proposing to donate the land and pay a portion of the cost of the proposed parking structure adjacent to the hospital.

Because of the seriousness of the situation in the downtown area and because I believe this is the sort of local initiative which

On November 26, 1974, at the request of Rep. Tim Lee Carter, I attended a meeting concerning the reductions at Blue Grass Army Depot, Lexington, Kentucky.

The meeting was basically a demonstration of concern by local political and business leaders of the Lexington, Kentucky area. Members of the Kentucky Congressional Delegation in attendance were Senator Dee Huddleston, Rep. Carl Perkins and Rep. Tim Lee Carter. Interestingly, the member, where district was most adversely affected, Rep. John Breckinridge, did not attend and was not represented by staff.

Rep. Perkins read a telegram he had sent to the President requesting that the decision to reduce Blue Grass be rescinded. Perkins also charged that the decision to reduce Blue Grass Depot was "arbitrary and politically motivated" and that he wanted to see the President personally about the base as soon as possible.

Doc Carter stated that he had been misled by Army Sec. Calloway about the Army's plans for Blue Grass Depot. Privately, however, Doc Carter is not pressing for a meeting with the President.

THE STRANGE FORD ADMINISTRATION

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- Strange indeed are the ways of the new Ford Administration. I have been reluctant to publicly criticize our new President while he is trying to get the new Administration off the ground, but it becomes increasingly difficult not to do so.

In the very short time he has been in office, a little more than four months, the President has succeeded in alienating almost every segment of the American public to some degree. His popularity has been flying like a rock, and no wonder.

One of the first things President Ford did was to propose conditional amnesty for draft dodgers and deserters. The program has not been a success as less than five percent of the eligible deserters and draft dodgers have taken advantage of President Ford's offer. The President only succeeded in making both sides of the issue angry. Those who fought and defended this country and believed in its laws were shocked at the clemency proposal and those who wanted complete and unconditional amnesty started crying even louder for complete and unconditional forgiveness.

But, the President did succeed in giving complete amnesty from prosecution to former President Nixon. Ford's pardon of Nixon irked many segments of the population, from the far left to the far right, from the Nixon haters to the "no man is above the law" crowd.

If the Nixon pardon wasn't enough to rile the public, the Administration proposed a 10 to 20 cents a gallon gasoline tax, then beat a hasty retreat in the face of public anger. Next, in his WIN message to the Congress and to the country the President proposed a five percent surtax. This came just 30 days before the elections when it had no chance of passing. As a matter of fact, it backfired. The last thing the working people of this country need or want is more taxes.

In his WIN speech the President also succeeded in stepping on the toes of the farmers in Alabama's Second District by proposing that the peanut program be eliminated.

Those Republicans who were elected or re-elected were successful not because of the Ford Administration, but in spite of it.

In a series of unwise moves the President vetoed a number of important bills passed by the Congress. In turn, the House and Senate promptly overrode the President's vetoes. There was the Railroad Retirement Act which was overriden in the House by a vote of 368 to 12 and 71 to one in the Senate. The Rehabilitation Act, which extended Federal vocational rehabilitation programs, veto was overriden in the House 398 to seven and 90 to one in the Senate. The Freedom of Information Act veto was overriden 371 to 31 in the House and 65 to 27 in the Senate. Both the House and Senate will probably override the President's recent veto of the Veterans Education Benefits by large margins. By contrast, President Nixon vetoed only 12 bills in this Congress and had only one overriden, the War Powers Bill.

Now, the President is proposing a public employment program which will cost billions of dollars. At the same time, the Administration has announced cutbacks of 11,500 military and 11,600 military related civilian jobs. Cutbacks in defense personnel can only worsen the unemployment problem, not alleviate it.

It is very difficult to understand what has happened and is happening at the White House. Gerald Ford does not sound like the sensible Representative who left the House such a short time ago. Perhaps, he has a dozen or so of the Mad Hatters of the Alice in Wonderland type running around giving him advice. Certainly, as Alice said, "things get curiouser and curiouser."



Dear Mr. Secretary:

May I bring to your attention a memorandum dated November 8 directed to me from Nathaniel Reed, Assistant Secretary for Fish and Wildlife and Parks which in effect restricts certain areas of the beach along Cape Hatteras National Seashore Park from use by commercial fishermen. The area in question extends from Access Ramp No. 22 South and Southwest to Access Ramp No. 30 which is the prime commercial fishing area of the Outer Banks and makes it available only for the exclusive use of sport fishermen from October 1 to April 30. The effective date of this memorandum is December 1, 1974.

You are no doubt aware that a Blue Ribbon Committee, appointed by you and chaired by Dr. Thomas Linton, Director, Marine Affairs Office, N. C. Department of Natural and Economic Resources, has met on numerous occasions in an effort to evaluate and to formulate new policy designed to resolve any inequities which might have existed in the past or may exist in the future between commercial and sport fishermen. Recommendations have been made by the committee, including the more popular proposal that we continue with existing policy for another year during which time problems relating to commercial and sport fishermen could be closely monitored.

The right of commercial fishermen along the Outer Banks to fish along Park Service property was guaranteed in the original authorization of the Cape Hatteras National Seashore Park.

Mr. Reed states on Page 2 of his letter that "it would strain one's credulity to read into legislative intent that this protection was meant to restrict legitimate uses of the seashore by park visitors." I respectfully suggest that it would strain one's "credulity" to suggest that a legitimate use of the seashore by park visitors could include a restriction which prohibits commercial fishermen from sharing beach fishing rights with those visitors. The record shows that alleged confrontations by New Jersey sport fishermen have been fabricated with half truths and in many cases with no basis whatsoever. It is difficult for me to understand why the only allegations against commercial fishermen have been made by New Jersey citizens with over one and one-half million tourists visiting the Outer Banks each year.

Mr. Secretary, the commercial fishermen along the Outer Banks are aware of the proposed restricted area which will be posted on December 1, 1974. I am informed by responsible citizens of the Buxton area that these commercial fishermen expect to preserve their right to utilize not only the proposed restricted area but the entire beach presently under the jurisdiction of the Park Service to the extent of arming themselves with firearms. We might expect on this occasion not only a confrontation by bloodshed if need be. I realize that this is not the proper manner in which this should be handled; however, I will have no control over extremely high-tempered commercial fishermen who feel that their right to earn a living has been restricted by an all-too-powerful National Government.

In the event your department places into effect proposed restrictions the Dare County Board of Commissioners, hopefully in an effort to avoid such a confrontation, will request the Federal Courts to place your Park Superintendent, Mr. Jim Dunning, under a restraining order after which this matter will be brought into the Federal Courts for further litigation. I cannot overemphasize the importance and the urgency of the proposed restrictions being withdrawn immediately.

Subject: Regulating sport and commercial fishing at Cape Hatteras

National Seashore

I have reviewed the comments solicited at public hearings by the Ad Hoc Committee on June 25, 26 and July 22, the draft proposal submitted by the Ad Hoc Committee dated September 30, 1974, a recommendation from our Southeast Regional Office, and correspondence from individuals. In addition, I have reviewed the enabling legislation and our experience with the current regulations since their enactment.

On the basis of this review and consultation, I am recommending that we reserve a zone for the exclusive use of sport fishing. This zone is located near the Cape Hatteras Lighthouse, and is adjacent to one of the most active visitor use areas in the seashore. It is proposed that an area commencing at Access Ramp No. 22 and running south and west along the shore and including Cape Point to Access Ramp No. 30 be reserved for the exclusive use of sport fishing. This means that commercial fishermen will not be permitted to haul their nets upon the beach in this area from October 1 to April 30. The effective date for this year will be from December 1, 1974, to April 30, 1975.

The existing regulations permit commercial and sport fishermen to compete for fish on a first-come first-served basis on the same portion of beach. The effect of such an arrangement has not been conducive to the elimination of confrontation. In fact, the National Park Service has been placed in the position of referee in what can only be described as a no-win situation for both the users and the administrators. This proposal puts the park officials into the position of enforcing a precise regulation over a readily definable





area. We believe that it is equitable since the balance of the seashore will be managed on a first-come first-served basis. Historically, this has proved to be advantageous to the commercial fishermen.

Even though the enabling legislation sought by compromise language to protect the livelihood of those residents of the Outer Banks villages listed in the Act of August 17, 1937 (50 Stat. 669), it would strain one's credulity to read into legislative intent that this protection was meant to restrict legitimate uses of the seashore by park visitors.

It is hoped that the spirit of the legislation, that of protecting a way of life for the Outer Banks inhabitants, will not be abused by those seeking to use this element of the act solely for commercial gain.

We believe that this proposal addresses itself to each of these issues and I recommend your concurrence. With your concurrence, we will have these revisions inserted in the Federal Register.
