1. Chairman Staggers was calling to enlist Presidential support for objectionable Committee bill which has since been reported out of full Committee by voice vote.
2. Chairman Staggers' bill would shift the burden of railroad retirement financing to the general Treasury, costing \$390 million the first year, and rising to \$4.5 billion over 20 years.
3. House Republicans believe the Democratic Leadership will press for early action after the recess but Republicans hope to delay Floor consideration until near adjournment and force Staggers to accept a simple, one-year extension of the present law.

TALKING POINTS:

1. Harley, I am sorry I missed your call and understand you have now reported the Committee bill.
2. I am aware of the serious deficit situation in the Railroad Retirement system, but cannot support the Federal subsidy because of our serious inflation problems.
3. I would prefer a one-year extension of the existing structure, without dipping into appropriated public funds.
4. Harley, I hope we can work together to keep spending down and bring this inflation under control.

3. Melcher was concerned the President was not aware of the support by land grant colleges and veterinarian-related lobbies for the bill.
4. Staff explained that the President was taking all views into consideration before making a decision.

TALKING POINTS:

1. John, I know you were a sponsor of this bill, and believed it should be signed.
2. There are many good programs that would be desirable if we did not have inflationary pressures to worry about.
3. My veto was based on the duplication and overlapping resulting from another expensive (\$47 million) categorical program.
4. I hope you will help me in this fight against inflation, and your indication that no override attempt will be made is genuinely appreciated.

3. Awaiting action when the Committee reconvenes Tuesday are world-wide military assistance and military credit sales. The request on military assistance is \$985 million and attempts are anticipated to cut it to \$550 million. We requested \$555 million on military credit sales and there will be efforts to cut back to \$350 million.

TALKING POINTS:

1. "Doc," I am worried about the deep cuts being made in the Foreign Aid Authorization.
2. We are dedicated to reducing spending, but cuts in economic and military assistance in certain areas could lead to heavier commitments later on.
3. If Hanoi mis-read a signal from the House, it could lead to tragic consequences.
4. I hope you will lend your support to holding any reductions to a minimum.

2. I recognize the motivations behind those who want to insist on a cut-off of foreign assistance to Turkey, but their position is most irresponsible at this time and will undercut negotiations with both sides over resolution of the Cyprus question.
3. We were defeated when the issue was before the House originally but I trust you can continue to support our efforts to hold the Continuing Resolution.

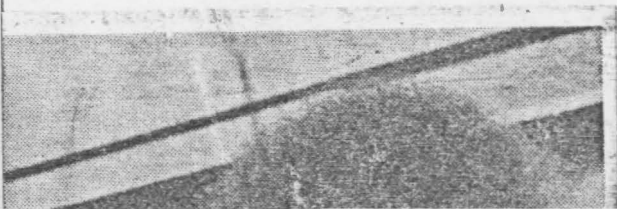

- BACKGROUND:
1. Joe Waggonner, Jr. was born on September 7, 1918 near Plain Dealing, Louisiana.
 2. In view of the pending Yom Kippur Congressional recess beginning September 12, Mr. Waggonner has decided not to return to Louisiana this weekend and, therefore, will be celebrating his birthday in Washington without his family.
 3. In addition to Mr. Waggonner's continuous support for your legislative programs, he has recently contacted the White House concerning two items which are of personal importance to him.
 - A. He has been interested in seeing that appropriate funds be made available for the construction of a proposed Louisiana toll road connecting Shreveport and New Orleans. Under President Nixon the Department of Transportation strongly indicated the Administration's desire to accommodate the State of Louisiana with proportionate Federal financing for this project.

STATUS: Jim Cannon is presently working to resolve the problem.



- B. Recently the Congressman submitted a request to the White House asking that you appear at the Louisiana State Fair in Shreveport, Louisiana. This State Fair opens October 17, and Mr. Waggonner has indicated there will be approximately 100,000 people in attendance.

STATUS: Initially this request was rejected since you have personally visited the State of Louisiana within the last six months. However, pursuant to the Congressman's desire that you be the first President to visit Shreveport, Louisiana, rather than the already frequented City of New Orleans, his request is presently being reconsidered by the White House scheduling office.

Mr. Waggonner has indicated that if you are unable to appear at the Louisiana State Fair in October, he is most hopeful that you can visit Shreveport during the spring of 1976.
