ECONOMY/ENERGY

1. Mr. Speaker, I have reached a number of decisions regarding the economy and energy. I will be presenting these to Congress soon in my State of the Union Message.
2. Basically, my economic decisions involve recommendations for a tax cut and no new spending requests.
3. In energy, we will implement by administrative action, a \$3.00 phased per barrell import tariff staring February 1.
4. We will also request a number of legislative proposals in energy, including an excise tax, decontrols, windfall profits tax, deregulation, coal conversion and production from Elk Hills.

SHORT TERM PROGRAM (now-1977)

Immediate, Administrative Actions

1. Mr Speaker, as you know we have appointed a commission under the chairmanship of the Vice President to investigate charges of domestic spying by the CIA.
2. Meetings are already underway by the commission, and I have instructed the Vice President to move vigorously.
3. Congress is also moving rapidly with hearings scheduled next week by two Senate Committees. The Congress has a responsibility and I am pleased they are active in this area.
4. However, at least eight separate Committees of the House and Senate are in various stages of planning hearings.
5. If some of these could be consolidated, perhaps joint House and Senate hearings, it might expedite the resolution of the problem. What do you think?

LEVI AND LYNN NOMINATIONS

1. FBI checks are complete on Ed Levi for Attorney General and I expect to move the nomination to the Hill early next week.
2. I have also selected Jim Lynn to be Director of the Office of Management and Budget, and will send his nomination up next week.
3. Both of these positions are extremely important and I would appreciate any support you might give for early hearings and confirmation.


John Gingles of my staff has spoken to Nancy in your office on this, and could provide you with any additional details.

The President at the request of Rep. Tip O'Neill and Rep. Silvio Conte, met with Mr. Forrest Beckett of Youngstown, Ohio.

After introductions the participants stood with the President and pictures were taken while engaging in light conversation and Rep. O'Neill presented the President with a small ceramic elephant and a gift of ties. The President then invited the participants to sit down near the fireplace in the Oval Office.

The President opened the conversation by telling Mr. Beckett that he recalled meeting him through Rep. Frank Bow in the past. Mr. Beckett thereupon stated that he wanted to bring some important matters to the attention of the President which are summarized as follows:

- (1) Mr. Beckett stated that FAA under the control and leadership of Mr. Butterfield was creating havoc with the aviation industry, that his administration was creating separate state programs and this could not be because aviation is a national undertaking, and that Mr. Butterfield had to be replaced.
- (2) Mr. Beckett further stated that the administration of FAA by Mr. Butterfield was adding to the energy crisis because of actions of air controllers and others in protest to FAA and Butterfield administration.
- (3) In response to the President's question on whom Mr. Beckett would recommend for the FAA post, Mr. Beckett offered the names of John Baker a former Deputy Administrator of FAA and a John Shaffer.
- (4) Mr. Beckett concluded his comments by stating that he would be pleased to give the President his views on the matter because the FAA was determined to put his company, Beckett Aviation Corp. of Youngstown, Ohio, out of business but wanted to know how he could get past the palace guard to the President to submit his views and names of potential FAA Administrators.

The President kept control of the conversation and made the following points:

- (1) Recognized that some change in the management was necessary at FAA but it needed some strong management and not some one in the spot for on the job training.
- (2) Asked Rep. Silvio Conte his feelings on FAA and Conte responded by stating that FAA does need a change in management; Butterfield is part of the old team and has never been able to get a hold of the situation at FAA.
- (3) The President stated very clearly that while he recognized the management problem at FAA he would make no commitment on the names suggested by Mr. Beckett and mentioned that he reached his conclusions on the management of FAA not on any political considerations or involvements of Butterfield but on the basis of a committee report on FAA from the House Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries.
- (4) The President then stated he would be pleased to look at the suggestions of Mr. Beckett and that he could submit them through Don Rumsfeld, Jack Marsh, Max Friedersdorf or Rep. Conte or O'Neill.

Thereafter the group rose and while standing by the President's desk received gifts of cuff links from the President, At this point, Rep. O'Neill mentioned golfing dates the President had committed. Discussion then centered on the President's ability to keep the golfing commitments. Mr. O'Neill mentioned that somebody from the White House called Mr. O'Neill to make arrangements for the President in the Doral golfing trip which he refused to do.

The meeting concluded by the President asking O'Neill and Conte their plans for the Lincoln Day Recess.
