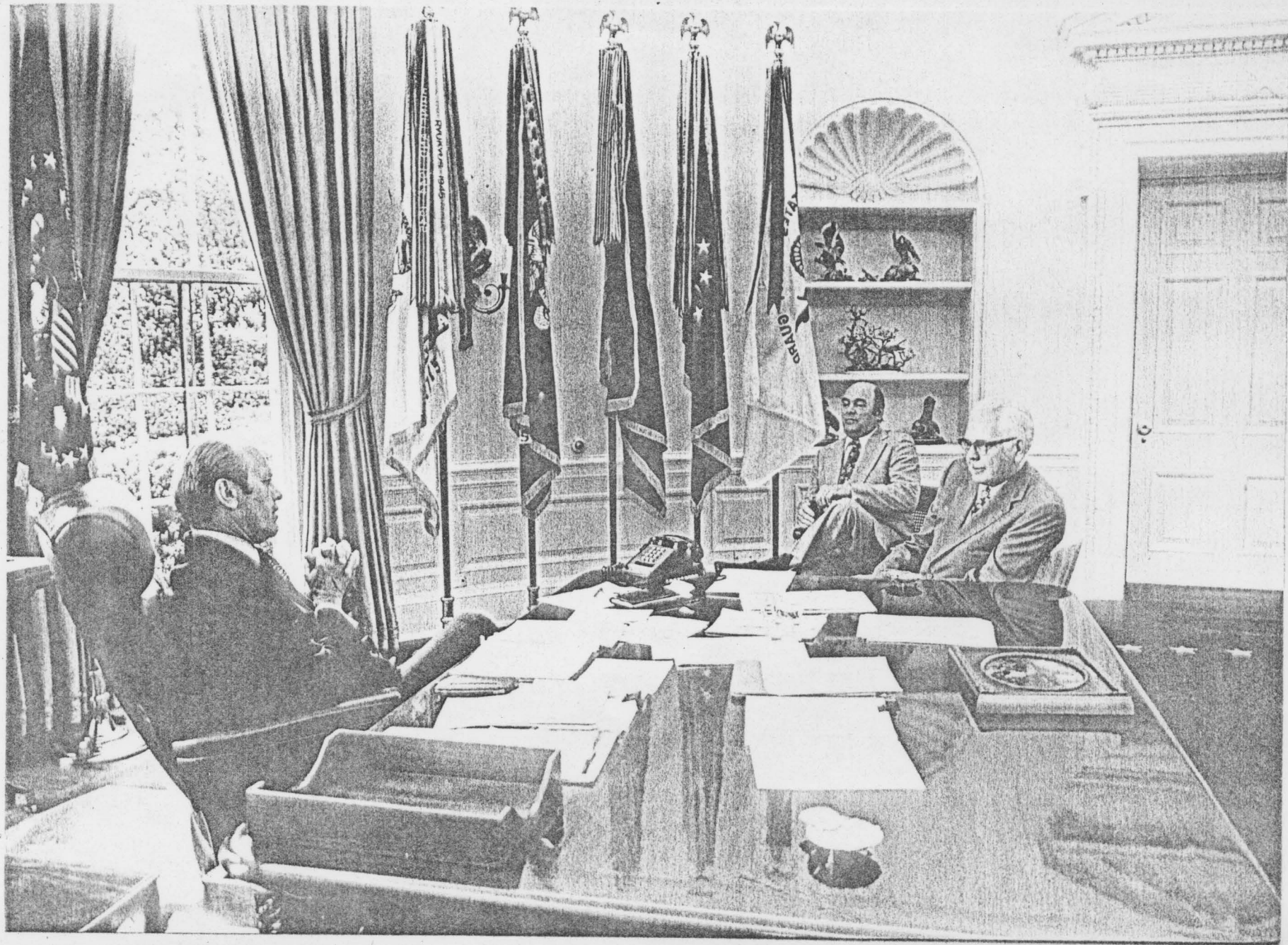

During the President's visit to Louisville on October 19th, Rep. Snyder mentioned to the President that he had a military case which was extremely important to him in both a personal and political basis.

Snyder's neighbor, Lt. Col. Jack W. Cook, U.S. Air Force, 432-40-8813, is currently assigned as Professor of Military Science, University of Louisville. Lt. Col. Cook is on orders to report to Columbus, Ohio on October 30, 1974 but has applied to be stationed as Commanding Officer of the Recruiting Detachment in Louisville which covers Southern Indiana and Northern Kentucky. Rep. Gene Snyder reported that Lt. Col. Cook was in line for this assignment until the commander of the Air Force Recruiting Command, Major General B. L. Davis became aware of Congressional interest in Cook's behalf.

Rep. Snyder requested that we do all possible to see that Lt. Col. Cook remains in Louisville. Could our Military Aide's office review the case to see if this can be accomplished?

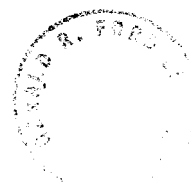

Dear Mr. Acree:

During the approximately nine months I have been with the Immigration and Naturalization Service, I have had the opportunity to make a thorough assessment of the staggering workloads and the inadequate resources of this agency. Unlike some Federal agencies, I&NS has been unable to obtain any substantial augmentation of its resources in recent years given the intense competition for limited Federal law enforcement funds. In spite of our resource problems, the illegal alien threat has been growing dramatically each year. Last year I&NS apprehended nearly 800,000 illegal aliens.

Because of our resource situation and because of the steadily growing workload facing I&NS, this agency is now in the position of not being able to adequately administer all of its responsibilities. For this reason, I have decided to prioritize every major program in which I&NS is engaged and to commit this Service to performing certain high priority aspects of our mission effectively at the expense of lower priority programs.

My first priority is to improve and strengthen the immigration enforcement capabilities on the Southwest land border where the threat of illegal entry is greatest. Accordingly, I have decided to redeploy a substantial number of immigration inspector positions from the Northern to the Southwest land border ports.

Between 100-150 positions will be transferred this fiscal year from the Northern land border to the Southwest land border. These positions will be committed to primary inspection duties in pedestrian and vehicular lanes at ports-of-entry on the Mexican border. This redeployment will continue until we achieve a fifty percent I&NS primary inspection presence at Southwest land border ports-of-entry. The first ports to receive the additional manpower will be San Ysidro and Calexico, California.



I fully realize that my decision will have an impact on the U.S. Customs Service and its deployment of manpower. Consequently, I have directed all I&NS Regional Commissioners, District Directors and Officers-in-Charge to work closely with your supervisors and port managers to insure that the augmentation of I&NS forces on the Mexican border is accomplished smoothly and without serious dislocation or disruption of the U.S. Customs Service in the performance of its mission.


It is also my intention to withdraw our immigration presence from the following twenty-two Northern land border ports-of-entry and to allow the U.S. Customs Service to inspect on our behalf:

However, if the U.S. Customs Service would prefer, we would be willing to mutually agree to close these ports-of-entry. If not, you should be informed of my intention to withdraw I&NS presence over the next 18-24 months. If these ports remain open, I&NS will resume its presence at a future date when adequate resources are made available to this Service.

I regret any inconvenience this decision might cause the U.S. Customs Service. I also regret the necessity to reduce the I&NS presence on the Northern border, but my decision will be implemented by I&NS and remain in force until this agency receives adequate funds to sufficiently staff all ports-of-entry.

We received a call yesterday from Delegate Won Pat regarding an invitation that was extended to the President to attend a Bicentennial Celebration in Guam on March 1st.

According to your office, the invitation has not been accepted and no answer given to the party that extended the invitation to the President.

Delegate Won Pat's office said that they know and have talked to Philip Habib, Assistant Secretary of State for East Asian and Pacific Affairs, who is familiar with Guam and its customs, and has advised that he would be favorable to attending the Bicentennial on behalf of the President.

We advised Delegate Won Pat's office that we would pass this information on to you.


