



I am sure you are familiar with the work and ministry of The Brotherhood of St. Andrew. At the recent National Council Meeting of The Brotherhood held in Little Rock, Arkansas on February 14 - 17, 1975, the National Council unanimously voted to elect President Gerald Ford as an honorary member.

The constitution and by-laws of The Brotherhood state "an honorary member is one who because of high eminence in The Church, or outstanding leadership in Brotherhood work at home or abroad is deemed worthy of the highest honor The Brotherhood can bestow. An unanimous vote of the National Council, in meeting assembled, or of the National Convention will alone create such membership. Honorary members may by their own decision remain or become active members by the payment of annual dues. They will always be entitled to the floor at any Brotherhood meeting but not to vote unless otherwise qualified for the particular type of meeting attended."



BRIEF SYNOPSIS

THE BROTHERHOOD OF ST. ANDREW

The Brotherhood of St. Andrew is an association of organized groups of men and boys within the Church who have banded themselves together on the basis of the three Brotherhood Rules, and who desire to continue to grow spiritually, to have fellowship with, and seek help from, one another as they face unitedly the urgency to "spread Christ's Kingdom among men, especially young men." The Brotherhood was established in 1883 and was incorporated by an act of Congress as a national men's organization under a charter signed by President Theodore Roosevelt on May 30, 1908.

From its beginning the work of The Brotherhood has been in, with and for the Church. Brotherhood chapters and members have been in practically every diocese and missionary district in the United States, as well as in Canada, the British Isles, West Indies, Central America, Brazil, New Zealand, Australia, China and Japan.

The Brotherhood of St. Andrew functions in Chapters at the parish or mission level, in Assemblies at the diocesan or area level, and as a national organization but stresses the one-by-one and two-by-two method, the method of personal contact. The program of work is determined by the needs of their parish or mission and the direction of their clergy.

The three Rules bring the Brotherhood ideal down to the level of the individual member's life by guiding him into the practice of daily prayer, regular study and using his personal influence wherever he can in leading other men and boys nearer to Christ through the Church.

The Rule of Prayer is to pray daily for the spread of Christ's Kingdom, especially among men and boys, and for God's blessing upon the labors of The Brotherhood.

The Rule of Study is to study the Holy Scriptures regularly and the teachings of The Church to attain a better understanding of how to follow Christ and bring others into His Kingdom.

The Rule of Service is to make continuous efforts, week by week, to bring others nearer to Christ through His Church.

The Brotherhood does not exist to propagate itself as an organization, but rather to revitalize the spiritual life of the laity of the whole Church and arouse and mobilize them to greater personal effort for Christ and His Kingdom. The Brotherhood of St. Andrew affords an opportunity for those who recognize their obligation to stand together in a national organization in order that they more effectively lead other laymen to a similar acceptance of the Church's call to active service.

SIXTIETH CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA:  
AT THE FIRST SESSION,

Begun and held at the City of Washington on Monday, the second day of December, one thousand nine hundred and seven.

AN ACT  
For the incorporation of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That James L. Houghteling of Winnteka, Illinois; and other members in good standing of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew at the time when this Act takes effect, and those thereafter associated with them and their successors, be, and they are hereby, incorporated and made a body politic and corporate of the District of Columbia under the name of "The Brotherhood of Saint Andrew". And by that name they and their successors may have perpetual succession, may use a common seal, and alter the same at pleasure, and elect officers and agents, and may do business and take, receive, hold, and convey real and personal estate necessary for the purposes of the society.

SEC. 2. That the sole object of said corporation shall be the spread of Christ's Kingdom among men. And, in pursuance of said object, it may have a constitution, by-laws, rules, and regulations to carry out the same, and shall have power to change and amend its constitution, by-laws, rules, and regulations at pleasure: Provided, that said constitution, by-laws, rules, and regulations, or amendments thereof, do not conflict with the laws of the United States or of any State.

SEC. 3. That said corporation shall have the right to hold its meetings and meetings of its council at any place within the United States as may be best suited or most advantageous to the carrying out of the purposes for which this corporation is formed.

SEC. 4. That this Act shall take effect and said corporation be established when this Act shall have been accepted by vote of the Brotherhood of Saint Andrew at any of its annual conventions held within three years from Nov. thirtieth, nineteen hundred and seven, and a copy of such vote attested by the secretary of said convention and filed in the office of the recorder of deeds of the District of Columbia shall be sufficient evidence of such acceptance. The officers of the corporation shall be elected and its constitution and by-laws adopted at the annual convention of the Brotherhood of Saint Andrew at which this Act is accepted, acting in accordance with the constitution of said Brotherhood as it then exists.

SEC. 5. That Congress may at any time amend, alter, or repeal this Act.

## *a day in Washington*

### **introduced to President I**

It takes awhile to return to have shaken hands with the United States. Especially, when you realize that this kind of thing just doesn't happen. It is hard to describe your feelings when you see "The President's Schedule" for the day and note, "10.40 (5 minutes)—Congressman Tennyson Guyer and Church of God ministers—The Rose Garden."

The President was introduced by Congressman Guyer. While the President was a member of Congress and Minority Leader of The House of Representatives, the Representative from the Fifth District of Michigan and the Fourth District of Ohio were fellow Congressmen—and that was not very long ago.

We were Churches of God ministers—a tour group of forty-six, sponsored by the Harrisburg Area Churches of God Ministerium, visiting Washington on April 17. The President has a son in seminary, Michael Ford, a student at Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary at South Hamilton, Massachusetts.

It was just a few minutes—but what minutes! Unaffected, genuine, very much for real, stepping out of the Oval Office where he was in conference with Mr. Ronald Nessen, Mr. Donald Rumsfeld, and others, one had the feeling that for the few minutes he was with us, the President was the same Mr. Ford as in the Oval Office with Secretary Henry A. Kissinger earlier in the morning and Dr. Arthur F. Burns a little later.

What does one say to the President of the United States when you have the privilege of shaking his hand? No words quite seem appropriate. I simply said, "God bless you." Trite perhaps, but I meant it and hopefully was being myself.

the meeting room of the House Administration Committee at the Capitol, listening as Congressman Guyer shared with us, one was moved to thank God that in Congressman Guyer and many, many of his colleagues in the House and Senate, we have dedicated, hard working persons who have the best interests of the country at heart, are conscientiously doing the best job they know how. They are not always right. As with everyone of us, in retrospect they would do some things differently if there was a second chance, but from day to day they are endeavoring to give a good account of themselves.

Representative Guyer is a member of the House Committee on Veterans Affairs and the very important House Committee on International Relations. The latter committee was then considering urgent legislation relative to Vietnam, and the day we were there approved \$327 million for humanitarian aid.

The business of government is highly complicated and with so much legislation to consider, so many pressing issues, so many demands, it is difficult to be well informed on every issue and even with the best of knowledge it is difficult to make a decision where neither alternative is a happy one.

How frequently we malign our public servants, label all of them with the bad image for which only a relatively few are responsible. It is amazing, indeed almost miraculous, that we have the dedicated public servants we do. Sometimes, one feels that we get better government than we deserve.

Perhaps there is nothing more appropriate to say than "God bless you!" —JP



## 1. HELP FRANCE LEAD EUROPE

By almost every test France is the most logical political leader of western Europe.

It alone holds promise of bringing about a truly united Europe. The leadership role really has nowhere else to go. If France fails to grasp it, western Europe (and NATO) will become weaker and more vulnerable.

Therefore, the U.S. should take steps to promote French leadership. This is particularly important because of the urgent need to strengthen the domestic political base of France's excellent new President, M. Giscard-d'Estaing.

First and most important, the U.S. should extend to France the same "special relationship" in regard to sharing of nuclear information that it has long accorded to Britain.

U.S. policy for years in effect has treated France as untrustworthy. I first detected deep French resentment over this issue as chairman of the mission to Paris you authorized in 1965. The resentment still persists and, I think, accounts in great measure for the French actions which occasionally frustrate our objectives.

Last week, the French deputy foreign minister, M. Destremau, told me privately the U.S. could have saved France great sums in the past just by guiding it away from unproductive nuclear research. He said he was sure a change in U.S. policy now would cause France to sign the non-proliferation treaty. The McMahon Act is sufficiently broad for you to make the change.

The U.S. should seek additional ways to enhance French leadership. We should look to France for guidance on broad policies involving western Europe and should override French wishes only on matters of fundamental importance.

Conversations with German leaders last week, including Franz Josef Strauss, convinced me that Germany recognizes the necessity of French leadership.

The British referendum on the European Community will probably be favorable but, in or out, Britain will not be a force for the political federation of Europe.

## 2. REINVIGORATE ATLANTIC RELATIONS

European confidence in the U.S. needs to be strengthened, the disintegration of NATO reversed, and the risks implicit in MBFR overcome.

Specifically, propose privately in connection with the upcoming NATO summit that the allies negotiate a five-year compact consisting of these essentials:

1. An agreement on minimum force levels which each nation will keep available for alliance purposes.
2. An agreement on a modernization program in which the alliance will phase out obsolete doctrines and technology and phase in a defense based substantially on the new generation of "smart" conventional weapons. These weapons can enhance defense at less cost and manpower. Part of the U.S. responsibility will be to modernize (and thus make more credible) our nuclear commitment, a task long overdue.
3. An agreement on NATO financial arrangements for the entire five-year term--a step which will take out of annual contention the questions of offset-purchases and burden-sharing.
4. The organization of an Atlantic convention whose delegates will plan the next stage of alliance development, hopefully one that will establish federal institutional forms through which unified policy on monetary, trade, and external questions can be achieved.

Once the details of the five-year compact are settled, they could be announced at a NATO heads-of-government summit.

A Trans-Atlantic Year of this dimension could brighten an otherwise somber calendar and make 1975 memorable as the time when a giant stride was taken in our long quest for a society in which our cherished liberties are safe indeed.

### 3. ANNOUNCE A PLAN TO PREVENT FAMINE

Propose a large scale extension to food-deficit countries of our land-grant university system of educating farmers--a system which has worked wonders in improving U.S. food production.

Specifically, ask Congress to give to U.S. land-grant universities the authority and funds under long-term contracts to help developing nations build in the next decade a minimum of fifty new land-grant-type institutions. Our universities have the competence and zeal to do the job, and do it well.

The proposal is high-benefit. Based on our 110-year experience with land-grant and India's fifteen-year experience, it will prevent famine. There is no doubt about it.

It is low-cost. The ten-year U.S. cost need not exceed \$1.5 billion dollars and could be less.

It could be added to existing foreign aid programs, but my suggestion is that it replace some of them.

It has a ready-made and powerful political constituency. First and foremost, the millions of citizens who believe that education is a good investment. Second, the sixty-nine land-grant universities themselves. Third, the millions of citizens (farmers and otherwise) who have attended land-grant universities and/or benefitted from land-grant extension. Fourth, the Farm Bureau and other influential organizations which have cultivated close alliances with land-grant institutions over the years. Over one hundred Members of Congress in both Houses have already co-sponsored H.R. 2436, which embodies this idea.



Congratulations on your victory again. It is disappointing that we over on this side of the state can't express our appreciation to you by our election day response. Maybe some day you will determine to change that.




We would like you to be there, as before, and if you were not in Washington D.C. at that time we could pick you up and fly you in for the event.

The two qualities needed to win in hydroplane racing are guts and brains. Fortunately, they do not have to be found in the same person.

"I wouldn't drive one of those things," said Jim Lucero, who has watched hydroplanes since his boyhood in Seattle, that hotbed of thunderboating where 700,000 people (an outdoor sports record) once gathered to watch a single race.


When Lucero was 13 years old and impressionable, the great, daring driver Bill Muncey, holder of almost all unlimited records, came to Seattle in 1958 and added another mark to his collection.

He became the first man to sink a U.S. Coast Guard vessel since the Spanish American War. His boat's steering mechanism failed at 100 miles per hour. The Coast Guard ship sank in 11 seconds.

For years after—until 1972—Muncey remained the king of hydroplaning. Now he has not won a race in two years, although his boat is going faster than ever.

As much as any one man, Lucero has been the usurper, the man who has put the Pay 'N Pak team on top where one man, Muncey, once stood.

owner of Muncey's Atlas Van Lines boat, calls Pay 'N Pak "the boat to beat now." He does not attribute Pay 'N Pak's 1973 national championship (or its victory yesterday in the President's Cup) to money or a great driver, luck or even a revolutionary design. "They're got a hell of a good crew" is his summation.

Lucero, who started working with hydros nine years ago as "a parts washer and general flunky," is the chief of that crew, one of the

brains in a sport built on guts.

For nearly a decade, Lucero has spent his youth gypsying around the country in trucks and vans, and squatting on the decks of boats in drydock for days at a time.

A racing freak and mechanic since he was old enough to spell "hydroplane," Lucero studied engineering at the University of Washington. Now, at 29, his ideas are helping to drive hydroplaning out of a 10-year-long period of engineering stagnation.

Lucero and a friend decided that perhaps racing boats, instead of increasing weight and horsepower, should go the other way, toward lighter hulls and (hereby) weaker engines.

Last year, Pay 'N Pak's Rolls Royce engine had only 2,500 horsepower, 1,000 less than several turbocharged Allison's. But the craft's new aluminum honeycomb hull made the boat the smallest and lightest in the circuit.

"As the weight of a boat goes up, the horsepower needed to keep up the same speed rises exponentially," Lucero explained. "Sort of."

Lucero may become known as one of the men who took the thunder out of the thunderboats. His Pay 'N Pak, and 1974 light-hull copies like Miss U.S. and the New Lincoln Thrift, whoosh by like Whisperjets compared to the Muncey-style river rippers.

While other boats "walk"

from sponson to sponson, bob and weave, drift in the turns and kite in the corners, Pay 'N Pak's trademark is its stability.

Other crews would like to have a clear technical understanding of that stability. When Lucero is not perched like a 6-foot-2 bird on Pay 'N Pak's back, "sorting out the gremlins" in the engine, he carefully covers up his work.

"There is spying," said Lucero, "but there's more old-fashioned prying."

"Ronnie Musson (twice driving champ) was the best at that. He'd go off to a bar with another owner and after a few beers he'd say, 'you know, your boat really runs crummy. You do the same old things every year,'" said Lucero.

"And the other owner would say, 'The same old things! Why this year we've put in...'"






## Lincoln Thrift Wins Regatta With Luck, Whipp

Luck ruled the President's Cup hydroplane regatta yesterday on the Potomac River.

Rookie Gene Whipp, in Lincoln Thrift, until the last race the most unlucky, snake-bitten driver in the eight boat competition through three days of equipment breakdowns, accidents and near-accidents, finally was declared the winner in his first unlimited hydroplane competition.
