This is to strongly recommend reconsideration and approval of the schedule proposal for Rep. Bill Young to introduce Miss Lisa Lyons, Miss National Teenager to the President.

Rep. Young is extremely disturbed that the White House has not been cooperative in his requests. He has expressed his disgust and that of his colleagues to me personally. You will note that the Pageant Director went to Senator Talmadge because this request of Rep. Young was not approved. Senator Talmadge has made a similar request.

If you want to stop this as an annual meeting with the President, I strongly suggest that it not be done this year. We owe a coeperative effort to get Rep. Young off the hook on this because of the precedent. After the meeting with the President this year the Pageant Director should be advised that this will not be an annual event and should not be so billed. This would satisfy Rep. Young and take us all off the hook from a similar Congressional request for the winner this year.
