Telephone call from "Bear" Bryant

On October 16, the president of the Monday Morning Quarterback Club at Birmingham, Alabama, Mr. Fred Rennekar, wrote the President requesting that he accept a phone call from Alabama University Coach "Bear" Bryant during the group's regular weekly meeting between 1:30 and 2:30 p.m. eastern standard time.

If for some reason it is impossible for the President to accept a call November 17, they would like to have him speak to Duffy Daugherty, former Michigan State Coach, who is their speaker on November 3, or Bob Devaney, former University of Nebraska Coach and now athletic director there, on November 24.

Rep. <u>Bill Dickinson</u> (R-Ala.) called to endorse strongly this request, preferably for the "Bear" Bryant call. This prestigious group of about 475 Birmingham leaders is noted for its charitable work in the field of crippled children and heart disease research.

The phone call would be a brief exchange of pleasantries and football talk. Particularly the Michigan-Ohio State game to be played on November 22.

Inasmuch as Dickinson was quite put out when the President recently had to cancel his appearance at the peanut festival, this would be a good trade-off.

The President's mail for October 28 included a similar request from Senator James Allen (D-Ala.).

The Monday Morning Quarterback Club Tower of the Alabama Heart Hospital

Construction of the Monday Morning Quarterback Club Tower marks the beginning of the Alabama Heart Hospital of the University of Alabama in Birmingham.

The Tower's completion will meet an urgent need for facilities to accommodate a rapidly expanding demand for cardiovascular medicine and surgery at the Medical Center. It will contain seven operating rooms; cardiac radiology facilities; a 16-bed cardiovascular intensive care unit; a 20-bed surgical intensive care unit; a 12-bed medical cardiac unit; and nuclear medicine diagnostic facilities. Estimated cost is approximately \$8 million.

The Quarterback Tower soon will be joined by other heart related facilities, including additional hospital space, the Margaret Cameron Spain Auditorium for teaching, and an ambulatory center which will serve the entire University of Alabama Hospital complex.

The Quarterback Tower is named in honor of Birmingham's Monday Morning Quarterback Club which, in cooperation with the Board of the Crippled Children's Foundation, has made one of the major contributions toward the Alabama Heart Hospital.

The Medical Center houses one of the outstanding cardiovascular programs in the country—internationally acclaimed for patient care, research, and training of all levels of specialized personnel. The scientific and medical groups are represented by the more than 50 specialists who include cardiovascular physicians, physiologists, molecular biophysicists, biochemists and computer scientists.

The documented performance of this group includes a remarkable record of productivity in exploring fundamental questions about the heart and blood vessels and in translating this information directly into improved diagnosis and treatment of patients.

The program has completely outgrown its present physical facilities and is now seriously hampered in its vital work. The Quarterback Tower of the Alabama Heart Hospital will be a significant enhancement to the activities of which this state can be justifiably proud.

Milburn Stone: BACK FROM THE DEAD!

For Milburn Stone-the beloved Doc on CBS-TV's Gunsmoke it happened not once, b three times. And each time he fought his way back to life.

Following open-heart sur rotiowing open-near sur-gery to bypass a ruined coro-nary artery, which had been clogged up by three heart attacke--the first one in Sep-tember, 1968, the most recent In January, 1971-cardiac ar-rest stopped his heart three timos

Although the latest computerized advances in medical actence helped the talented medical team at the University of Alabama Medical Center to asve his life when his heart stopped beating, Stone's own izing will to live was instru-

However, Stone gives mu of the credit to his loyal wife, Jane. "She refused to consider even the possibility that I might die," he said at a recent waldie," he said at a recent wel-come-back party on the Gun-smoke set, looking at her ten-

derly. It was Jane Stone who drove him to the doctor after his first attack, which occurred when he was esting ice cream in the kitchen of his home in North Hollywood. At first he thought It was just a bad case of indi-gestion, but Jane insisted on calling their physician in Bev-erly Hills and driving Milburn to his office, where an ambulance was waiting to rush him to the hospital. During the high-speed drive to Beverly Hills, Stone thought he was dying and begged Jane to turn around so he could die at home. But she refused.

After several weeks in the hospital, Milburn Stone re-turned to Gunsmoke-but two more heart attacks followed. and he was warned that if he did not have open-heart surgery to repair the damage that had occurred, he would die.

In Alabama, at the medical center, his wife was in con-

stant attendance at his bedstant attendance at his oec-side, both before and after surgery. After his heart had stopped three times, the doc-tors were amazed to see Stone fight his way back to con-sciousness. No other patient there had ever survived more

During his hospitalization, constant flow of visitors flew to Birmingham to visit Stone-including two astronauta, Walt Cunningham of Apollo 7, and Bill Anders of Apollo 8, one of the first three men to fly around the moon, Stone's Gunsmoke sidekick, Ken Curtis, who often tours with him on personal appearances, also appeared to lend his moral support to Mil-burn and Jane. And June Lockhart dropped by, too, with en-

couraging words. At such times a man realizes who his friends are. But Mil-burn Stone didn't have to be told that the best friend he has is his wife - the woman who refused to let him die. "I don't know what I'd have done without her," he says gratefully. And you know he means it!

Thank you for the opportunity this letter gives me to write down these thoughts about my experiences in Birmingham's excellent University Hospital. But first, I'd like you to know that I'm getting along just famously, and that Margaret and I will be returning to our home in New Jersey today. I don't know how much to attribute my good health to our several stimulating conversations, but they certainly didn't hurt. And my thanks to you and the others involved with University Hospital who enabled me to have my surgery performed there.

Now that a little time has brought some perspective, I'm able to appreciate the extraordinary and expert care that I received from Dr. Kirklin and the staff at the hospital. Though I can't speak about my experiences in the operating room since I wasn't conscious, I can talk about nearly everything else. The staff of nurses, for example, never seemed to let their responsibilities or unpleasant tasks get in the way of either smiles or concern. Indeed, the spirit of camaraderie was so strong among the patients and nurses that there were times when I enjoyed being in the heart care ward, though still suffering pain and discomfort.

From my patient's-eye view. I saw only a small part of what went into my care, but everything I did catch suggested that a lot of planning and forethought had gone into the program for cardiac-care patients. The intensive-care unit, for example, was immensely reassuring--once I was able to focusmy mind on my surroundings--because I knew that those blinking lights in the computerized monitoring system signaled that all my functions were performing properly. But even in that starkly modern and professional room there were human touches. such as the nurse who gave me a shave before I left.

My rapid recovery speaks for itself, and for the great care I received at the hospital. Birmingham can only be proud of what must be the best cardiac-care hospital in the world!

He has acquired this following by virtue of active participation in professional associations and community service.

Bill is 49, married, and the father of two collegeage daughters. Born in Chicago, he has lived in Elmhurst, Illinois for the past 35 years. Presently, his address is 213 Grace Avenue and his telephone number is 312-832-1309.

I recommend Bill's candidacy to you as one who is proud of being as close to him as a brother, perhaps even closer, since our high school days. Our deep and abiding mutual respect led us to share a law practice from 1952 until our public lives took precedence over that endeavor. Thus, I speak from first-hand knowledge when I say that you could proudly submit his name to the Senate as your nominee for Supreme Court Justice.
