Issue

What posture should the Administration adopt in the face of a request from former Congressman Wayne Aspinall and other interests in the State of Colorado that five Upper Colorado River Basin Reclamation Projects (Animas-LaPlata, Dolores, Dallas Creek, West Divide and San Miguel) be funded so that their construction can proceed concurrently with that of the Central Arizona Project (CAP).

Background

Public Law 90-537, the Colorado River Basin Project Act, directs the Secretary of the Interior to proceed as nearly as practicable with the construction of the five above mentioned Reclamation projects in the Upper Colorado Basin concurrently with the construction of CAP in the Lower Basin. The aim of this approach was to ensure that the Upper Basin projects would be completed not later than the date of the first delivery of water from CAP. One project is under construction, and four are being planned, as indicated below.

Discussion

The funding requests for these five projects in the 1977 budget are consistent with the Congressional intent expressed in P. L. 93-537, i. e., that these projects proceed concurrently with CAP. As planning proceeds on the four projects, however, there is growing concern that they may not be economically feasible, and that they may be increasing the salinity of the Colorado River to levels unacceptable under the provisions of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act administered by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). A review of these projects and their impact on the salinity of the Colorado River is underway in OMB, EPA, and the Department of the Interior.

Conclusion

The 1977 budget provides sufficient funds for these five projects to proceed concurrently with CAP so that completion dates on all 6 projects can be dovetailed. However, in view of the uncertainties regarding salinity, possible EPA action under pollution control legislation and issues regarding economic merit, no commitment should be made at this time that future budget decisions will not delay the Upper Basin projects.

FACT SHEET

Colorado River Basin Salinity Control Act (P.L. 93-320)

Background

The Colorado River Basin Salinity Control Act of 1974 authorized the Secretary of the Interior - under Title I - to construct, operate and maintain a desalting complex capable of treating 129 million gallons a day of drain water from the Wellton-Mohawk division of the Gila River, Arizona reclamation project and - under Title II - to construct, operate, and maintain the following salinity control units as the initial stage of the Colorado River Basin salinity control program:

- (1) Paradox Valley, Colorado
- (2) Grand Valley Unit, Colorado
- (3) Crystal Geyser Unit, Utah
- (4) Las Vegas Wash Unit, Nevada

The Secretary was also authorized under Title II to expedite completion of the planning reports on 12 additional salinity control units.

Current Status

A. Title I

The President's FY 1977 budget request includes \$42,600,000 to continue work on the Yuma, Arizona desalting complex authorized under Title I of the Act. The Yuma desalting complex is scheduled to be in operation by FY 1982. The principal contract to construct the desalting plant is scheduled for award in late FY 1978. The funding situation on Title I work is as follows:

B. Title II

Mrs. Boggs, a dear friend of the President and First Lady, has requested that the Honorable Jimmy E. Fitzmorris of New Orleans, Lt. Governor of Louisiana, be afforded a brief courtesy call on the President on the afternoon of Thursday, March 5.

Mr. Fitzmorris will be making one of his rare trips to Washington to participate in the Louisiana Bicentennial Day on that date. He will be representing Governor Edwin Edwards.

According to Mrs. Boggs, Mr. Fitzmorris has an extremely large following in Louisiana having been re-elected almost by acclaimation last year. He is especially well known for his volunteer work in Church, veterans affairs and charitable causes.

Mrs. Boggs would accompany him on the visit if it is approved. They will be tied up with Bicentennial activities between 11:00 a.m. and 2:30 p.m., so late afternoon would be preferable. If there is any possibility of this being approved, I will be glad to prepare a schedule proposal.
