The President receives an annual appropriation for the operation, maintenance and preservation of the Executive Residence. The budget for FY 1975 is \$1,695,000.

We have an excellent relationship with our House Appropriations Committee, especially Chairman Steed - Sen. Montoya shows little interest. The Committees have 3 main concerns:

1. Do we have sufficient funds to properly maintain and preserve the White House. We do.
2. Do we use any of this appropriation for the operation of the offices, Camp David or any other Presidential retreat. We do not.
3. Do we show every possible concern for the tourists visiting the White House. We do.

The Chief Usher is responsible for preparing the budget and administering the appropriation. We are not subject to GAO audit, Civil Service Employment or Federal Procurement Regulations but we do follow these established guidelines in every possible situation.

We have for the past 3 years budgeted \$60,000 annually for official entertainment (cost of food and beverage - not labor) and have spent an average of \$27,000 per year.

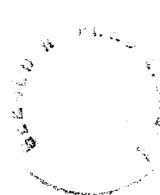

This has been possible due to excellent staff cooperation in obtaining reimbursements. The Department of State reimburses for all Foreign visits. RNC for all political events. Other Government agencies and private groups reimburse for functions held at the White House in their behalf whenever possible and appropriate. In any event, we prepare complete cost reports each month and can adjust our spending to keep abreast of any increase in Presidential entertainment requirements over \$60,000.

Attached are costs for White House entertaining from August 9 through August 31, 1974.

The First Family is expected to reimburse this account for the cost of their personal food, beverage, dry cleaning, toilet articles, etc. A monthly statement will be provided for Dorothy Downton with a request for reimbursement by check made payable to the Treasurer of the United States.
