



he John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts is the achievement of many men and women – of Presidents, Members of Congress, individual and corporate donors, trustees, volunteers, staff, and performing artists. Businessman and theatrical producer, he brought to the stage such plays and musicals as *A Man for All Seasons, West Side Story, The Visit, Tea and Sympathy,* and *The Pleasure of His Company.* As president of Kennedy Center Productions, Inc., he produced or co-produced Leonard Bernstein's *Mass* and the current Broadway hit, *Sherlock Holmes.* President of the National Opera Institute, co-founder of the American Shakespeare Theatre and Academy, chairman of the Advisory Committee of the National Book Awards and a former chairman of the American Film Institute, he has encouraged and assisted each of the arts in America, to the lasting benefit of artists and public alike.

The list of his titles and responsibilities is unparalleled; and yet it is not for these that we honor him tonight. It is for his unremitting and unselfish endeavors to provide the national capital with a center for music, drama, dance, and opera in which great artists would wish to perform, and to which citizens throughout the country would wish to come. Such a center now exists, and it is not too much to say that it would not have been brought into being without the leadership of Roger Stevens. For this we salute him, friend and colleague, in gratitude and admiration.
