In the major White House celebration of the Bicentennial, the President and Mrs. Ford will host a concert and reception Tuesday, July 20 at 9 p.m.

The concert will spotlight the versatility and creativity of American music. Artists, who are Roger Miller, Ella Fitzgerald, Tammy Wynette and the World's Greatest Jazz Band, will perform in the Rose Garden beneath a white canopy.

Background on the performers:

Roger Miller, contemporary singer/song-writer, will perform two of his compositions—"King of the Road" and "Lady America." Miller is distinguished as the entertainer who has won more grammy awards (11 in the period between 1964-1965) than any other singer. He has composed most of the music he performs. Miller entertained at the White House during the Johnson Administration.

Ella Fitzgerald will sing tunes by such American composers as Cole Porter, George Gershwin and Jerome Kern. She is known for her renditions of a variety of music, which includes ballads, Dixieland, calypso, pop and jazz. Miss Fitzgerald is the recipient of many awards including the "Golden Needle" (from the East Berlin Government) and four Grammys. She recently received an Honorary Doctorate from Dartmouth College. This will be her first performance at the White House.

Tammy Wynette, a country-western singer, is a four-time winner of the Country Music Association of America's Female Vocalist of the Year and also a three-time Grammy winner for Best Female Vocalist. Miss Wynette has written and co-written several of her own recordings, including "Stand By Your Man." She has appeared before audiences throughout the United States and Canada. This will be her first performance at the White House.

The World's Greatest Jazz Band will perform "South Rampart Street Parade," "Lime House Blues," and "When the Saints Go Marching In" among their selections. Since their formation in 1968, the group has toured North and South America and Europe. They received the International Critics Award in England (1973). The band appeared at the 1969 and 1973 Inaugural Ball and at the White House March 1970.

THE WORLD'S GREATEST JAZZ BAND preserves America's most distinguished and most original contribution to the world of music. The band not only keeps the memory of jazz alive but with original arrangements makes jazz a favorite for a whole new generation.

The band is the creation of YANK LAWSON and BOB HAGGART, veterans of the big band era. They played with Bob Crosby and the Bobcats, with the great Jack Teagarden, and with the immortal Tommy Dorsey. Their experience gives a sizzling freshness to such classics as Savoy Blues, South Rampart Street Parade, Wolverine Blues, and many more.

Their ability to translate contemporary tunes into jazz renditions have also made them a hit on college campuses across the nation. ROGER MILLER is one of America's most honored singers and composers. The eleven Grammys he has won from the recording industry reveal his tremendous impact on the world of music. Once strictly a country singer, Miller excels in many categories now. The late Johnny Mercer called Roger Miller a "genius." Jazz great Charles Mingus said that "Nobody can write better songs than Roger Miller." King of the Road, In the Summer time, and Dangme are a few of the top-selling singles that have contributed to his popularity and critical success. His songs and his distinctive style have kept him at the forefront of the music industry. His clever lyrics and catchy tunes are matched by a personable wit. His warm performances win not only applause, but the hearts of his audiences.

ELLA FITZGERALD has been the super songstress of music for well over a quarter century. Her vibrancy astounds audiences. Her versatility and artistry overwhelms critics. Ella Fitzgerald's marvelous voice is matched with a warm personality formed in her early career. She started in the mid-thirties by winning ten dollars in an amateur contest at the Harlem Opera House. From there she went to the famed Apollo Theatre, then on to tour the East. After World War II, Ella Fitzgerald became America's jazz queen, a title she has retained to this day. For 18 consecutive years she has been named Best Female Jazz Singer by Downbeat Magazine; for 13 consecutive years she has won Playboy Magazine's Best Jazz Singer Award. Whether touring Europe or South America, whether appearing in New York or Los Angeles, Ella Fitzgerald electrifies her audiences. Whether performing for television or an outdoor concert, she is a consummate master of pace, phraseology, and melody.
